

Program Presentation by ERIK RINGNES

Biography

Erik was born in Oslo 1959. He was active in sports: sailing, skiing, orienteering, dog-sled racing and his big passion, hang gliding. Erik drove a beer truck at the Ringnes Brewery, but after two years in the Norwegian Army went off the USA to study Aerospace Engineering. After marrying Valerie in Tennessee, the couple moved to Arizona and had three kids and a dog. In 1996 they moved to Norway and lived in Tønsberg for 4 years. The kids and Valerie all became fluent in Norwegian. Back in Arizona, Erik picked up again with Honeywell and has worked many years as a flight test engineer. Erik continues to be active, climbing Mt Whitney in CA last summer. At 14,505 ft Mt Whitney is the highest mountain in the contiguous 48 states. Erik became a proud grandfather last fall. His second daughter is engaged and his son graduated from college. Erik has visited Norway many times in recent years, the last time to honor his dad's memory. He lives a busy life, but cherishes time with family and friends most of all.

Norwegian Polar Explorers




Fritjof Nansen

Fritjof Nansen was featured as a Google Search doodle on his 156th birthday last year. Nansen is arguably the most famous Norwegian Polar explorer, but that's not all. He was also a scientist, an author, an artist, a family man, an ambassador and a statesman. However, Roald Amundsen achieved what his mentor never did. He was the first man on the South Pole and also made the North Pole, although in an airship. Nansen died famous and was given a state funeral with a parade through Oslo. Amundsen struggled with bankruptcy and vanished in the polar ice and has never been found. This story is mostly about these two explorers, but also about the vessels

they used. There is a connection to modern times with the last chapter still not written which I will cover. The talk features lots of pictures and visuals and opportunities to ask questions.

If you come for the just the program, why not donate \$5 to help cover the rental hall fee?



Norwegian Cream Cake Contest

On any celebration table in Norway you can find a layer cake (Bløtkake). This is just berries and cream between layers of vanilla sponge. It has a similarity with the Norwegian soup Lapskaus – anything goes. Whatever you have in the pantry or fridge will do – canned peaches, fresh strawberries or frozen blueberries. You can even use any type of jam. There's also a tossup between cream and custard between the layers, or a little of both. You decide!

There is only ONE rule: you must bake the entire cake from scratch!!

Six volunteers have come forward. Each make a traditional Norwegian Cream Cake (from scratch) for our February meeting. A panel of 5 judges will taste and decide on the winner. Prizes will be awarded for all entries. (I guess all of our contestants will be winners!) After the judging everyone gets a piece of cake!

BUILDING THE FUTURE - TALKING MERGER

Members from both Overtro Fjell Lodge and Desert Fjord Lodge requested that an exploratory committee be formed to investigate the feasibility of merging the two lodges. But why would merging the two lodges be a good idea? Because some members may not understand such a move and others may be opposed to it, we understand that what we propose needs to appreciate those sensitivities. Maybe it would help if we discussed the rationale in support of this venture.

Due to both lodges' experience of diminishing and aging membership, it becomes increasingly difficult to fill officer positions with those who are willing and able. And those who hold a series of officer positions often suffer from burnout. A larger pool of potential candidates would ease this situation and, at the same time, would deal with the crisis of leadership.

A merger of the two lodges would mean larger activities – e.g. a larger Genealogy meeting, a larger monthly meeting, etc. Bigger is not necessarily better, but larger turnout at events would of itself generate greater interest in what's going on and would also tend to attract more people to join. A bigger impact in the community would give us more success in reaching out. While good attendance is a sign of life, good programming and good outreach by members to bring visitors would certainly be key components, too.

And not least is the encouragement we could bring each other through merging our membership. At present we fight our separate battles in our own corner of the Valley. Joining ranks offers new life and purpose in the face of current challenges.

Now it is up to you, the members, to vote for what you think is best for our two Lodges. Whatever the outcome, keep in mind that at least we tried to preclude a possible closure of our Lodges

• JUNE – AUGUST

Normal schedule and/or events will occur for this time period by each Lodge.

• SEPTEMBER - DECEMBER

Joint meetings of both Lodges will take place at a new location.

2019

- Newly formed Phoenix Lodge 6-153 is now fully operational on January 1, 2019

Business Meeting Minutes – January 6, 2018

Meeting called to order by Jonathan Walters at 1:03 PM.

- Quorum (4+) was met? Yes
- **1.** DECEMBER MINUTES: Arlys made a motion to accept the December 2017 business meeting minutes as published in the Posten. Motion seconded by Jana and passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT – The lodge ends 2017 with \$2191.79 in its Wells Fargo checking account. The two Sons of Norway Foundation investments are projected to earn \$1,000 to \$1,100 in 2018. An additional \$500 remaining in a separate account to use to fund scholarships next year.

The Jul Bazaar income / sales were deposited directly by Ali and totaled \$792. Janis will review the deposit with Ali later this month.

2. COMMITTEE REPORTS

Library

 Arlys has ordered some fiction books. She is looking into purchasing some additional books. It was suggested that she announce her interest in the Posten in getting more books by "Norwegian queen of crime" Karin Fossum. Members might contribute them. She's considering creating a fiction only table for members to check out during meetings.

Cultural/Program

- The January meeting will feature the Scandinavian Dancers. The Committee is looking to also showing a ten-minute humorous video about lutefisk for January or February.
- The February meeting will be a Cream Cake Contest. Five volunteers will judge the cake contest. There
 may also be a short video shown. The February meeting has been moved to the 18th because of a
 conflict with the St Olaf Choir concert on February 11th.
- In March Martin Tesli, commander of the Luke Air Force base Norwegian training contingent has been asked to speak.
- In April, Per Aannestad has been asked to present a program on a heavy water production plant.
- June would be mostly a social event with a possible Rick Steve's Norway travel video.

Membership – Additional details are in the Posten Membership Matters column.

 There are 129 members. Floyd handed out a report from headquarters. He also mentioned that Gil Witsoe had died recently. Floyd will award membership pins at the January or February H&C meeting.

3. OLD BUSINESS

- The Committee looking into a possible merger with the Mesa lodge is drafting a statement to appear in the next Posten and Mesa's newsletter. This would detail the vote required to move forward with the merger. Possible meeting place locations are being investigated.
- Four lodge delegates to the District Six Convention in Rohnert Park, California (June 10-14, 2018) should be identified and confirmed by Desert Fjord members in January or February. Potential delegates should let Jonathan know that they would like to attend this convention.

4. NEW BUSIINESS

- Viking Book and Wine Club will be meeting January 6, 2018 at 3 PM.
- A 2018 calendar year lodge budget was presented by the Budget Committee. Floyd moved and Ed seconded the approval. The motion passed.


Hello everyone! (Or at least those that read page nine)
