



Just for clarification: In my presentations I am using YHVH (Yahuwah) instead of LORD, which is a title and not a name and I am using Yahusha instead of Jesus, which is not a translation but a transliteration and really has no meaning, either in Hebrew nor in English! YHVH (Yahuwah) and Yahusha are the actual original names and the true nature and character of them.

“Thy will be done in earth, as it is
in heaven!”

**Why or when would that be
the most difficult prayer?
Maybe, when I am not truly
converted?
Maybe, when self is still in
control?
Could it be lack of trust? Lack
of commitment or simply
unbelief?**





It is easy to pray and to rejoice, when everything goes well, runs smooth, when there are no problems, when you have a good income and are healthy and well, but

What if I lost my job, because of my conviction? *(like Sabbath or Feast days?)*

What if I get seriously sick and don't know why *(like Job?)*

What if I have an accident without my fault?

What if I lose a loved one?



What if people disappoint me, or betray me, or take advantage of me?



What if I am persecuted for righteousness sake?



Would I still be willing to pray **“Thy will be done!”**?



What did Yahusha mean, when He instructed us to pray that the Father's will be done?

He modeled this prayer for us as a way of telling us that when we pray to the Father, we should ask Him to handle every situation in the way that He deems best.

How Yahuwah chooses to handle something is His will, and Yahusha was teaching us in the Yahuwah's Prayer that we should always pray for HIS will to be done in all situations. That means He is in control, and it is His decision, His will. Praying for Yahuwah's will to be done is an act of obedience!

When we pray, "Thy will be done," we can also ask YHVH to reveal His will clearly to us. We can pray with a humble heart, putting our own will aside and always seeking HIS will. Before each step we take, we can know that HE will honor us by making His will known, so that we can be obedient to it.

"Thy will shall be done," I say gladly,
When there are no heartaches, sorrows or pain.
But when hours come that pass slowly and sadly
I cannot speak those words again.

**When my heart bleeds and my soul faints away,
When each breath turns into a heavy sigh;
I find it unspeakably hard to pray,
"Thy will shall be done, O YAH on High."
I feel like screaming, "Does it have to be this
way?
No Abba! No Abba! This is neither fair nor just."
I resist your will and do not want to obey,
For I have not yet learned how to trust.**

**In rebellion my heart cries out,
"My Father, is that what love is all about?
"Please forgive my unfaithfulness," repenting, I plead.
"Because Your Love is revealed in word and in deed."**

It is necessary for each individual personally to take a spiritual inventory of his/her own life and then to take a decided stand for Yahusha, the Messiah.

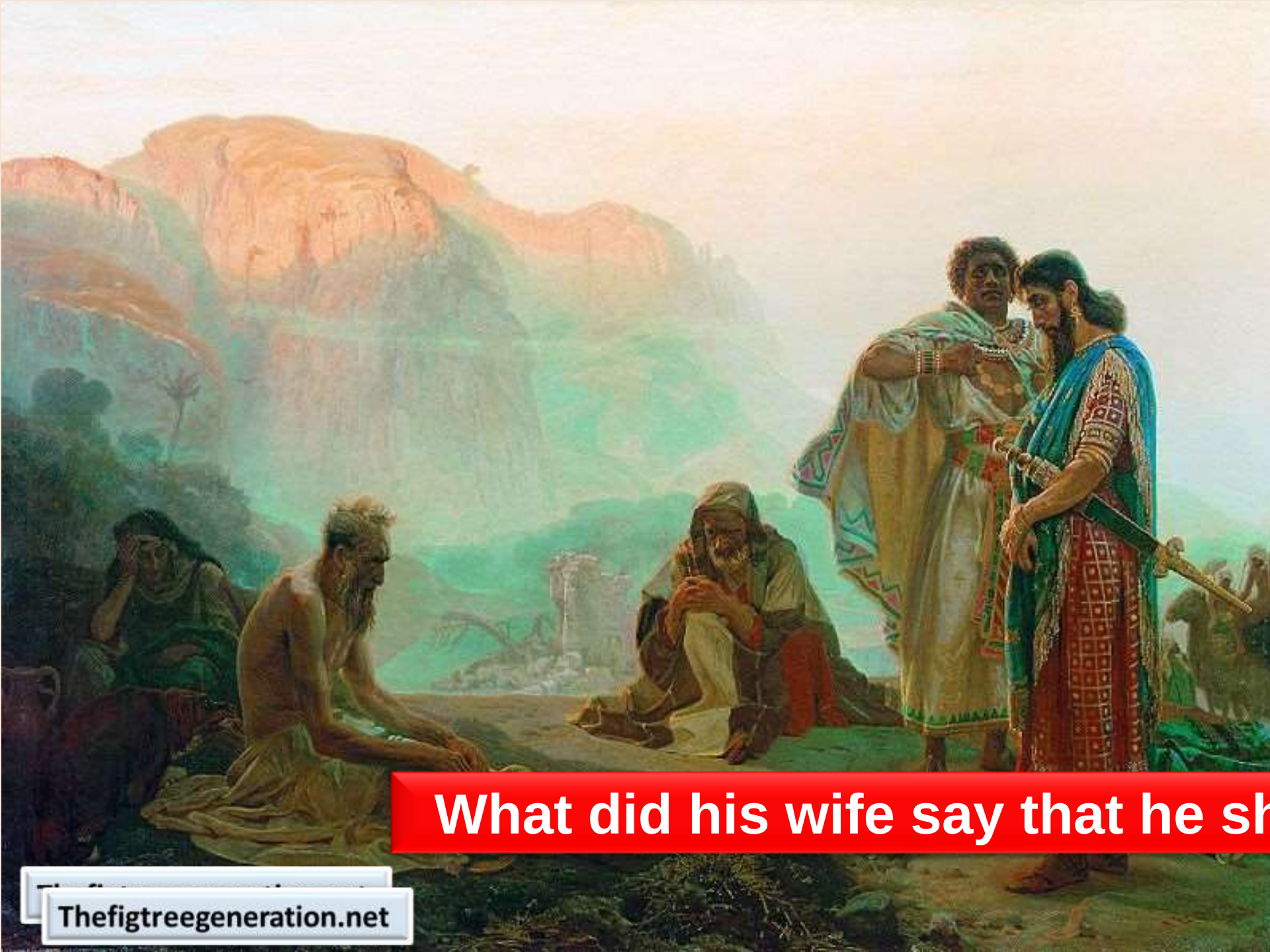

Did Job have reasons to be questioning Elohim's leading? Was it his fault to be in that situation?

What did his wife say that he should do?

The Bible says in Job 2:9 KJV **“Then said his wife unto him, Dost thou still retain thine integrity? Curse Elohim and die.”**



How completely, unreservedly and willingly did Yahusha submit to the will of His Father? In Matthew 26:42 we read those words spoken in Gethsemane:

"He went away again the second time, and prayed, saying, O my Father, if this cup may not pass away from me, except I drink it, thy will be done." Matthew 26:42 KJV

Did Yahusha know what the will of His father was?

