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Dear friends and families of Salmon Creek United Methodist Church,

As I write to you today, we have just finished the first day of VBS! I look forward to it every year. God can do beautiful things with a little holy chaos and the gift of faith through the eyes of children!

Summer is upon us, and on the heals of traveling for my Texas Annual Conference, joining the PNW Conference remotely, and trying to catch up on all that had to continue during them both, Nancy has been patiently waiting for me to complete this note to be included in our Circuit Rider.

In the interest of time, I have decided to share with you a devotional I wrote in 2001 that shares a little of my backstory and fits well with the message of opening your heart to God's, that is our focus as we end June and begin July. I hope you find it meaningful.

Trust your Navigator 2.19.2001 "However, as it is written: 'No eye has seen, no ear has heard, no mind has conceived what God has prepared for those who love him', but God has revealed it to us by his Spirit. The Spirit searches all things, even the deep things of God." I Corinthians 2:9-10 NIV

I have often thought of the Holy Spirit as my Navigator. But many times, I have not been too quick to understand or follow the directions I have been given. God's patience and persistence is certainly divine!

A few years ago, I came to understand that the Spirit moves and guides us in many amazing ways. It was a time when I was earnestly seeking God's will for my life. The question, 'what do you want me to do Lord?' seemed to always be in my mind. But, as the mother of three young children, I often found it difficult to find time to listen for an answer. One afternoon, I was driving to church with my son, who was four years old, riding behind me in his car seat. Suddenly out of nowhere, my son says to me, "Mommy, God talks to me". Feeling a little proud of his young spirituality, I told

him I was glad he was able to talk to God and that he understood God also talks to him. Then he surprised me by replying, "Mommy, God talks to lots of people, but they don't hear because God talks so quiet". Still a little stunned this wisdom was coming from my four-year-old, I told him that was something a lot of grown ups are still learning. His comment had brought me back to a recent Disciple Bible study class I had been in, where we had talked about God's voice coming in the quiet whispers rather that the mighty winds.

As his remarks sank in, I realized this message was just what I needed to hear. Answers to my questions of God had been placed quietly in front of me, in the form of opportunities. Like a traveler who must choose between two directions at a fork in the road, after asking my navigator for guidance, it was me who had to make the choice and move forward. I began to understand it is up to me to recognize the opportunities presented to me each day and act on them in a way that will please God.

In this passage from I Corinthians, Paul teaches his young church at Corinth the differences between earthly wisdom and spiritual wisdom. He assures these new Christians that God cannot be understood through human reason or wisdom, but rather things of God are revealed to those who love God only through the Spirit of God. In discerning God's will for their lives, they must trust in the spiritual guidance they receive as they live as Christians in loving relationship with God.

Like these Christians in Corinth, we must choose God as our source of wisdom, understanding the difference between human wisdom and spiritual wisdom. God often calls us to stretch, beyond what we thought were our limits, as we strive to be the servants, witnesses and teachers God calls us to be.

Holy Loving God, Wise Navigator, thank you for your guidance. Forgive us for failing to let you lead us when we stubbornly rely on our faulty human wisdom. Thank you for expecting more of us than we do of ourselves. Help us recognize and seize the opportunities you place before us daily that shape our lives and grant us discernment to choose the path you will for us, Dear God. Amen

In an effort to make sure that we are all prepared, we have been publishing 2-3 pages from our SCUMC Emergency Action Plan booklet each month in the Circuit Rider. This is the final installment. Thank you so much for taking the time to read through these procedures.

7. UNHOUSED PERSON SEEKING HELP WITH/WITHOUT A MENTAL CRISIS

Do not invite any unhoused person into the building, especially if children are present in either building. He/She may seem harmless and is only seeking assistance. But a dangerous situation can evolve quickly if assistance is denied. Talk through the intercom system at the front door.

Call 9-1-1 if this person does not leave, or becomes agitated or violent.

8. TORNADO EMERGENCY

The National Weather Service has developed a method for identifying storm conditions that foster the development of tornadoes. A tornada Watch or Warning may be announced for the Salmon Creek area. The Weather Service will provide an approximate time of detection and arrival of the storm and its direction and movement. If a tornado situation arises:

Move away from windows. If you have time, close any blinds or shades to help prevent flying glass and debris Move away from large expanses of unsupported ceilings Move away from building perimeter areas Move to an interior room away from windows- to an enclosed room Crouch down or get under tables Protect your face and head from flying debris Stay until given al "All Clear" If you are outside, get inside quickly, if possible If you can't get inside, take cover near objects that are low and securely anchored to the ground, such as cul-

verts or retaining walls.

9. BOMB EMERGENCY

A bomb emergency exists when a bomb has been located, or a bomb has exploded.

DO NOT TOUCH, MOVE, OR IN ANY WAY HANDLE A SUSPECTED EXPLOSIVE DEVICE

Call 9-1-1 Cease any radio communications on site

Page 6 of the SCUMC Emergency Action Plan booklet

Evacuate in a mannerly order, and stay clear of the device in question, as well as trash cans, lockers

Move all people a safe distance from the buildings

Open areas are best for gathering after evacuation

Account for all people

Be aware of a potential second device - stay away from explosion area

Remain outside until an "All Clear" is given

If you receive a bomb threat, try to obtain as much information as possible:

When is the bomb going to explode? ______

Where is the bomb?

What does it look like?_____

What kind of bomb is it?

Method of activation? Mechanical, clock, movement, chemical

10. THREATS

In the event you receive a threat call (ie. bomb threat, armed assault, custody issues, campus damage, or others), remain calm. On another phone, call 9-1-1. Try to obtain as much information as you can from the person making the threat.

Family Promise of Clark County Board and staff recently completed a 3year strategic plan that includes a big vision to grow our impact significantly over the next three years. In fact, we are already out-growing the space we occupy at River City Church. As such, Family Promise of Clark County temporary lease with River City Church will come to an end June 30, 2024.

The decision to move to another temporary location was not taken lightly. River City, whose church and community service work has also been growing, will resume their good work in the area FPCC once occupied. Family Promise will move into a larger temporary facility at Center Point Community Building in Battleground while we search for our permanent home.

The move will allow us to welcome more families into our shelter program and help us reach our 2024 goal of assisting 100 families with housing, all without interruption to our program services.

Clark County is a community with a growing demand for affordable housing. Both Family Promise of Clark County and River City Church, who work with homelessness, need to expand our reach and impact, it has become increasingly clear that both parties require more space to fulfill our missions effectively.

We wish to thank River City Church for creating an immediate space for our Day Center and offices. Their generosity over the last year allowed us to carry out our mission of helping 72 families find or remain in their own homes, allowing them to resume their lives.

Family Promise of Clark County is confident that this temporary move will provide us with the infrastructure necessary to better serve families who need assistance and to further our mission: *To help homeless children and their families achieve sustainable independence through a community-based response*.
