

SCUMC Finance Committee

For this month, I would like to briefly list some of the things the Committee does and present a new "Scorecard" showing where we stand financially.

Duties:

- o The Finance Committee meets at least 6 times each year.
- The financial statements (Income Statements and Balance Sheet) for the Church, Dayschool and "B" accounts are reviewed and compared to the annual Ad Board approved budget. Significant deviations of actual to the budgeted amount are reviewed.
- Provide for an annual audit of the church's financial records.
- Prepare an annual Church budget and adjust expenditures to revenue as needed. Present to Ad Board for approval. As may be needed, propose and present to the Ad Board any adjustments to the approved budgets.
- Prepare and adopt appropriate procedures to safeguard and protect church resources.
- Manage funds donated to the church.

Salmon Creek Financial Scorecard September 30, 2023

The financial stability of Salmon Creek United Methodist Church(SCUMC) remains strong. However, Operating Expenses (\$266,458) continue to exceed our Operating Revenue (\$226,330). This year (2023) has been a difficult transition year for the Church. We lost members attending services as well as pledge income during the first 3 months of the year. Attendance has begun to increase since the second quarter, but we still are running short to both our budget and prior levels of giving. The Church's investment position has regained some of the losses sustained during the economic downturn during the pandemic years.

SCUMC has benefitted substantially from several government programs instituted to assist in retaining employees during the pandemic. This assistance has allowed SCUMC to maintain a comfortable cash/investment position. It also will provide funds to launch programs designed to grow the Church in its mission as we look to the future.

- Seafarers Center Welcomes and provides services for international mariners while docked at the Port of Vancouver and Portland.
- 3. Safe Choice Shelter and services for women who are victims of domestic violence.
- Friends of the Carpenter A ministry that serves the homeless and less fortunate in Vancouver. Projects of 'wood' allows those participating to become friends around a table with Christ at the center.
- Open House Ministries A ministry that serves families who are in transition. A way for them to 'get back on their feet'. Providing them housing, counseling, goal setting and hope.
- Battle Ground HealthCare Salmon Creek is looking to provide support for this non-profit. faith-based clinic that provides health care to low income adults in Clark County.

As always, our mothers were correct In saying, "many hands make light work." We hope you will join us!









SUNDAY, OCTOBER 15TH, 2023

SCUMC CHARGE CONFERENCE MINUTES October 15, 2023

The Charge Conference was called to order at 11:30 a.m. by Admin Board Chairperson Lila DeBolt in the FMC Gym at SCUMC.

Welcome by Admin Board Chairperson Lila DeBolt.

Pastor Kim opened with prayer.

DS Kathleen Weber presided over the official vote at the Charge Conference.

Clergy Compensation: Dan Kingsley broke down the compensation for Pastor Kim. 5% increase over last year. Cash salary \$51,111; Housing Allowance \$27,043; Cash Salary plus Housing \$78,154 total compensation; Professional Expenses \$3,000. **Question from the audienc**e: Where does that put SCUMC in the conference? Minimum Conference salary is \$49,600; SCUMC is above the minimum.

Nominations Report: Lay Leadership and Admin Board Secretary positions are open. It was voted to allow filling these positions later with an Admin Board vote only.

United Methodist Church Declaration Of Candidacy Charge Conference or Equivalent Body Recommenda-tion: Dean Anderson has declared his candidacy for licensed or ordained ministry in the United Methodist Church. He is relocating his membership to SCUMC. **Question from the audience:** Is this a paid position. It is not a paid position.

Membership: The 2023 Annual Report for membership was reviewed. Pastor Kim led us in prayer for this membership listing.

The M.I.L.E. video sermons:

<u>M: Ministry that Matters</u>. Preached at Alaska Annual Conference opening session on June 3.

Ministry that Matters is about how churches and ministry settings can go outside of themselves to turn from the mirror and look out the window to be part of their communities. Specifically, Bridgeforth preached about the need to be engaged in the work of houselessness and health in our communities. *Watch on Vimeo, or click here to download.*

I: Itineration and location. Preached at the OR-ID Conference opening session on June 8.

Bishop Cedrick encouraged churches to be window people, not mirror people, and spoke about Itineration [and Location] as it relates to clergy who are called to lead and the ministry settings in which they serve. In his sermon he asked people to think about how we might address inequities in the itineration system within The United Methodist Church to best suit the pastor, church and community in which they are all serving.

L: Lay Ministry Enhancement. Preached at the PNW Conference opening session June 13.

At the opening of the PNW Conference, Bishop Bridgeforth preached about the importance of lay ministry enhancement as the church changes shape. Laity are already a critical resource in our congregations and ministry settings, but there is a need to equip and empower laity to be a more active voice in our churches and communities we serve.

E: Eliminating Racism. Preached at the GNW Area closing session on June 15.

As people of faith, we need to renew our efforts to eliminate the racism that is pervasive not only in society, but within our congregations, ministry settings and the institution of the church in general. During this sermon at the close of Annual Conference season, Bridgeforth laid out plans for resources to be developed to engage churches and ministry settings in meaningful discussions and evaluate practices that lead to institutional racism and societal harm.

Hello Fellow Members and Constituents of Salmon Creek United Methodist Church:

I'm Doug Lehrman, fellow member of Salmon Creek Church and member of the Board of Trustees of Family Promise of Clark County, an organization that helps homeless families with children in our community. As most of you already know, our church hosts families for this organization

about 4 times each year. Many of you have helped to support that hosting through your donations of money, food, and volunteer hours at the church when hosting happens. Karen Beilsmith does a great job as our volunteer coordinator for that ministry, assisted by many of you.

There has been some recent confusion about ways to financially support Family Promise, which recently held a fundraising dinner event on October 18th and also sought donations through a "Day of Giving" entitled, "From Homelessness to Hope". A number of you supported both of these events, which was greatly appreciated. Your support will help many families. In addition, our church donated some unused Covid support funds to FPCC for use in serving families. Executive Director Shane Scalf was in worship to thank us on October 8th. As some of you will recall, there was formerly a 'day of giving' countywide, operated by the Community Foundation of Southwest Washington, that was called "Give More 24". Family Promise participated in this day of giving and a number of you donated in that way. "Give More 24" was discontinued this year by the Community Foundation, which meant that Family Promise had to rely on outreach to donors through Facebook and other social media to support the recent "Day of Giving" appeal. Some of you may have missed the opportunity to donate in this way, thinking that "Give More 24" must be coming soon, as it used to do in September.

Stephen Ministry Training Opportunity



I leave my garden going as long as I can, usually until late October or whenever we get a killing frost. Then, I clear my beds, making sure I have only soil in the beds, not plant residue. For God's Garden, we lay down two layers of newspaper over each 4 by 8 foot plot, then put weed-free straw on top of the newspaper. The newspapers keep weeds from growing; you can till the newspaper under in the spring, or rake them off.
