NURMI ISLES BUCKS THE CRIME TREND

Experts on residential crime say it's hard to put an exact number to the value roving security provides in preventing break-ins and thefts. However, comparing recent reports from our Nurmi Isles neighborhood and surrounding areas provide significant evidence our approach is contributing to the reduction in incidents around our homes.

Recent news accounts have detailed the crime surge in areas such as nearby Croissant Park, where there has been an alarming uptick in vehicle thefts, year-over-year, during the July through September months. Even closer to home, November reports out of Victoria Park say those streets have been hit by a crime wave resulting in 18 reported burglaries since August.

In contrast, as reported in our last newsletter, Nurmi Isles' numbers have gone in the opposite direction, with an 83% reduction in crime since implementing our Security and Safety protocols – including nighttime roving security details.

"If they see your home is protected, thieves will move next door," has long been the advice from law enforcement professionals. With all of Nurmi Isles protected by our roving security and other protocols, we're seeing those thieves move to next door neighborhoods.

Authorities always advise homeowners to invest in good deterrence efforts to prevent burglars and other criminals from striking at their properties. Window decals alerting to home

security systems, improved security lighting systems, better locks and entry alarms, interior lights that are programmed to mimic how someone at home might be using them, even dogs, all present an unwelcome environment for the thief who wants to get in and get out.

Our security team raises the barrier by remaining vigilant through the neighborhood during peak crime hours.

The mobile devices they use to scan various checkpoints throughout the neighborhood keep them ever present, always on the move, and constantly alert. Their nightly sweeps, and interactions with members who have taken advantage of the additional services they perform, have helped them gain knowledge of who in our neighborhood might seem suspicious.

Nevertheless, the roving guards can't do the job all by themselves. Your Nurmi Isles Safety and Security Committee urges you to always:

- Lock your car! Tell visitors to lock theirs!
- Use your car fob blocking cases and don't store fobs close to exterior walls or windows.
- Check windows and doors if you've haven't in a while, make sure they offer enough security.
- Replace burnt out perimeter lights.

And keep up the good work! Together, we are making a difference



THIEVES CAN SWIPE AND RELAY YOUR CAR'S FOB SIGNAL!

What is signal extending/relaying?

Even if your car fob is inside your home, the signal from it is vulnerable. The fob is designed to work only within a short distance from the car, but sophisticated thieves have developed technology that allows them to search for the signal inside the home, and use a transmitter to relay it to a 2nd fob held near the vehicle. Once it has been relayed, the thief can unlock the vehicle and start the car.

The RFID-blocking case will prevent the signal from being detected by the thief.


Other issues to consider -

· Signal jammers can prevent you from locking your car

A signal jammer placed somewhere near your parking space can prevent you from locking your car using your fob. Make sure you manually check your car door each time you lock it.

Thieves can program a new fob

Thieves look for unlocked cars and use the OBD2 port (near your foot) to access your auto's data and program a new fob. If they can get to the data, they can essentially clone your fob. Always lock your car!



- 1 First thief stands within close proximity of the vehicle and uses device to relay received signals to the second thief.
- 2 Second thief stands as close to the house as possible, typically by the front door, holding the second device.
- The second device transmits the relayed signal up to 10-15 meters into the house.

When the key stored in the house receives a signal, it replies in a normal manner, fooling the system into thinking the owner is close and allows entry into the vehicle. A second relay is required to start the ignition.



TIPS FOR MAINTAINING A SAFER NEIGHBORHOOD



REMOVE VISIBLE ITEMS FROM YOUR CAR, AND LOCK IT EACH TIME YOU EXIT

It may be just a sweater in a bag to you, but a parcel on the seat can appear attractive to a thief. Take everything inside or secure items in the trunk. Don't give them a reason to be curious.



GUARD YOUR CAR FOB

NEVER LEAVE YOUR FOB INSIDE YOUR CAR OR NEAR THE FRONT DOOR.

Too often, residents make it easy for thieves. If your fob is in your car, your car can be stolen in seconds. Also, if you leave the fob on a hook or table near the door to your home, your fob data is not safe. Sophisticated thieves use software to scan for your fob's code. They can read the data through the wall! Keep your fob somewhere less obvious.



