Mark 6: 30-33

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. ³¹ He said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. ³² And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves.

Sabbath and the Holiness of Time

How would you respond to the invitation, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves", come away and rest? In the Gospel of Mark, we read about Jesus calling his disciples to rest from their work because

"many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat" (6:31).

Summertime rest in a deserted place sounds pretty good to many of us right now!

For many of us the problems of over-commitment, over-scheduling, and lack of leisure time can threaten our physical and emotional heath, taking a toll on our relationships with family, friends...and even our relationship with God! This is not the rhythm of life God calls us to, yet how do we break this cycle and choose to accept God's gift of Sabbath?

Throughout the gospels, we read about times when Jesus observes the Sabbath, but mostly we read about times when he is accused of not observing it properly, according to the law. His observance of Sabbath challenges the legalistic understanding of Sabbath dominant among religious leaders in his time. The gospel writer in Mark tells us that when Jesus was criticized for healing someone on the Sabbath, he replied with the question, "Is it lawful to do good or to do harm on the Sabbath, to save a life or to kill?" And, when Jesus' disciples were criticized for failing to obey Sabbath law, he responded that, "Sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the Sabbath". Sabbath is for humankind, a gift for the good of humankind, and more.

Abraham Heschel, in his book Sabbath, describes this seventh day as a "holiness in time". He compares the observation of Sabbath time to "islands of stillness" and a "sanctuary in time" where we escape from "tensions" and



"practical affairs". This day of rest from work is described in Genesis as part of God's design in creation, as important as the six days of work, necessary for renewal and restoration. This gift of Sabbath rest is extended in Leviticus even to the land, as fields are to rest from cultivation during every seventh year.

Regular times of rest will make the land more productive, and the same is true of each of us.

The important aspects in observing Sabbath are regularity to establish a rhythm and intentionality to focus on God's holiness. All of us, like Jesus' disciples, need to accept Jesus' invitation to "Come away to a deserted place...and rest a while". You may have heard the saying that, like a pitcher, those who pour themselves out for others must also take time to be refilled. Sabbath rest can refill us.

Intellectually we know that we cannot go on indefinitely, giving of ourselves, of our energies, without recharging our battery, refilling our pitchers. But, somehow we too often remain on the treadmill of life, caught up in a cycle that keeps looking ahead to just one more activity, just one more phone call, just one more thing!

Now for some of us, Sunday will not be a day of rest, but Heschel suggests an understanding of Sabbath that permeates our lives. He writes that Sabbath "needs the companionship of all other days" as our life is lived in appreciation of what "this day may bring". Sabbath is "our awareness of God's presence in the world".

Sabbath is a gift, we can choose to receive it or rush past it. Heschel asserts that, "what we are depends on what the Sabbath is to us". It shapes how we engage others and the world around us. If we can begin to recognize God's presence in the world each day, and strive to live daily in a relationship of justice with others and the earth, we may feel our yolks lifted as we begin to see each day as an opportunity to live in the reign of God.

Summer is upon us! It is up to you. Will you accept Jesus' invitation? "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while".

Knit One, Pray "Too"

The Stephen Ministers would like to thank all the knitters who provide prayer shawls. They are an important part of our own ministry. Even though it is summer, we hope that some of you will take up your knitting needles, as we are out of shawls for both men and women. A shawl takes three to four single skeins of 4 ply knitting worsted. Size 10 or 11 needles are suggested for a final size of 20 by 60 inches.

Crocheted shawls are also welcome.

The stories from the knitters reflect how meaningful the knitting is to them. They pray for the recipient, count their own blessings, and thank God as they knit. It sounds like a silent retreat into their own personal faith journey. We also hear stories from the recipients, but those remain part of our confidential sharing.

Several years ago, Salmon Creek Church began a partnership with Gaiser Middle School. We have provided school supplies and funds for families in need. Church volunteers have helped in the classroom, provided conference dinners for teachers and supported the honor roll breakfast. Here is a bit of information about Gaiser...

Gaiser Middle School is a large, diverse middle school located about 2 miles from Salmon Creek Church. The Gaiser boundary reaches from 119th St. in the North to Hwy 500 in the South. East to West boundaries run from Hwy 99 to the Vancouver Mall. This means that some Gaiser students travel over 30 minutes on the bus to get to school.

In the 2023 – 24 school year, Gaiser had 736 students. About 60% of the students qualify for free and reduced lunch and 4% are classified as homeless. Among the languages spoken at Gaiser are Spanish (38%), Russian, Ukrainian, Arabic, Farsi, Chuukese and Thai, 24% of student are English language learners. 59% of students at Gaiser identify as non-white. Almost 17% of the students have a disability.

This August we will again be holding a supply drive for Gaiser. Items can be brought to the church and placed in the Gaiser bin. Most needed items are:







