

Faith & Tragedy

I had a fairly frothy newsletter article all planned out for this month. I thought, let's enter summer with a reminder that being a follower of Jesus can be fun. When we're camping by the fire, we could sing those old camp songs. We have time in the morning to read a devotional and be grateful for a loving savior. We could watch the kids – or grandkids! – splashing around in the river and think how wonderful life truly is.


Then, the news hit from Uvalde, Texas, of another school shooting.

Should I reconsider all of this frothiness? It seems inappropriate to say the least. Another dose of senseless evil unleashed on innocents; there's nothing frothy about that. As self-centered nihilism rises around us it not only sucks the frothiness out of everything, it replaces it with tragedy. We cannot, we should not, as compassionate followers of Jesus, simply look away and hope evil will stop itself. Or pretend it will never find us. Nothing makes a person feel less frothy than feeling unsafe.

Nevertheless, isn't it time for us to double-down on our faith? The same God who can grant such frothy joy as kids playing in the river is also a God who weeps when their innocence is crushed. Jesus specifically calls us to protect the children, and to deal harshly with those who would harm them. Societies, including ours, used to protect the innocents in large part by broad adoption of the shared values of their faith. When there is meaning that extends beyond oneself, nihilism has

a harder time flourishing. But a shared faith, and its shared values, is rapidly disappearing in America and – guess what? – nihilism is on the rise, fueling the evil that can drive someone to mass murder. I am not eliminating personal responsibility from this equation, but evil has a way of encouraging those who are unstable, an encouragement that must be counter-balanced by a strong, meaningful faith.