Did he know the reason he came to this earth?

Did He know the price He will have to pay in order to do the will of His father?

Was it easy for him?

Scripture states in Matthew 26:39 that “Yahusha fell on his face, and prayed, saying, O my Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me: nevertheless not as I will, but as thou [wilt].”

Actually three times He uttered that prayer. Three times humanity shrunk from the last, crowning sacrifice, but He made the decision to save man at any cost and to submit to the will of HIS Father.

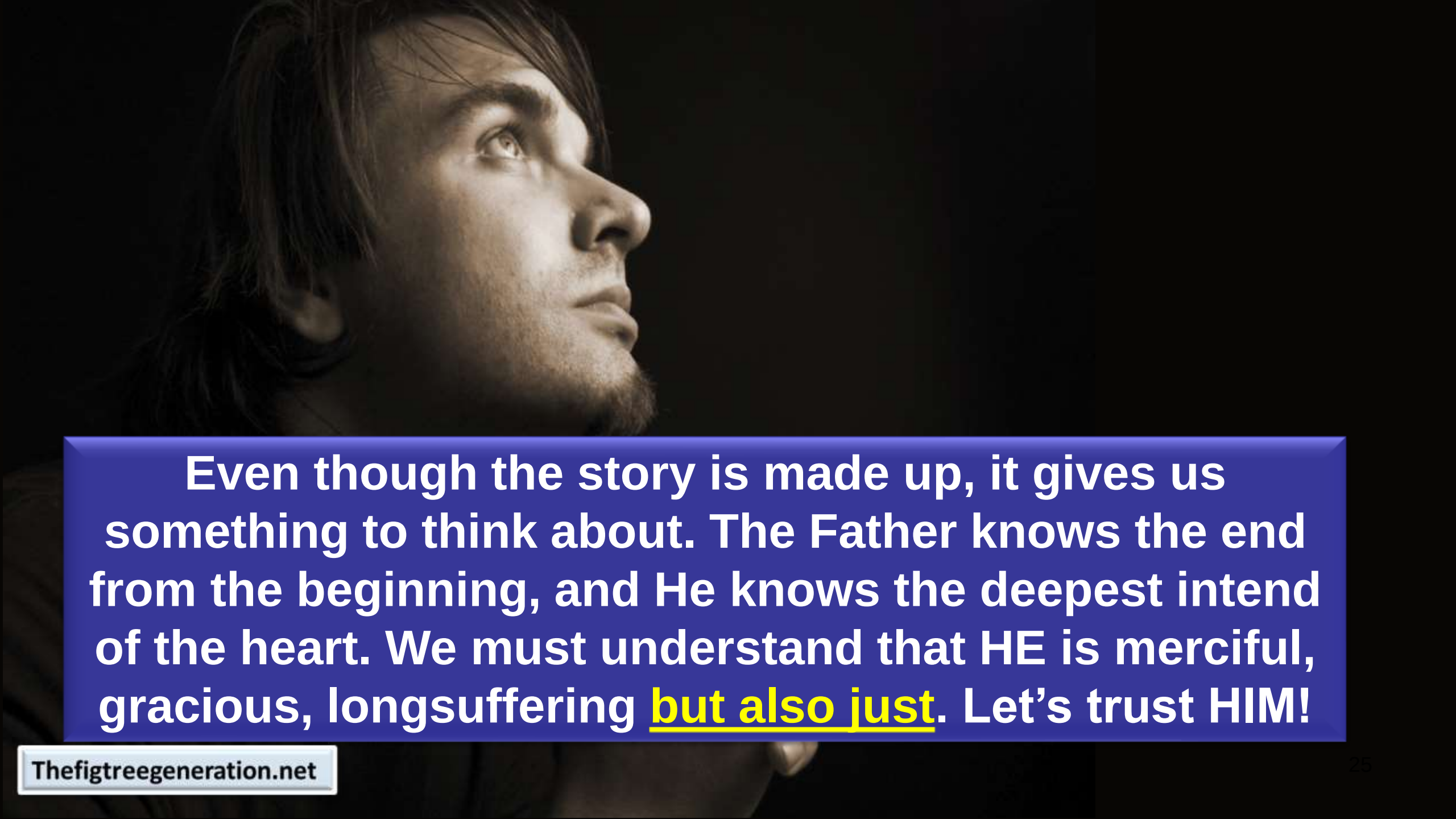
Are we willing to submit to YHVH?

Sometimes we question the leading of Elohim in the affairs of our lives and they seem strange to us, as we can see from the following example:

