

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
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Grace and peace to you, friends and family of Salmon Creek United Methodist Church!

ADMINISTRATIVE BOARD UPDATE

In keeping my promise to inform you of the happenings, activities and business of the Administrative Board, here are some highlights from the summer meetings. The members have been working very hard to keep the Church operations running as smoothly as possible.

The Safe Children's Ministry Policy was revised and approved for use.

The Listening and Visioning sessions were completed with great success. As a result, a new Mission Statement was created – "We are a welcoming United Methodist Church congregation that worships together as disciples of Jesus Christ, uniting in fellowship, missions and service." One more session is being planned to finalize this discussion, focusing on improved church management.

Day School operation was discussed with resolution of an occupancy issue.

Finances have been continuously monitored for income revenue and expenditures. We are currently under-budget for Pledge income, but staying stable or even under budget in some expenses. The 2024 Stewardship Campaign kicked off last month.

Missions and Committees have been highlighted during Sunday morning services with the Chairs or Team Leaders giving presentations about each area of leadership in the church. Knowledge of how and why each entity operates is provided to educate the congregation and hopefully, recruit some volunteers to serve on these various committees.

The Trustees continuously work to improve, clean, replace and manage the facilities. New parking lot lights were installed, a new computer in the Media booth was put in place, the music room roof leak was fixed – just to name a few of the many tasks performed to keep our church operational, safe and beautiful.

A welcome dinner for Pastor Kim was held in July. What a fun time for fellowship and getting acquainted with our new leader – everyone enjoyed the cookout!

Discussion has been on-going concerning use of the Good Samaritan Funds. A decision was recently made regarding this. Please see upcoming news.

VBS was planned and executed with Tiffiney doing an outstanding job as the Director. Plans are already being made for next year.

Rally Sunday was planned by the COM. What a great way to gather information about our Church!

Missions served lunches at Sarah J. Anderson School this summer.

- The Membership records are being updated with great care, thanks to Sally DuPree. She is also assembling a new church-wide Directory for all members to have.
- Youth went on a mission/fun trip. Gavin is doing a great job in leading our young adults.
- A new agreement for Building Use Fees was approved. Our facilities the Chapel, Main Building, FMC and FH are being rented for a variety of occasions with modest compensation.
- Plans are being made for the Annual Charge Conference to be held on October 15th. Reports, evaluations, pastor salary, and nominations for 2024 leadership will be presented for approval. District Superintendent Kathleen Weber will be present to give the sermon that morning, as well as lead the Conference.
- A school supply drive was held for our Day School and Gaiser Middle School with great success.
- Vacancies are being filled for next year's Leadership teams.
 - An informational Membership Class was held for interested persons who want to join SCUMC. Larry Siewert gave a history of the church with Pastor Kim talking about what church membership means here.
- Updated Emergency Plans and Facilities Orientation were presented to all staff, with copies in the church office, Day School and FMC.
- Many activities are being planned for the fall and holidays. Please check your calendars often and plan to attend.

So, as you can see, we have been BUSY!! It is with great pride, enthusiasm, faith and love of God that we work to provide these opportunities for the congregation. If you have any questions or concerns, please don't hesitate to reach out to any one of us. We are here to serve you and our Church.

GOOD SAMARITAN FUND

The Administrative Board has been busy developing a working policy for distribution of the funds in the Good Samaritan Fund. There is a substantial amount of money in this fund that has been donated by our very generous congregation. We would like to inform you on how we are proposing to make it available for good usage.

First of all, a portion of the fund will be given to the Family Promise Cares Program. This is a program that is dedicated to the prevention of homelessness by assisting with housing/rent costs, utility payments, or application fees when seeking housing. Since we already have a missional relationship with Family Promise, and in keeping with Bishop Bridgeforth's M.I.L.E. initiative, we felt this was an excellent way to use these funds. By looking out our window into the community, we can be more in-tune with addressing the current needs of homelessness around us. Our work with Habitat for Humanity also defines our spirit-led mission in addressing the homelessness crisis. Presentation of the donation check will be given to Family Promise in October.

