

Program: THREE VIKING MUSEUMS


In Iceland and Norway

The museums are rich with culture, and include real longships, a replica that sailed to New York, the excavation of the largest Viking longhouse, and examples of how the Vikings lived and made their boats, fabrics, clothing, tools, and other essentials.



NOVEMBER Book Club read: THE ICE SWIMMER



Over the years he continues to clear land, finds rocks with copper imbedded, and adds more farm animals. His life has episodes of politics, fraud, infanticide, cruelty but he continues to develop his land.

<u>Secretary's Report:</u> The motion was made by Ed and seconded by Arlys to approve the April Business meeting minutes as printed in the May Posten. The motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: The report from Janis was reviewed. The August checking balance is \$2,456

Culture/Program: Jana described the programs she is working on for this fall and continuing into 2019.

September – Program about Finland as described in the September Posten.

October – Jana will present the program about visiting three Norwegian museums. Jackson Loomis will share a 4 minute video of his Camp Norge experience and thank the lodge for the campership award.