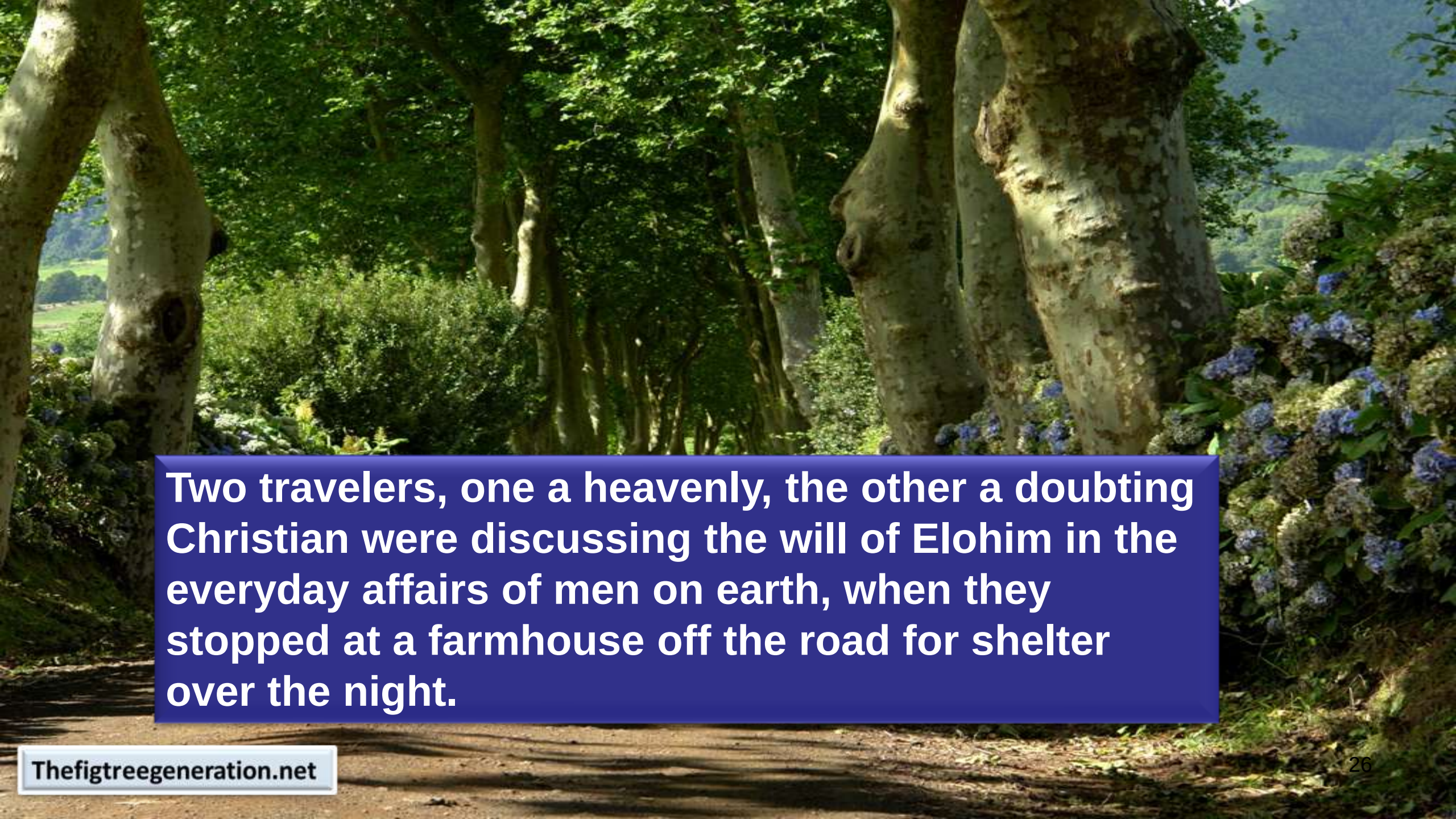

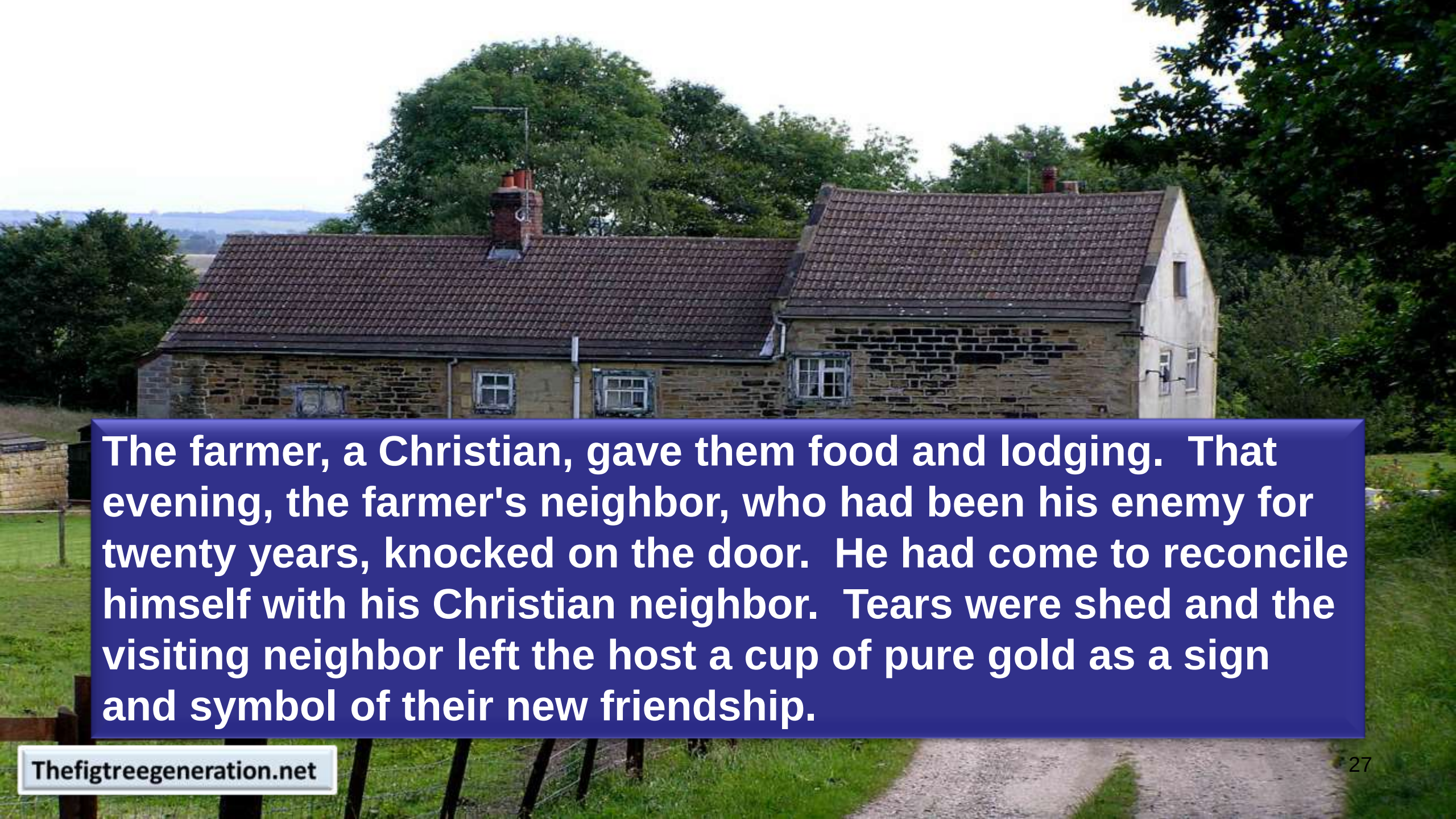
**Let's look at a

There are many times I do not understand why things happen they way they do. But should that make me question the Father's love and loose faith in Yahusha?

Scripture states in Isaiah 55:8-9: "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith YHVH. 9. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts." KJV

**What kind of thoughts
has the Father about each
one of us?**

**Jeremiah 29:11: "For I know the thoughts that I
think toward you, saith YHVH, thoughts of peace,
and not of evil, to give you an expected end." KJV**

These were Jeremiah's words to the captured Jews, but they apply just as well to any one of us today, I mean individually! Should we be glad to know that the Heavenly Father has only the good and the best for us in mind? Does that knowledge make it easier to trust HIM and to have peace of mind?

We know of one man in the Bible that once had a problem during his life to submit to Elohim's will! Who was it? It was King Hezekiah!



Hezekiah instituted various reforms for the up-building of the spiritual and temporal interests of the kingdom. It states in 2. Chronicles 31:20-21 KJV:
“... Hezekiah ...wrought [that which was] good and right and truth before YHVH his Elohim ...



...And in every work that he began, . . . he did it with all his heart, and prospered." "He trusted in Yahuwah Elohim of Israel, . . . and departed not from following Him, but kept His commandments, which Yahuwah commanded Moses. And Yahuwah was with him; and he prospered." Verses 20, 21 KJV;

What a testimony!