Secondly, we want to be able to help our congregation in need with the remaining portion of these funds. Are you experiencing a hardship such as loss of a job, housing/rent payment deficits, utility payment, a medical illness or disability, food needs, or transportation costs? We want to help you and we have the resources to assist you. Please see the Distribution Policy that follows this article to start your conversation.

Thirdly, our food pantry continues to serve our community in need. The shelves are full of cans, boxes and bottles, ready to be packed in a bag when someone comes to the church looking for this assistance. This is a great ministry that we can provide to anyone in need. While our pantry is full of food now, be on the lookout for ways you can contribute to keep this ministry going strong.

At any time throughout the year, you may contribute to the Good Samaritan Fund. Your monetary donations are certainly welcome. Giving so that others may benefit is a heartwarming, Christ-like action that will give joy and comfort abundantly. Please consider giving to this fund so we may continue to provide assistance when a brother or sister needs help.

SALMON CREEK UNITED METHODIST CHURCH GOOD SAMARITAN FUND Distribution Policy

PURPOSE

To inform the congregation of this fund, its purpose and to fairly distribute funds for community outreach in an effective and secure manner, as well as for personal hardship assistance within the church body. Assets from this account may be used to re-stock the existing food pantry when needed, and for additional expenditures whenever deemed appropriate by the Pastor.

This Fund exists to assist attendees or members who are experiencing any hardship such as loss of job, medical illness or disability, housing/rent deficits, utility payment, food, or other need deemed appropriate by the Pastor. Monetary assistance will be provided to ease the hardship. All conversations and decisions will remain discreet and confidential.

Larger sum donation(s) from this fund may be given to local charitable organization(s) to assure proper usage of the assets. This will require a unanimous vote by the Administrative Board. This is another missional opportunity to serve our community in need.

No monetary donations will be given to outside individuals who present at SCUMC seeking aid. Food bags will be given to those seeking this assistance.

WHO QUALIFIES

Any member or attendee of SCUMC who has been an active participant in our church fellowship through regular attendance, service on a committee or ministry, or currently is on staff.

PROCESS

The individual seeking assistance will notify either the Pastor directly, the Office Administrator, or the Chairman of the Administrative Board. This may be achieved by an in-person conversation, phone call, letter or email. The Pastor and Chairman of the Admin Board will meet to discuss the validity of the request and determine the appropriateness of funds to be given. An in-person discussion with the Pastor may be required, depending on each situation. The Pastor will then notify the individual of the decision and distribute funds accordingly. Again, all conversations and transactions will be discreet and confidential.

RE-FUNDING

At any time throughout the year, attendees or members may contribute to the Good Samaritan Fund with monetary donations. Checks may be placed in the offering plates on Sunday mornings with a designation of "Good Samaritan Fund" on the memo line. In-person donations may be given to the Office Administrator or to the Financial Secretary.

When appropriate, food donations may also be made when the need arises.




<u>Family Promise</u> - we will host Family promise again on Oct. 22 - 29, sign up to bring a meal, serve as a host or be a volunteer driver.




YOUTH MINISTRY

COUNTERS/MEDIA TEAM

MINISTRY MATTERS

Media Team and Counters

Two very necessary and important ministries in our Church...two among many!...are the folks who count our offerings and those who do the sound and video each Sunday in support of the service. It behooves us to know a little bit about the services provided by these "unsung heroes."

MEDIA TEAM

Every Sunday, two members of the Media Team come in a little before service begins to set-up for sound and video presentations. For the sound portion, they set up microphones, turn on speakers, and prepare other sound devices (such as the Pastor's lavalier) to ensure the correct and appropriate amplification of the service for those present in the Sanctuary, as well as those joining from home. Part of the job is adjusting the sound-board in just the right manner to ensure that all can hear the various speakers, vocalists, and instruments which comprise our usual Sunday Worship. In the same manner, the other member of the team is setting up the computer to manage the various cameras, projectors, and computer-generated video for projection on the screen in the Sanctuary as well as for broadcast to those watching over the internet (Normally 10-15 people on any Sunday). Not limited to Sundays, the dedicated members of this team ensure Sanctuary and livestream support on holidays and for various special needs such as memorial services.

