



What a wonderful opportunity to attend the Sons of Norway District Six convention June 12-14 in Loveland Colorado. It was run very efficiently and with great detail. I was very impressed. Being new to Sons of Norway, I was more of an observer. It provided an opportunity to learn more about the Sons of Norway fraternity and meet new people of District 6. During the business meeting, many resolutions were proposed and voted on. The official name became "District Six, Sons of Norway".

There were beautiful crafts on display and crafts to buy. The parade of Bunads was so nice. Our Roger Espeland, now the new International Director, gave a great speech.

At dinner, each person at the table had a trivia question, prepared by Carol Nerverdahl from Trollheim Lodge (CO), to ask others at the table. It was a great conversation breaker. The convention center, Norwegian snacks at break time, and dinners were delicious.

This was a driving trip to Colorado for the convention held in Loveland, a short 33-mile drive from my former home in Boulder. A stop on the way in and the way out was a must.

The new element of governance was a new element to the running of a convention. For the first time there were no nominations for any office allowed from the floor of the convention. All applications must have been submitted to a nominating committee prior to convention; these determined the qualified candidates for office. If there were no applicants for a particular office, then that office remained vacant and would be filled by the District Six Board following the convention.

Convention business and resolutions went smoothly and all business was conducted in a timely manner. There was adequate time to visit fellow members from across the District and enjoy the great coffee breaks and evening dinners.

It wasn't all work and no play, but the work part proved most significant for me. Before I left for the District 6 Convention I accepted an invitation to serve on the Finance Committee. Little did I realize how much my convention experience would hinge on this assignment!

I arrived a day early to meet with Karl Eckeberg and Keith Bordsen concerning a couple of important matters: (1) A resolution to be brought to the convention delegates regarding moving District 6 Scholarship funds to the Sons of Norway Foundation where they'd appreciate more favorably while the District would still have access to the funds and control of them; (2) review of a recent audit of the Recreation Center financials in order to highlight key recommendations for the convention delegates.

District 6 Foundation Director Carl Ingvaldstad and Corrie Knudson, the new SON Foundation Director, helped us to understand the rationale behind the scholarship fund resolution. Also, we met several Recreation Center Board members, gaining insights and perspective from them. We were at it all day long from 8 am to 6 pm!

Then a couple times while the convention was in session, the Finance Committee was called forward to present the resolution on District 6 Scholarship Funds and also the Recreation Center recommendations. Through my work with the Finance Committee I got acquainted with Recreation Center Board members who approached me to fill one of their vacancies. They're happy to have someone from AZ on the Board; they meet several times a year at Camp Norge.

Norwegian Genealogy for 2016-2017

Many new people have joined the lodge and others have decided that it is time to get their family history down on paper (or bits and bytes). To meet the need, we have decided it is time to revisit the basic content and rethink how we do our meetings.

Starting in September we will have a new format for our meetings. We will start from the beginning of our Norwegian Genealogy subjects. This will be a series of meetings at the Granite Reef Senior Center for "Beginners in Norwegian Genealogy". We think it will also be valuable for our veterans and experienced members; all of us have expressed a need to step back and get a perspective on what we have done and where we are going. The vets can also share their experiences with our unique little group.

Janis Johnson suggested we use a tried and proven format similar to that used by the *Family History Society of Arizona (FHSA)*. (You might think about joining one of their chapters to learn about the changes and advances in modern genealogy as a science and technique.)

The format of each meeting will include:

- (1) Introduction of attendees and status of work;
- (2) Norwegian Genealogy-- selected topics;
- (3) Learning a new skill and practicing it.

The meetings will be held periodically. If possible, our meetings will be announced in the Posten; otherwise, the time and place of our meetings will be announced by email. By next Syttende Mai attendees will be well along the road to finding their ancestors and relatives in Norway. And you will have a lifelong hobby that is educational and fun.

Our History


The Desert Fjord Norwegian Genealogy group is celebrating our 15th year! When we started, computer software in support of genealogy was almost non-existent. At best you could key in names, dates and places into a family tree or family group sheet template. There were few databases to access in the early internet. *Ancestry.com* was in its infancy. You could not even retrieve an image file of church or civil records. You ultimately had to travel locally and abroad to find info. We wrote lots of letters and put stamps on envelopes to people and places both here and in Norway. There was a beginning recognition of the need for standardization of data to make information exchange easy. Interestingly, the Norwegian Lutheran Church was several hundreds of years ahead of *Ancestry* and the rest of us. The Church required standardization of church books long ago! If you could get your hands on a microfiche of your church books in Norway, you knew in which column to find the dates and people. We knew nothing about the wealth of information in the many bygdeboker.

Desert Fjord Genealogy grew through those years with continuous growth of technology and ever increasing ease of access to records. During this time, we continuously educated ourselves on the new opportunities to find our ancestors. And many of us made a lot of progress. Over the years we taught three separate classes with focus on the uniqueness of Norwegian genealogy. And on a monthly basis we met and discussed our progress and educated each other. Each meeting included a group discussion and a "presentation" by members of our own group and sometimes from outside experts. And we have always had a good time.

2. Error in April 2016 minutes: Jana Peterson was not in attendance. Ross Berg made a motion to accept the corrected **April 2016** business meeting minutes as published in the **May Posten**, motion seconded by Floyd Downs. The motion passed.