Then we read the following story in 2. Kings 20:1-11: "In those days was Hezekiah sick unto death. And the prophet Isaiah the son of Amoz came to him, and said unto him, Thus saith YHVH Set thine house in order; for thou shalt die and not live.

2. Then he turned his face to the wall, and prayed unto YHVH, saying,

3. I beseech thee, O YHVH, remember now how I have walked before thee in truth and with a perfect heart, and have done that which is good in thy sight. And Hezekiah wept sore.

4. And it came to pass, afore Isaiah was gone out into the middle court, that the word of Yahuwah came to him, saying,

5. Turn again, and tell Hezekiah, the captain of my people, Thus saith YHVH, the Elohim of David thy father, I have heard thy prayer, I have seen thy tears: behold, I will heal thee; on the third day thou shalt go up into the house of YHVH.

**6. And I will add unto thy days fifteen years;
and I will deliver thee and this city out of the
hand of the king of Assyria; and I will defend
this city for mine own sake, and for my servant
David's sake.**

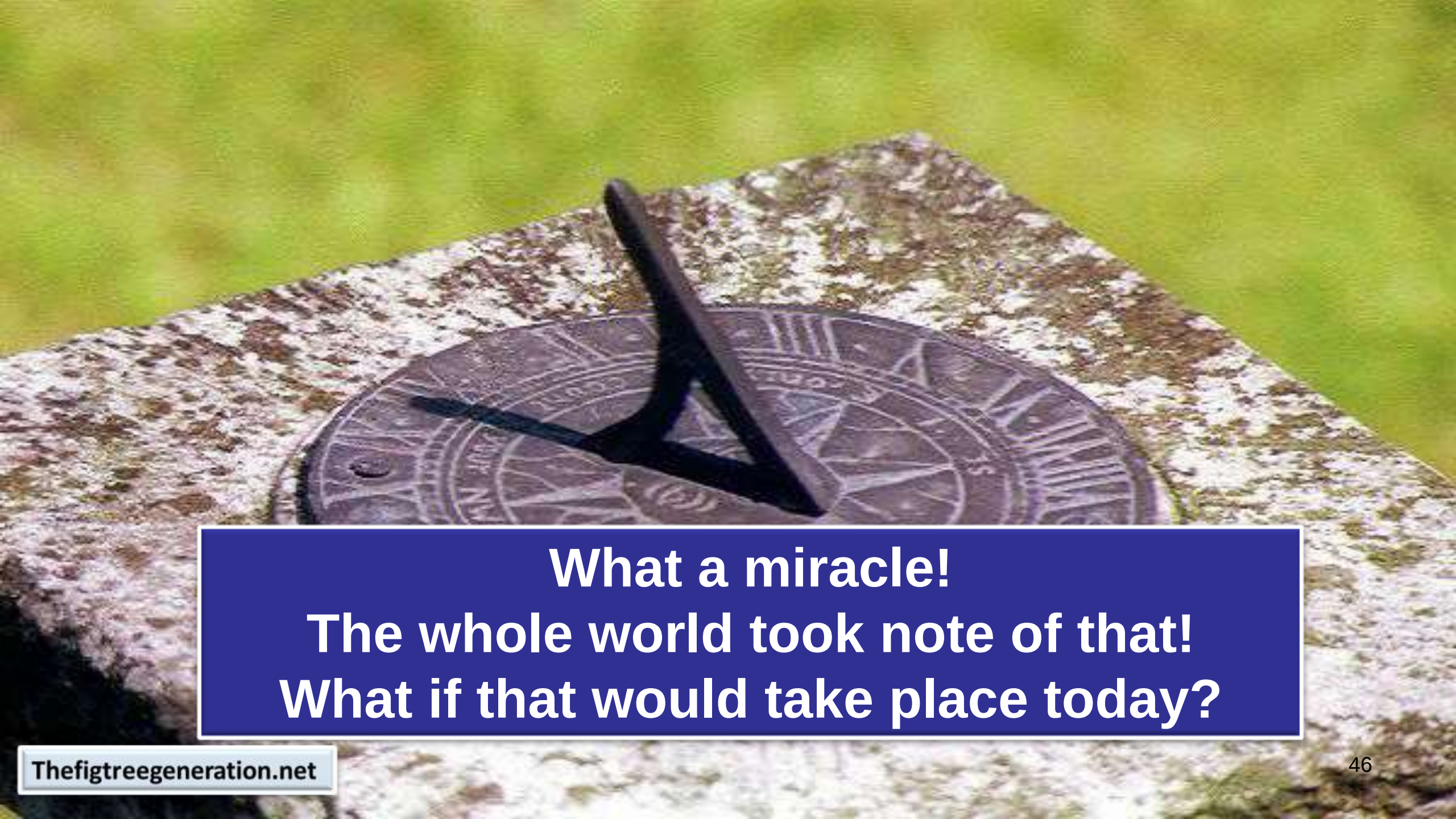
**7. And Isaiah said, Take a lump of figs. And they
took and laid it on the boil, and he recovered.**

**8. And Hezekiah said unto Isaiah, What shall be
the sign that YHVH will heal me, and that I shall
go up into the house of YHVH the third day?**

9. And Isaiah said, This sign shalt thou have of YHVH, that YHVH will do the thing that he hath spoken: shall the shadow go forward ten degrees, or go back then degrees?

10. And Hezekiah answered, It is a light thing for the shadow to go down ten degrees; nay but let the shadow return backward ten degrees.

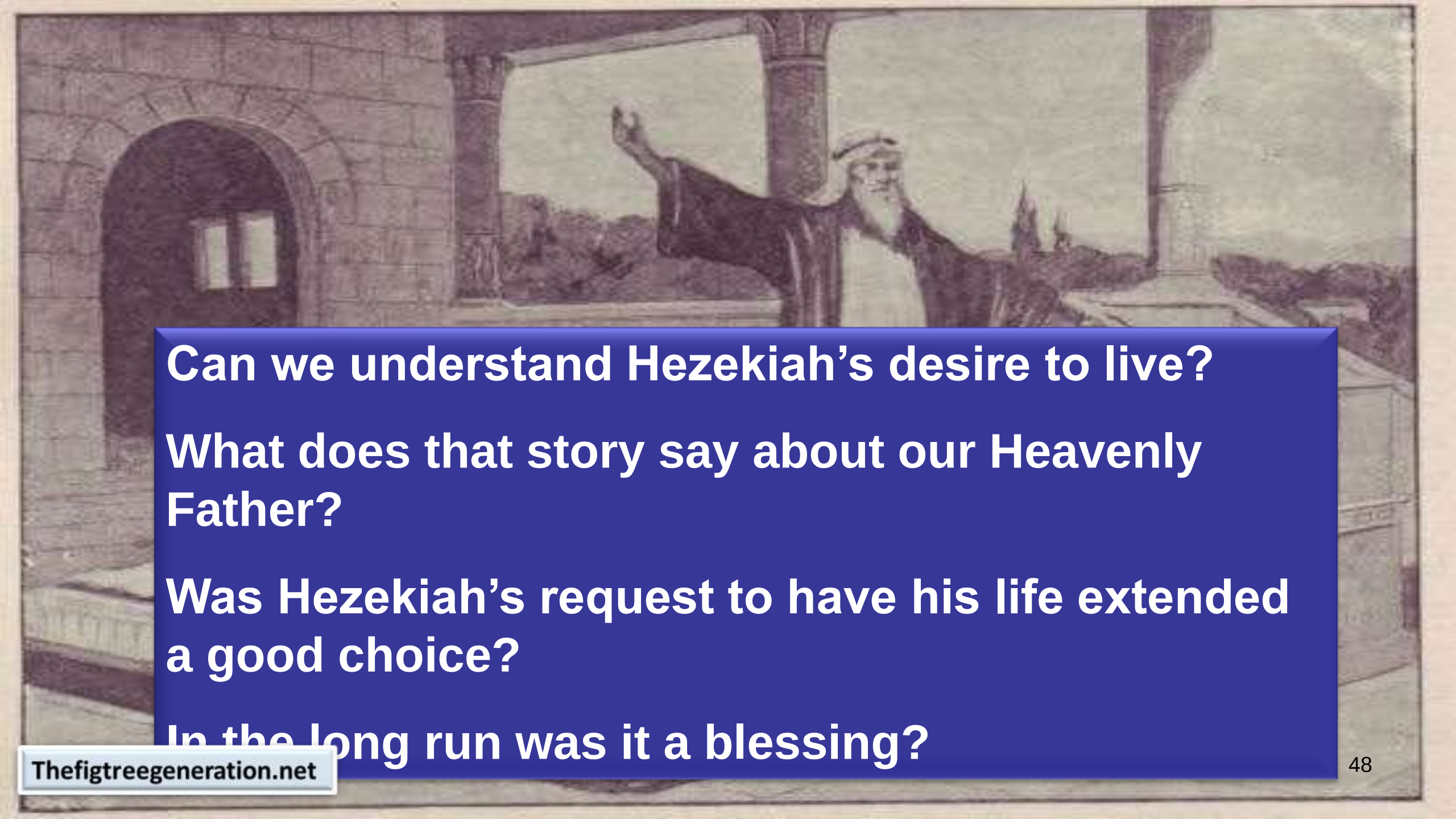
11. And Isaiah the prophet cried unto YHVH: and he brought the shadow ten degrees backwards, by which it had gone down in the dial of Ahaz.” KJV

2Kings
20:11-18,:**

"At that time the king of Babylon sent letters and a present unto Hezekiah: for he had heard that Hezekiah had been sick. (How did he know? – Because the sun went backward)

13. And Hezekiah hearkened unto them, and shewed them ALL the house of his precious things, the silver, and the ...



... gold, and the spices, and the precious ointment, and all the house of his armor, and all that was found in his treasures; there was nothing in his house, nor in all his dominion, that Hezekiah shewed them not. 14. Then came Isaiah the prophet unto king Hezekiah, and said unto him, What said these men?



...And from whence came they unto thee? And Hezekiah said they are come from a far country, even from Babylon.

15. And he said what have they seen in thine house?

And Hezekiah answered, All the things that are in mine house have they seen: there is nothing among my treasures that I have not shewed them.



...10. And Isaiah said unto Hezekiah,
Hear the word of YHVH,
17. Behold, the days come, that all that
is in thine house, and that which thy
fathers have laid up in store unto this
day, shall be carried into Babylon:
nothing shall be left, saith YHVH .



...18. And of thy sons that shall issue from thee, which thou shalt beget, shall they take away; and they shall be eunuchs in the palace of the king of Babylon."

“What was Hezekiah's problem
at this point?”**

“What did he fail to do?”

“What should he have done?”



**He should have given the honor and praise to YHVH!
This was an once in a lifetime opportunity to point
these seekers after truth from the plains of Chaldea to
the Creator of the universe, the living Elohim of
Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. What a time to witness!**

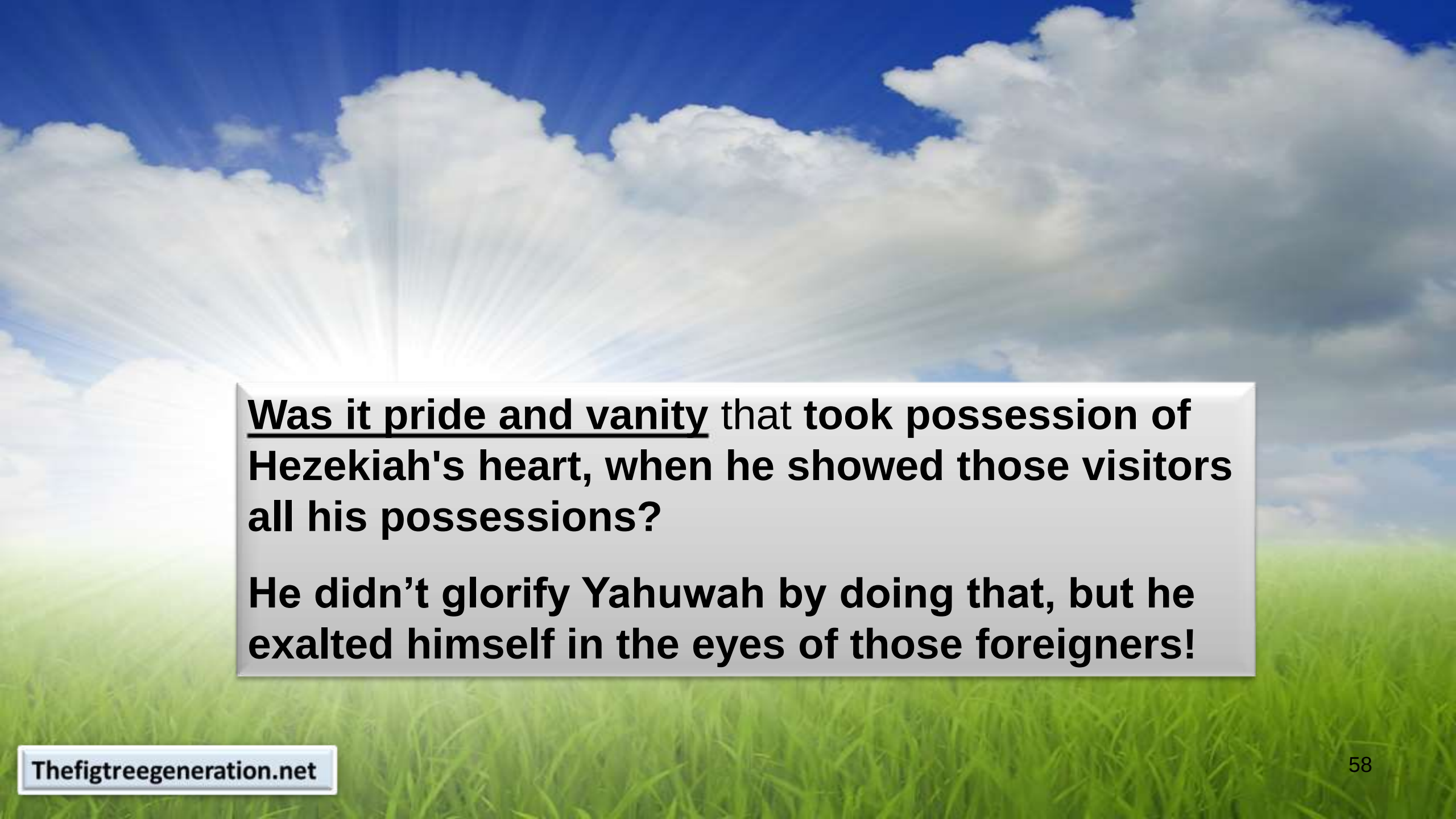
**The question is:
“Why didn't he do it?”**





