### a note from Pastor John

Christmas is nigh upon us, and as we consider the celebration of Jesus arriving in this world in a manger in Bethlehem, we might also consider the arrival of God, in human form, into God's own creation. A web site called "Prince of Peace Anglican Family" gives a nice summation:

In Christian Theology the area of study dealing with the coming of God to be with us in Christ Jesus is known as *Incarnational Theology* . . . *Incarnational Theology teaches us that God has always revealed Himself to us through the "normal," the physical, the temporal, the mundane things of this life. The created order has always contained within it a window into the agency and genius of its Creator; it has always been true that one can know about God by looking at what God has created.* 

The idea that God is revealed to us through the "created order" as well as in scripture, is echoed by Paul in his letter to the Romans:

For what can be known about God is plain to them [Gentiles], because God has shown it to them. Ever since the creation of the world his eternal power and divine nature, invisible though they are, have been understood and seen through the things he has made. (Romans 1:19-20)

Neither of these statements diminishes the central role of scripture in our faith, since creation does not tell us the story of Christ's redeeming sacrifice on the cross. But God clearly is not playing hide-and-seek with humanity – the created order shows us a will and mind far, far greater than our own at work, and visible for all to see. When God incarnates as human, we are given a clear, unambiguous touchpoint with the Divine. The web site continues "... we, like the Disciples, have the joy of coming to know God in and through Jesus. This is a critical point within Incarnational Theology: all that we need for our salvation can be experienced in and through our relationship with Christ Jesus, our Lord as revealed in the Holy Scriptures."

I invite you this year to have not only a Merry Christmas, but also a Holy Christmas, experiencing the incarnational nature of God in Jesus, God in the world, God in scripture, and God in your spirit.

Here's a list of what they need most:

- Canned vegetables, fruits, beans, soup, ravioli, chili, spaghetti sauce
- Canned meats—tuna, chicken, etc.
- Dried rice, beans, pasta
- Cereal, oatmeal, mac & cheese, boxed dinners, shelf stable milks
- Snack items: tuna packets, tuna salad & chicken salad snack kits, cheese and/or peanut butter crackers, chewy granola and/or snack bars, squeezable packets of apple sauce, fruit cups, fruit snacks, protein/nutritional beverages, juice
- Shampoo, conditioner, body wash, soap, shaving cream, razors, tooth brushes, tooth paste
- Menstrual products, personal wipes, toilet paper
- First aid items, band aids, anti-bacterial cream, compression roll, gauze pads, isopropyl alcohol wipes/bottles, hydrogen peroxide
- Diapers (all sizes), wipes, creams, powder (not talcum)

#### Here is the Trustees 2021 Year-End Report

COVID continues to limit church activities, including Trustee projects, but some activity and building usage returned. The Flames youth basketball program returned now using the gym 3 nights per week. Boy Scouts returned in April to use of the gym and some meeting rooms. Sunday service moved back to the Sanctuary in June after holding service in the Gym to start the year. Several small groups have returned to the church meeting rooms and a new AA group started meeting October. The Bell choir has expanded and had several practices and performances in the church buildings. Hopefully, this is a start to more member gatherings at our church.

The YMCA held 4 weeks of youth activities at our church using the gym and meeting rooms in the FMC. A cub Scout troop was added this fall. In July, the Flames basketball organization put on a 3 on 3 basketball tournament with 50 teams. Attendance for the 2-day event was over 1000 for the participants, family, and friends. The Bell Choir provided food and drink and raised funds.

Trustees replaced the lights in the Fellowship Hall in January – some 96 fluorescent lights were replaced with LED lights. The light fixtures and woodwork were cleaned and stained, while we were up there. In September, a second security camera system was added. In December, the daycare doors will be removed, refinished, and repainted by contract. The Trustees will also undertake to replace lights in 5 of the school rooms and paint the ceilings.

The extreme heat wave caused much damage to the shrubs around the church. This fall Richard Beilsmith and Larry Siewert spent much time trimming the shrubs. In January, the water main for the FMC building broke again – different spot. The Boy Scouts added an Armed Services memorial consisting of flag poles, lights, and a meditation area next to the Bamboo and the front parking lot – quite impressive.

The Trustees awarded contracts for replacing the HVAC units in the Chapel and Daycare. Work will not likely be completed until next year.






Pay-It-Forward update: 2 HVAC units have been replaced, have committed to replacing 2 more HVAC systems, the Sanctuary was cleaned and repainted by the Trustees and other volunteers (rather than contracting to do so), and carpet replaced in the Sanctuary and Narthex. Total expenditures - \$85,000.

For the first 2 years, donations have been \$90,000 to date.

Projects completed (carpets, HVAC, and Sanctuary) have reduced the funding required from \$385,000 to \(^\xi\_290,000\). \$15,000 for 5 years from the Grace Jones/Willis Slack fund will be added to the PIF account as approved last year. This leaves \$215,000 as our goal for the fund drive. More details will be provided later in 2022

We give all honor and glory to our God and this wonderful congregation for all that has been accomplished this year.


#### **Christmas Eve Offering for Jamaa Letu Orphanage**

The Administrative Board has decided that this Christmas Eve our offering will be donated to the Jamaa Letu orphanages in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

What is Jamaa Letu?

"Our Family" in Swahili, Jamaa Letu provides a safe haven for young Congolese victims of war, famine, poverty, and abandonment. Jamaa Letu is a secure compound for the girls and boys, in addition the orphanage pays their school tuition, and provides their food, water, a bed, and medical needs. Efforts are made to reconnect families with abandoned children, often successfully. Once the children complete the equivalent of high school, they are no longer eligible to live at Jamaa Letu. 