THE COUNTERS

Counters exist in every Methodist Church for the sole purpose of having an assigned, known group of people to count funds coming into the church. The Counters, so named because they "count" the dollars and cents donated on Sunday mornings, identify the source and amount of all donations and then assign them to the correct "fund" in the church (ex: Trustees, Youth, General Fund) while subsequently depositing those funds in the church account at the bank. They also have the responsibility to ensure all church funds are documented in an assigned computer program. Generally speaking, they work one day per week in support of the usual Sunday collections, but they are also responsible for receiving funds from various church activities as they occur (Basket Auction, for instance). The Counters group includes the Church Financial Secretary and selected members of the congregation.

Having specific, trusted, and responsible members of the congregation assigned to the specific functions in our church ensures our church operates smoothly and predictably.

Today a Reader, Tomorrow a Leader Become a Volunteer Reading Mentor

In Clark County, approximately 45% of 3rd graders do not read at grade level and approximately 3,500 kids in Clark County need reading support. 75% of children who enter 4th grade behind in reading, never catch up. 60% of young men entering prison cannot read above a 3rd grade level. Study after study confirms that at-risk kids who do not read at grade level by 9 years old (3rd/4th grade) are destined for delinquency.

Read Northwest is a non-profit organization that is launching a Volunteer Reading Mentor Program at Pleasant Valley Primary. Read Northwest's mission is to get children reading at grade level by the 3rd grade. We partner with schools, non-profit organizations, faith-based communities and individuals.





- Safe Choice Shelter and services for women who are victims of domestic violence.
- Friends of the Carpenter A ministry that serves the homeless and less fortunate in Vancouver. Projects of 'wood'
 allows those participating to become friends around a table with Christ at the center.
- Open House Ministries A ministry that serves families who are in transition. A way for them to 'get back on their feet'. Providing them housing, counseling, goal setting and hope.
- Battle Ground HealthCare Salmon Creek is looking to provide support for this non-profit, faith-based clinic that
 provides health care to <u>low income</u> adults in Clark County.

Matthew Compton Wins David Davidson Composition Contest

The David Davidson Composition Contest Committee met earlier this week and have chosen Matthew Compton as the winner for his work, Soundscapes. The Committee also recognized composer Caleb Onstead with Honorable Mention for his piece, The Crucible.



The Davidson Composition Competition Committee is an anonymous group appointed by the executive director. The Committee reviewed ten entries in this year's competition.

The David Davidson Composition Fund was created in October 2009 to encourage the creation of original works for advanced handbell ensembles. Works selected for awards from this fund illustrate the high musical standards embodied by Maestro David Davidson. Davidson was a nationally recognized church music, choral, and handbell clinician, who was instrumental in creating Distinctly Bronze, Handbell Musicians of America's event for highly accomplished handbell musicians to ring advanced literature.

Previous recipients of the David Davidson Composition Competition are Ron Mallory (2010) for *The Stars Await*, Anthony Chapman (2011) for *Black Belling*, David Tiedman (2014) for Cascades, and Robert Riker (2016) for Wonder-Dance.

Matthew Compton's Soundscapes will be published by AGEHR Publishing, Inc., and performed on March 3, 2024, at Distinctly Bronze East's 25th Anniversary concert in New Bern, North Carolina. This performance will be conducted by Emily Li and livestreamed. Compton will receive a cash prize of \$1,500, and transportation/lodging so he may be present for the premiere performance in New Bern.

Compton is a native of Colorado Springs and has been composing, arranging, and conducting music for handbells since 2007 when he was in the eighth grade. He had his first composition published at the age of fifteen, making him one of the youngest published handbell composers. Compton graduated from Concordia University Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Music with an emphasis in Composition and Conducting. Now based out of Vancouver, Washington, he is the music director of the Bells of the Cascades in Portland, Oregon, Director of Music Ministries at Salmon Creek Church in Vancouver, and recently has become the new Artistic Director of Pikes Peak Ringers in Colorado Springs, CO. In addition to being a guest clinician at handbell festivals across the country, his music is frequently used at local and national handbell festivals, like the Bay View Week of Handbells and Distinctly Bronze East and West. He has been the recipient of the Donald E. Allured Composition Award.