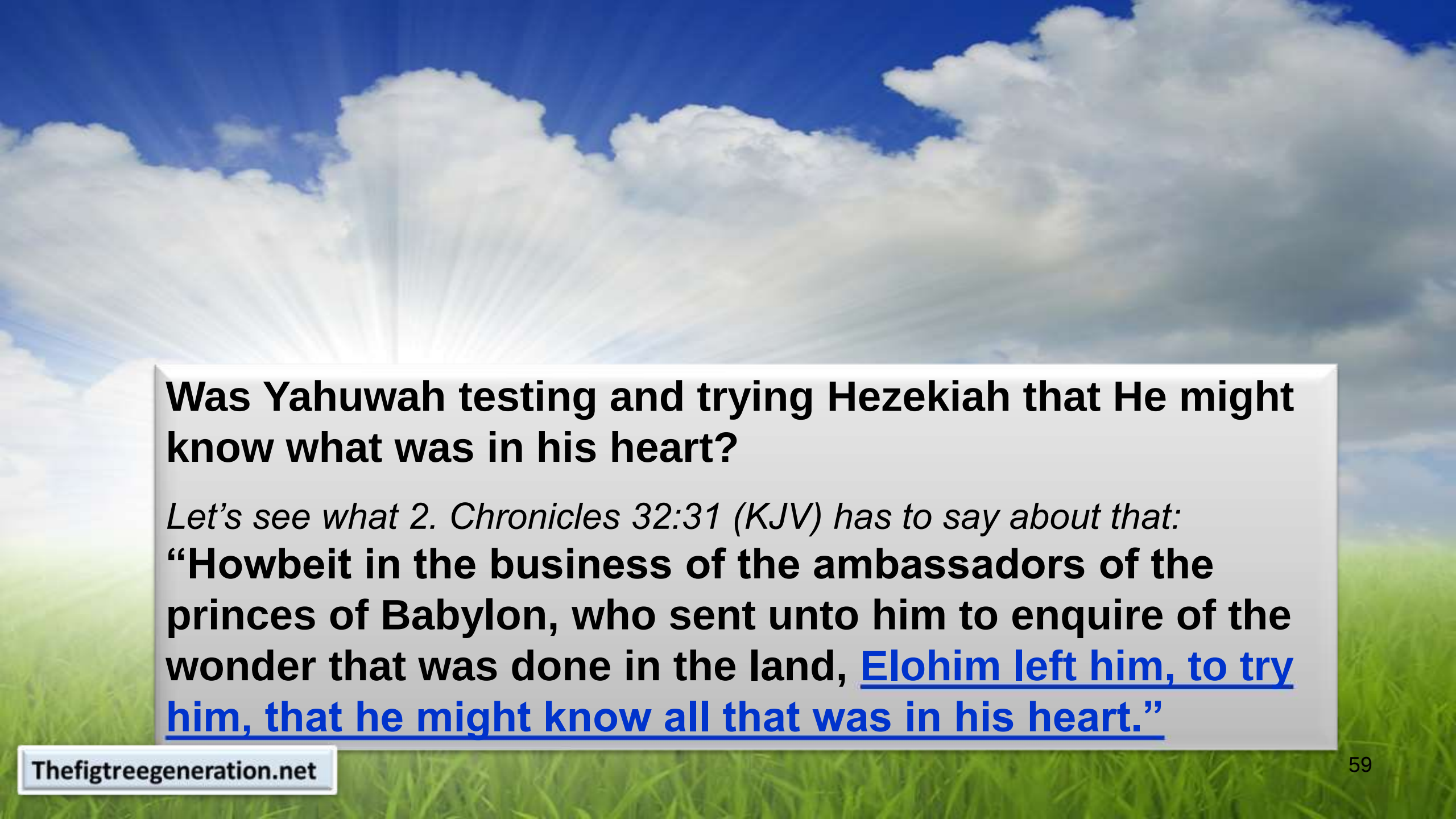
And Vanity!

He didn't glorify Yahuwah by doing that, but he exalted himself in the eyes of those foreigners!



Was Yahuwah testing and trying Hezekiah that He might know what was in his heart?

Let's see what 2. Chronicles 32:31 (KJV) has to say about that:

“Howbeit in the business of the ambassadors of the princes of Babylon, who sent unto him to enquire of the wonder that was done in the land, Elohim left him, to try him, that he might know all that was in his heart.”

