
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# a note from Pastor John

From September through December, we took a journey from Creation to Incarnation. Along the way, we discovered the ongoing presence of creation, and the ongoing presence of God through Christ, Creation didn't happen "way back then"; it continues to unfold and surprise every day. Incarnation didn't only happen two thousand years ago in Bethlehem; it continues to unfold through the actions of the Holy Spirit. Perhaps we might think of Creation as the soil, and Incarnation as the tree.

Bracketed by the concepts of Creation and Incarnation was another duality: sin and gratitude. Like a blight that stops water from reaching the leaves of a tree, sin attempts to keep God from reaching our selves: our consciousness, our actions, even our dreams. But there is a treatment for this blight, often expressed as simple gratitude. We are thankful not only for all of the good "things" of this world, but in a deeper way, we can be ever thankful for a God who provides the means of release from sin – a cure for the blight – through the redeeming actions of Christ, which we activate with our repentance and gratitude.

So, now what? How does this beautiful system play out in real life? How do we truly repent? How do we truly show gratitude? In Galatians 5, Paul suggests that there can be visible evidence of the work of the Holy Spirit that he calls the Fruit of The Spirit. In January and February we are going to look at these nine fruits, which are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There are fairly obvious and simple definitions for each of these, but we are going to delve a little deeper and try to unearth what Paul



means when he says, "If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit." In other words, anyone can practice kindness, for example. What does it mean to practice Christian kindness? And, like fruit, how do these Fruits of the Spirit sustain us and others?

Paul is well known for providing fairly straightforward answers to "how do I live as a Christian?" His time was filled with challenges, doubt and opposition, as is ours, and Paul's answer to this question is as powerful and meaningful today as ever. I hope you'll join in during our services, and through our Lifelong Faith Formation website, as we learn how to practice the Fruit of the Spirit.


A gentleman purchased two Christmas Trees from the Boy Scout tree lot.

On Sunday evening, December 19<sup>th</sup>, I watched Crystal help her autistic toddler son decorate the Christmas tree on the stage steps of the FMC. Crystal was one of our

Family Promise families whom Salmon Creek hosted the week of Christmas. She is new to Family Promise, new to being a single mom and life has been stressful. It was touching to watch the two of them together. I shared this picture of this time with Larry Siewert as he had suggested we put the Angel Tree out for the families to decorate. Larry responded, "A boy and his mom, that is what Christmas is about." It hit me then, that in some ways Mary and Joseph were homeless, and Jesus was born into a setting similar to what Crystal is in with her two young children.

This put a new spin on our hosting Family Promise for Christmas. On Wednesday evening, a second single mom, Lilly, joined us with her 5-year-old son. She, too, was anxious and uncertain as

this was her first night staying in a shelter. The next morning, I checked in with her to see if she needed another blanket. She told me that they were so exhausted that they fell asleep with the lights on and never noticed anything. She had to have felt safe to be able to sleep that soundly, I thought.

Thanks to 44 generous volunteers, we were able to host two families for Christmas, provide them shelter from the weather, food for their bellies, and then more people donated money to put gifts under that tree. My heart grew even bigger for the Salmon Creek UMC Family.

For those of you wondering what we did with the gift money, there were Christmas stockings hung on a table, toys for each child, and for Crystal, who is legally blind and can't drive, we got her a stroller for two so that she can safely walk to the store and not worry about her autistic son running into the street.