USE SAFETY STICKERS ON EASILY ACCESSED DOORS AND WINDOWS IN YOUR HOME

Many thieves will move on if they see any evidence of protection.





Timers that activate lights and TVs when you are away can make a thief think someone is at home. Today's technology allows you to activate many devices from your phone, making a customized plan easy.



KEEP REGIONS SECURITY NUMBERS HANDY BUT CALL 911 FIRST

Your Regions guards are in the neighborhood, and can quickly investigate a disturbance, help you get into your house if you are feeling vulnerable, or keep a watchful eye on your property if you are out of town.



GET TO KNOW YOUR NEIGHBORS

We are all too isolated and alone these days. Knowing who belongs next door can help you know when a stranger shouldn't be there.

Test your Birdie device so you know how it works, and keep it on you as you walk in and out of your house, or even when you are enjoying your yard or pool.



PUT A SAFETY STICKER IN THE CAR WINDOW

Studies indicate that thieves are looking for easy targets, and that stickers can deter them.

FOLD YOUR SIDE VIEW MIRRORS



Most car models today feature side-view mirrors that fold when you lock your car. Thieves look for cars with mirrors that haven't been folded, so if yours doesn't fold automatically, take a moment to do it manually.

THE UNEXPECTED BENEFIT OF SAFETY AND SECURITY — BEING CONNECTED

"We built a community." Those four words from Safety and Security Committee Chairman Harry Rozelle sum up one of the most unexpected results of the effort by Nurmi Isles residents to repell crime and enhance the feeling of being protected in our neighborhood and in our homes.

Often, homeowners look at security as a personal problem with personal solutions — better lighting, bigger locks, individual residence camera systems. There's no question those solutions help, and so do our roving guards making their rounds and checking in regularly at security stations throughout the neighborhood.

But as we approach the six-month anniversary of launching this initiative, it's hard to ignore the side benefit the community has experienced by pulling together, watching out for each other, and enjoying the beauty of this area and its residents together.

Harry and co-chair, Elizabeth Lowsky, recently discussed the improvements Nurmi Isles has experienced and some additional safety improvements scheduled for the next few months, as well as the pleasure of discovering an overall sense of "being connected" to others in the isles.

A happy holiday party

Harry pointed to the successful holiday party as an example of what happens when neighbors bond with neighbors to solve a problem.

"We were disjointed," Harry said, describing a time when crime felt like an individual attack with no support. At the holiday party, "we met people we never knew before," Harry said, discovering that so many in the area were eager to participate in the effort to make living here safer. Residents who are members of the Safety and Security initiative now know they can easily communicate with the committee members via text, phone call, or email to raise the alarm about someone who doesn't belong in the neighborhood, for example. They know that calling attention to the concern will result in a widespread alert going out to everyone who has signed up for text alerts from the committee.

In return, they can rely on their neighbors to do the same, should they observe a problem that causes concern.

"Being good neighbors and looking out for one another fosters a sense of community, trust, and cooperation," said Elizabeth. "When people feel connected and supported, they are more likely to communicate about potential risks, share information, and collaborate on safety measures. This increased community engagement creates a collective awareness that helps identify and address issues promptly, making the overall environment safer for everyone."

Enhancements on the way

Elizabeth discussed some of the additional benefits of having roving guards available, such as her choice to get escorted home from the holiday party by the guard on duty. Knowing the guard is available, even to walk you from the car to your front door, makes people feeling better about enjoying a night out, or returning home late after a long trip.

The Committee is telling residents to look forward to improvements in the new year to what has been an enormously successful initiative, Harry said.

"We've reached an agreement with the owners at the head of every street to install video cameras on poles that will provide continuous surveillance of who goes in and who goes out," he said. "This will amount to an additional level of deterrence that will discourage criminals from coming in, and provide documentary evidence should there be any attempts."

According to Harry, those cameras will be in place by second quarter of 2024.

"We're so grateful to have the support we've gotten, which now includes almost the whole Nurmi Isles community," Harry said — a community that can enjoy this holiday season feeling protected, connected, and secure.