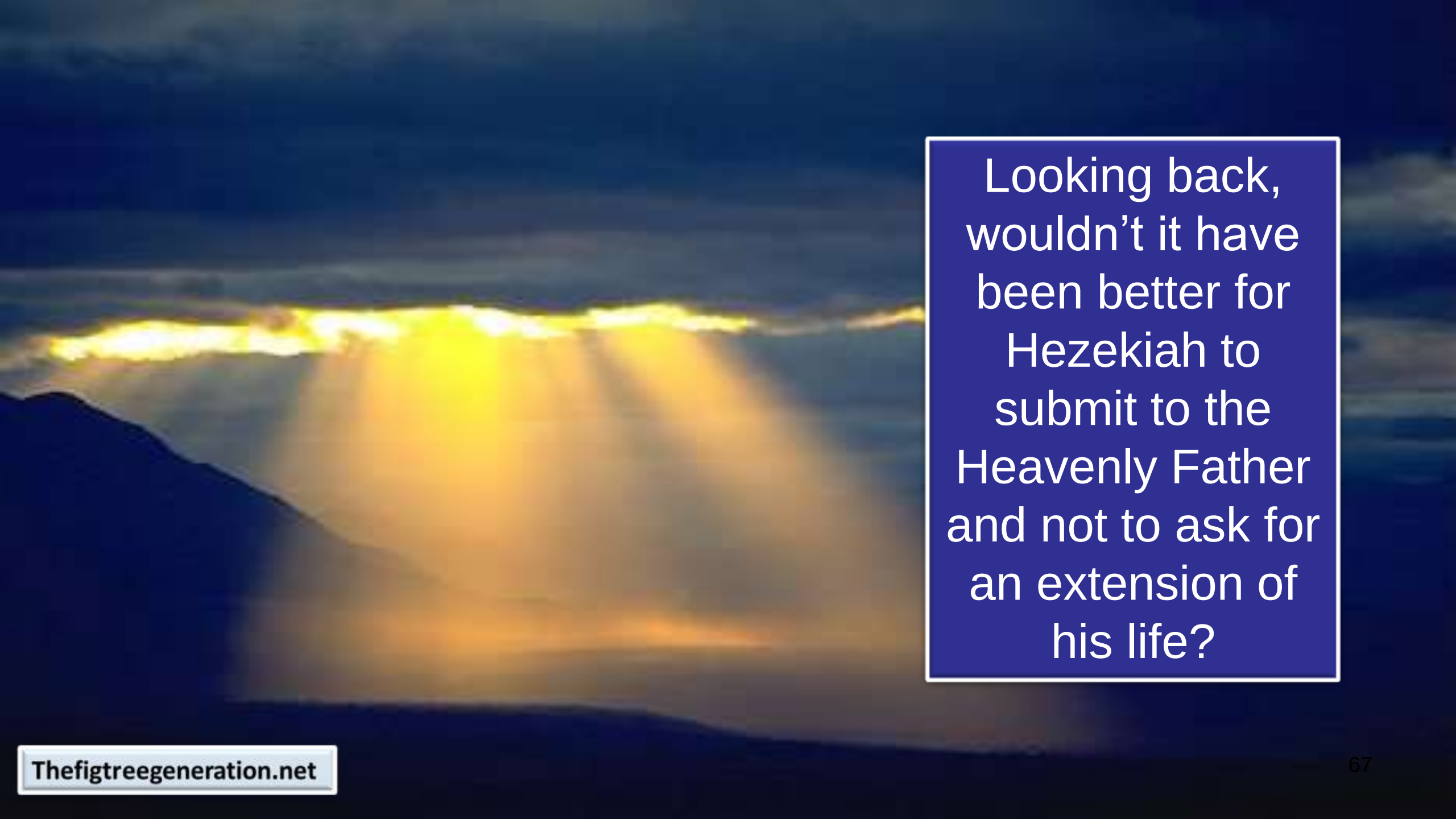

Hezekiah humbled himself for the pride of his heart, both he and the inhabitants of Jerusalem, so that the wrath of Yahuwah came not upon them in the days of Hezekiah. 2 Chronicles 32:26

But the damage was done!

When we pray “Thy will be done in
earth, as it is in heaven!” *Matthew 6:10*
KJV

Have we asked the question:

What is His will?

According to 1Tim 2:3-4 “For this is good and acceptable in the sight of Elohim, our Savior; 4. **Who will have all men to be saved and to come unto the knowledge of the truth.” KJV**

It is the Father’s will that everyone will be saved, that everyone receives eternal life and come to a knowledge of the truth! However, that is only possible through the one.....

“Who is the way, the truth, and the life!”

John 14:6 KJV

And according to Psalm 119:142 the truth is what? **“Thy righteousness is an everlasting righteousness, and thy Torah is the truth!”**

To lay him to rest, because he had a clean record, the extension of his life created a problem for him and for the nation. The Father knew about all that beforehand.

