Dear Friends and Families of Salmon Creek United Methodist Church,

As I write to you this morning, the postponed 2020 United Methodist General Conference is underway in Charlotte, NC. It will run through May 3, 2024.

General Conference is a complex gathering of United Methodists from around the globe. Delegates from Africa, Europe, Asia and the U.S. are attending the 11-day gathering to set policy and direction for the church, as well as handle other important busi-

ness.

The global nature of the United Methodist Church has seen rapidly growing membership in central conferences (outside of the U.S.). Voting delegates come from the United States (55.9%), Africa (32%), the Philippines (6%), Europe (4.6%) and concordat churches that have close ties to The United Methodist Church (1.5%). Half of the delegates are clergy, half lay. The percentage of delegates from central conferences, which was 16% in 2000, has increased significantly since the start of this millennium. The percentage of delegates from central conferences for the most current four quadrenniums was 29% in 2008; 38%, 2012; 42%, 2016; and 44%, 2020.

Those gathered and leading the conference are hopeful this gathering will be an opportunity for the United Methodist Church to move forward into the future with new energy, united in mission. In his message during opening worship, Council of Bishops President Thomas J. Bickerton began with the questions, "Do you want to be in this room?" and, "Are you willing to move forward in a spirit of hope and embrace a season of reformation, commit to the revitalization of The United Methodist Church and work for a culture marked by compassion, courage and companionship?" Adding, if not, "Maybe you are in the wrong place."

I have been able to tune in for bits and pieces of the conference and have seen clips from several church leaders I follow from around the country. They all express a feeling of hopefulness for the future. The worship services shared in this large gathering of faithful United Methodists are truly inspiring. I encourage you to set aside some time to join your heart in worship with those gathering for General Conference. Salmon Creek cemetery has several veterans with privately purchased headstones but 5 have no indication of their service. However on the Lutheran cemetery side, I observed a few private headstones with a small emblem affixed, denoting veteran status and branch of service. It looks very nice on the headstone and helps those placing the flag and white cross that honors them on Memorial Day. I did some research and found the following information:

The Department of Veterans Affairs provides a medallion, by request, to be affixed to an existing, privately purchased headstone or marker to signify the deceased's status as a Veteran.

This device is furnished in lieu of a traditional Government headstone or grave marker for those Veterans who served on or after Apr. 6, 1917, and whose grave in a private cemetery is marked with a privately purchased headstone or marker.

Bronze Medallion Sizes: The medallion is available in three sizes: Large (6-3/8"W x 4-3/4"H x 1/2"D), Medium (3-3/4"W x 2-7/8"H x 1/4"D) and Small (2"W x 1-1/2"H x 1/3"D). Each medallion is inscribed with the word "VETERAN" across the top and the branch of service at the bottom. Attached picture is actual size of the small medallion on a granite stone.



For family members of Veterans interested in obtaining a medallion, you will need to complete the VA Form 40-1330M, Claim for Government Medallion for Placement in a Private Cemetery Once a claim for a medallion is received and approved, the VA will mail the medallion along with a kit that will allow the family or the staff of a private cemetery to affix the device to a headstone. I would be happy to assist in completing the form and attaching the medallion to the headstone.



EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN





For this plan, an emergency is defined as a situation that poses an immediate risk to health, life, property or environment, but is within the abilities of local persons or agencies to treat. Most emergencies require urgent intervention to prevent a worsening of the situation.

Whenever any type of emergency occurs, the first concern is the safety and well-being of the staff and anyone else present on the grounds. People first - stuff later! In all cases,

Immediately identify the responsible person who will serve as the point person for the emergency response plan. That person could be the pastor, the church secretary, the dayschool director, the lead usher, or a person in charge of a program being run on the campus. Immediate action is critical. In the absence of any of the named parties above, individuals present are expected to take the lead and proceed according to this Plan. The responsible person will implement the plan to its conclusion.

Then:

Keep your eyes, ears, and all other senses alert and be aware of what is happening around you.

REMAIN CALM – EVALUATE THE SITUATION-TAKE ACTION

Use your best judgement.

Call 9-1-1 whenever you feel that you or other people are in danger, or the solution to the problem exceeds your capabilities.

If you call 9-1-1, and if possible, send a person out to the highway to hail the Emergency response team and direct them to the appropriate area on the grounds. If you are told to evacuate the building, proceed calmly and orderly into the parking lot. Insure that all persons are outside. Do not go back into the building until someone of authority has given the "All Clear".

In each of the following situations, guidelines are given for the appropriate action to be taken. These are only guidelines and each situation may call for different actions. Use your best judgement and in every case, calling 9-1-1 is the BEST action.

MEDICAL EMERGENCY

Remain calm - Evaluate the situation - Take action.

Use first- aid first

Treat minor injuries from supplies in the first-aid kits Know who is trained and certified in first- aid and CPR If the problem is beyond your capabilities, call 9-1-1.

Be prepared to give the following information:

Name and phone number

Location

Number of people involved

Nature of injury or illnesss

If at all possible, stay on the line until help arrives.



While waiting for professional help, do NOT move the ill or injured person unless safety considerations necessitate movement or transportation to a safer location. Send a person outside to flag down the emergency response team.

When professional help arrives, allow them to take control of the situation. Stand by to assist, as needed.

If the spouse, parent, responsible adult or next-of-kin was not present during the emergency, someone on staff must notify them of the occurrence. Do not attempt to make a medical diagnosis or the problem. Tell them what happened and what steps are being taken for care.





'ROOTED AND GROUNDED IN LOVE': WESLEY'S EMPHASIS ON LOVE IS FOCUS **OF HERITAGE SUNDAY 2024** History course, podcast, liturgy, video and more available now

Madison, N.J. – Methodism's founder John Wesley has been called a theologian of love, writing and preaching about love as the heart of true faith. Heritage Sunday resources will highlight Wesley's emphasis on love in its 2024 theme, "Rooted and Grounded in Love." Heritage Sunday traditionally is recognized the third Sunday in May (May 19 this year), but congregations may choose to commemorate the special Sunday at any time.

"The people called Methodists cannot easily be defined. When we seek to celebrate our heritage, we recognize that we represent different cultures, varying theological interpretations and may not agree on some issues. However, at our core, we know that God's love is a common denominator and that we are to be beacons of this enduring love to all we meet," says Dr. Ashley Boggan D., general secretary of the General Commission on Archives and History (GCAH.) "This Heritage Sunday, all of us at the General Commission on Archives and History thank you and your United Methodist congregation for how you live out God's love in the world. Our hope is that in honoring our past, we may envision a future where all of God's children know they are loved and valued."

The General Commission on Archives and History has partnered with other United Methodist general agencies to provide a number of resources to local congregations in recognition of this special Sunday in the life of our denomination. JOY Quilters


