a note from Pastor John

Uncertainty. It is nobody's favorite word. Most of us like things to be calm and predictable. We don't like drama, except occasionally when it's safely confined to a stage or screen. But as much as we like certainty, we rarely get it. Friends and family can be unpredictable, sometimes in fun, surprising ways, but sometimes in sad or hurtful ways. Sports teams that should have a lock on a game or title suddenly underperform. And we sometimes surprise ourselves and find ourselves asking, "Why did I do that?"

This is why it is so important for us to remember our source of certainty: the Word of God given through Jesus Christ. The house built on rock. When Jesus talked about the man who built his house on shifting sands, he was talking about the constantly changing culture and values that are the hallmark of all secular societies. How can anyone possibly keep up and still close the day with the same set of values with which they started the day?

Like individuals, the church is also subject to the pull of secular culture. This isn't new to our time. Look at virtually any controversy the church has experienced since it was founded, and you will find this tug-of-war between God's will for humanity and humanity's will for God. In case you're wondering, humanity is waaaaay overmatched.

When the shifting sands of culture begin to engulf you, stop, breathe, stay calm. God is revealed in all things either by demonstrating that thing's truth in God or demonstrating that thing's falseness. Is it good? Will it help bring God's kingdom to fruition? Is it selfless?

The storms of life will assail us. That is a certainty we can count on. The question is, will we be blown away or pushed off course? By anchoring our values and our views on the certain rock of Jesus, we can weather these storms. We can answer anger with love and faithlessness with faith whether these occur at home, at work, in church or in the world around us. Even when we ourselves stumble, we won't be swept away if we are anchored in faith. And we can steer through the traffic of a fickle and unpredictable culture, no matter what that culture is, when we embrace the certainty of Jesus Christ.





Denominational News

On January 3rd a private group of Bishops and clergy in the United Methodist Church released a proposal called "Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace Through Separation." The proposal lays out a protocol for the denomination to split into at least two separate, but affiliated, denominations, reflecting the denomination's long standing discord over human sexuality.

This announcement created a lot of buzz in the media, but the Protocol is in no way a done deal. Any changes made to the denominational structure must be approved by the General Conference, which meets May 5 - 15 in Minneapolis. The Protocol remains one of about a half dozen proposals that will go before the General Conference. Although the Protocol appears to be a strong contender, there is opposition to it from a variety of sources.

As a congregation, we are likely at some point to have to make some choices, but the bottom line truth is we won't even know what our choices are in regard to denominational affiliation until the conclusion of General Conference, and perhaps not even then. In the meantime, church leadership is organizing informational, educational and discussion sessions in which every member of the congregation can have their voice heard. These will take place both before and after General Conference. We can take this time to better define who we are as a congregation, where we fit in our community, how we perceive Salmon Creek Church to be equipped to deliver God's Word, and how we wish to operate. By understanding ourselves better, we will be able to understand our choices for affiliation better, if and when, the time comes to make those choices.

Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace Through Separation

Representatives of advocacy groups with contrasting views and bishops from around the world collaborated on and unanimously support a compromise proposal for the separation of The United Methodist Church.

"New Denominations" (Indianapolis Plan)

This plan envisions the creation of new expressions — traditionalist, centrist/progressive and progressive — that will share a common heritage from the roots of Methodism.

"New Expressions Worldwide (N.E.W)"

Proposed by UMForward, this legislation would dissolve The United Methodist Church and form four new global denominations instead — traditionalist, moderate, progressive and liberationist.

"Next Generation UMC" (UMCNext)

This plan would eliminate the Church's restrictions against LGBTQ ordination and same-sex weddings, while allowing local churches that disagree to depart and organize into new forms of Methodism.

"U.S. Regional Conference" (Connectional Table)

The Connectional Table plan would create a new decision-making body for U.S. matters — a place for United Methodists to vote on clergy pensions, retirement plans, property matters, resolutions and other initiatives that solely affect the United States.

If you make coffee or clean up for a small group or coffee fellowship please read:

While most of you don't do much more than pour yourself a cup of coffee from our urns, there is a coffee elf who makes the coffee and elves who clean up later. This isn't just the Sunday morning team, it could be the Bible study groups, a meeting or any other reason you make coffee.

Last spring, we moved the urns to a spot under the island to reduce clutter and create space for when we bring in food for events. The space under the island was tight and the urns had to be stored closed. The Science lesson for the day is: closed, moist, dark spaces grow things.

We moved the urns to under the coffee maker where they can be stored with the lids open. The insulated coffee pitchers that were under the coffee maker were moved to under the island.

When you are cleaning up, please rinse the urns out with water, then turn upside down

for a minute to drain. , When you store the urns and insulated coffee pitchers, please leave the lids open so they can dry out.



<u>Overnight shift:</u> Requires 2 people from 12 midnight to 6am in the morning. Essentially they conduct indoor security/fire checks——usually very quiet.

<u>Morning shift</u>: Requires 2 people from 6-9am in the morning. Responsibility is to wake up everyone and get them out the door.