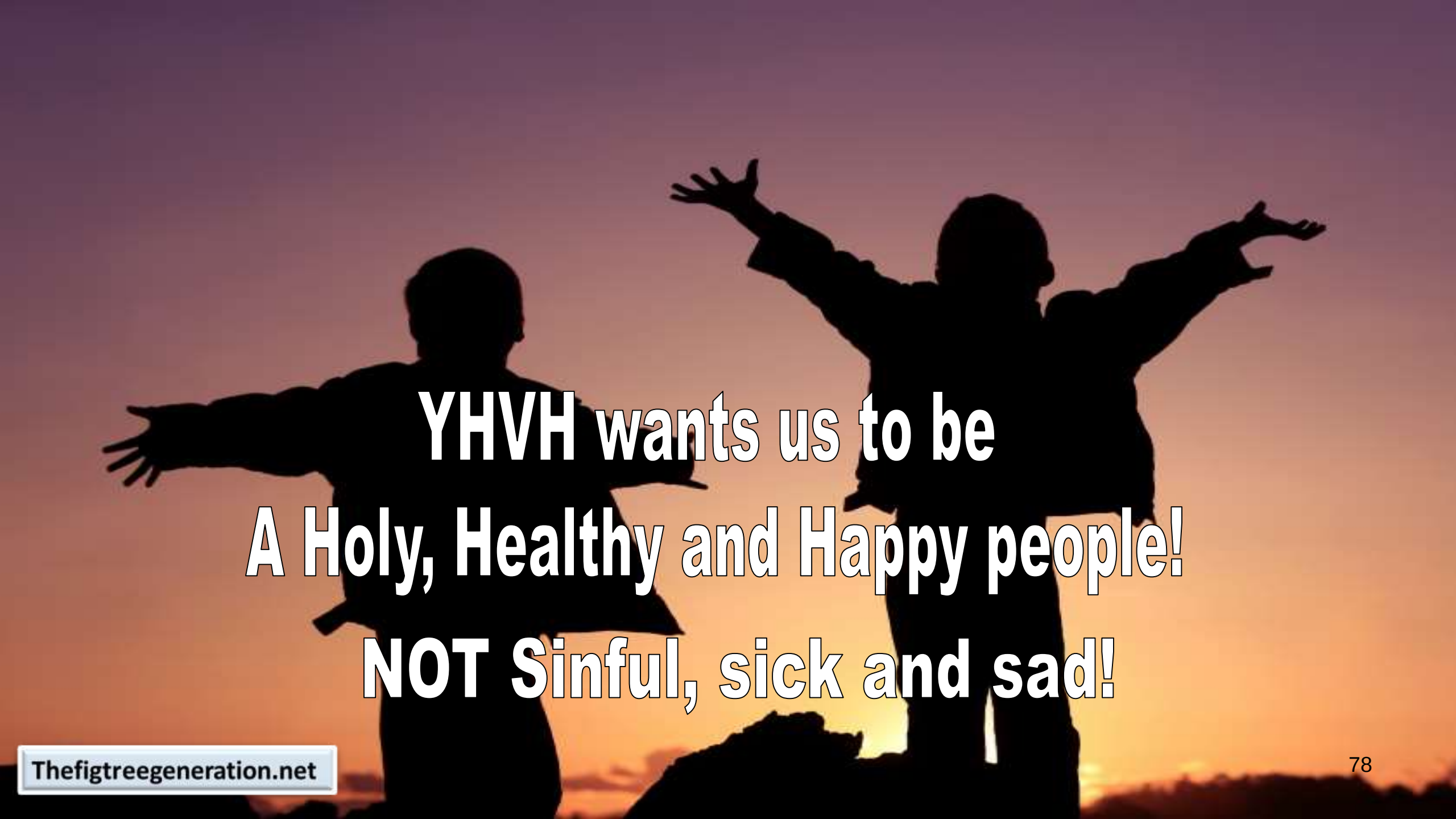

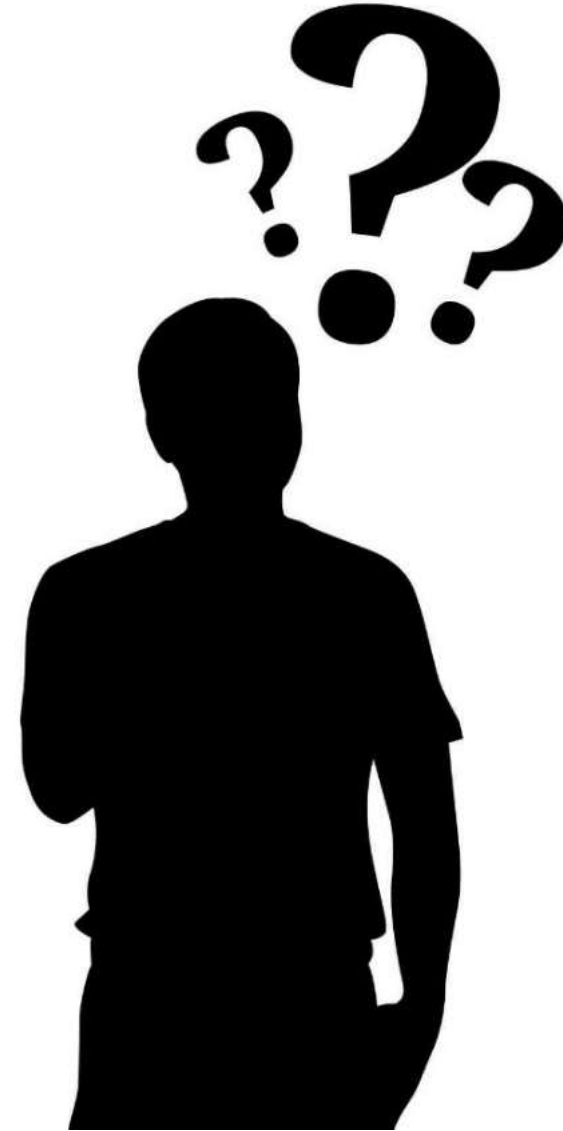

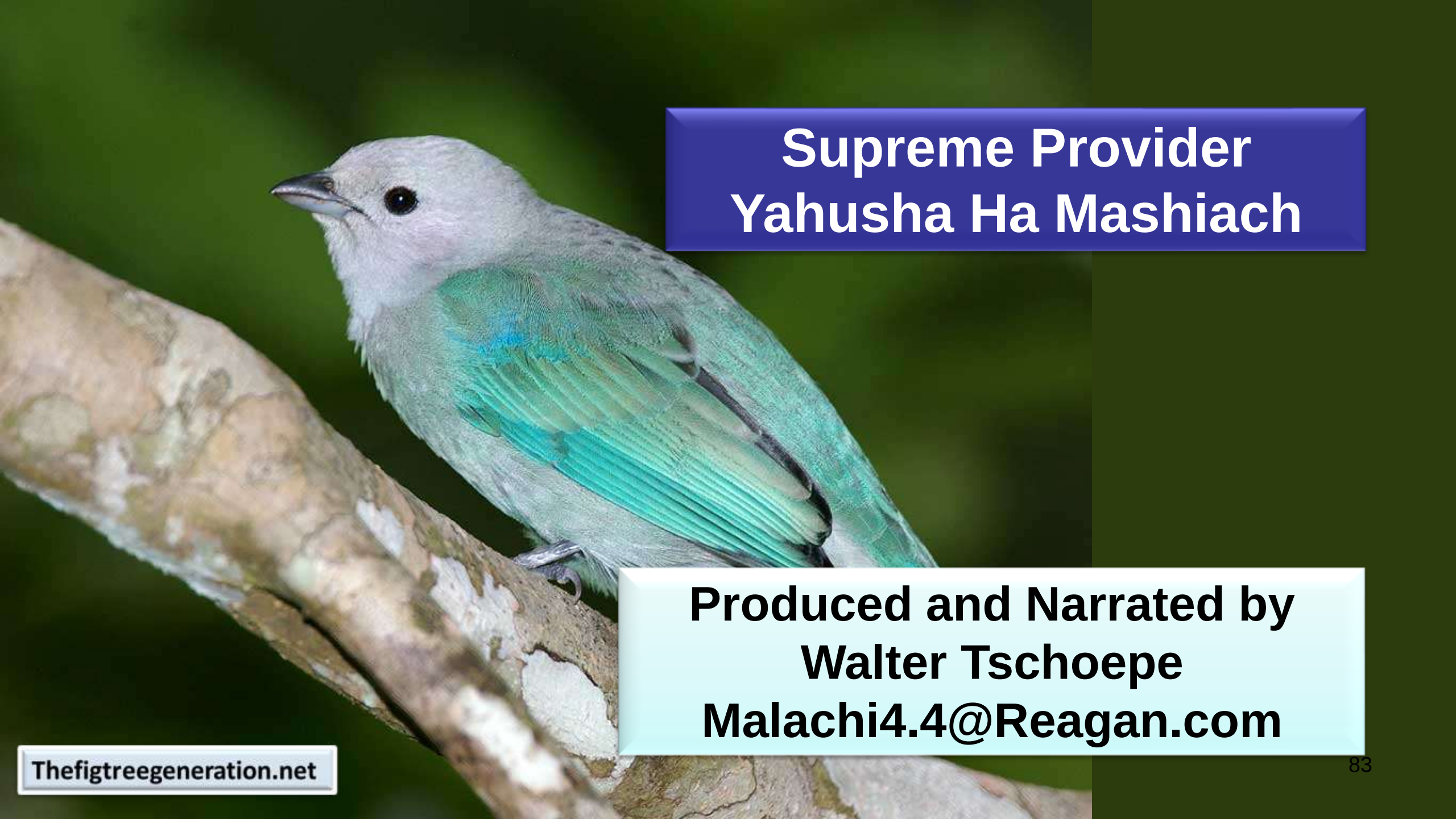
