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

Recent Member Survey

The findings of our recent lodge survey are summarized here in their order of importance:

• Programming

The survey clearly showed that Desert Fjord **members are most attracted by the monthly programs**. They rate the programs high and prefer educational and informative programs about Norway presented by guest speakers. Programming could be expanded to include more current events and travel information, too.

• Catering

The Scandinavian **meals are next in importance**. When specifically asked about cost, threequarters of our sample said that the price was reasonable. This figure includes \$5 for rent of the Masonic Lodge dining facility and \$10 for the catered meal. When we consider less formal meals, members suggest that they serve dessert and coffee at a lower price. There is real interest in having 1-2 special meals (e.g. Torsk) and charging a premium for those.

• Socializing

The opportunity to **socialize with each other is important** to our members. There is also a concern that visitors and new members may not feel welcome. We should make a special effort to identify and welcome visitors and new members. There is a real interest in having more younger members and families join us.

Who responded to the January / February online survey? A total of 40 of our current members took part in the survey. We anticipated that they are valid representatives of our current membership – 140 adults and children.

Up with rutabagas, "the orange of the north"

The rutabaga has few advocates in the United States and most Americans don't even know what rutabagas are when they see them in the store. Many think they are weird turnips, and a number of store cashiers have asked me what in the world I do with them.

But the rutabaga has enjoyed a long history in Scandinavian cuisine, at least going back to the 17th century. It is a root vegetable that originated from a cross (some say accidental) between cabbage and turnip. In Scandinavian stores they are usually the size of softballs, while in the U.S. the ones you see are generally smaller, about the size of baseballs. Rutabagas sport purple tops and yellow bodies. Their flesh possesses a rich yellow color with a hint of sweetness.

I suspect that like potatoes, the rutabaga's popularity in Scandinavia over the last several hundred years lies in their ability to grow in colder soils. The Little Ice Age which brought very cold, harsh weather conditions to Europe between 800 and 150 years ago made growing grains much more difficult for Nordic people. One solution was to turn to the cold-loving potato and its rooty companion, the rutabaga, for much of their daily nutrition. So the Scandinavians embraced the rutabaga as a valued food in their diet, unlike the people of France and Southern Europe who thought of it as only fit for animal fodder. It is not an

accident that when the rutabaga eventually made its way to England, it immediately became known by the name "swede."

The word *rutabaga* itself derives from the original Swedish term for the root, *rotabagge* (translates as something like "stumpy root"). Norwegians call it *kalrot* (cabbage root) or *kalrabi*. It is a common food there and may be on the dinner menu two or three times in any given week.

The Norwegian nickname for the rutabaga is "Nordens Oransje" (Orange of the North). This name comes from the recognition that this root is packed with Vitamin C. It is also rich in Vitamin A, calcium, and healthy fiber. However, it does not contain much in the way of calories or carbohydrates, which could be seen as a good thing in our modern diet.

Most Scandinavians eat their rutabagas mashed up. The Norwegians call this mashed-up rutabaga *kalrabistappe*. You can mash it by itself with a little cream, butter, and nutmeg or you can add carrots or potatoes, or both, to the mash. All are good and there are many recipes available online or in Scandinavian cookbooks. Kalrabistappe goes really well with pinnekj0tt (dried and salted ribs of lamb or mutton), sausage, ham, or other dinner meats.

Now that I have whet your appetite for rutabaga, I'll conclude with a basic kalrabistappe. Yum! Mashed Rutabagas / Kalrabistappe

2 lbs kalrabi (rutabaga)

2 carrots (medium sized)

1 quart water

1 tsp. salt or 1 cube vegetable boullion

.

1/4 cup light whipping cream

2 tbsps. butter

1/4 tsp. pepper

1/4 tsp. nutmeg

Peel and cut kalrabi and the carrots in small pieces.

Add salt or boullion to water, and boil the kalrabi and carrots in water until soft. Drain, reserving 1 cup of water.

Mash the kalrabi and carrots.

Stir in cream, butter, pepper, and nutmeg. Add salt and maybe a dash of the reserved liquid, to taste.



A loving husband. A devoted father. A devout Catholic. A proud Norwegian. A brilliant engineer. A veteran of World War II. Reidar G. Gabrielson, 95, went to meet his Savior on April 28, 2019. He was reunited with Jean Julia Ryan, the first love of his life, and his beloved daughter, Nancy. Reidar was born on April 14, 1924, in Virginia, Minnesota, to Nellie (Bangsund) and Olaf Gabrielson. He graduated from Roosevelt High School in 1941, and attended Virginia Junior College from 1941-1943. On August 25, 1943, he was inducted into the Army at Fort Snelling, Minnesota, and served in the Armed Forces Radio Service in the Pacific until February 15, 1946. In 1948, he

graduated from the University of Minnesota with a Bachelor's Degree in Electrical Engineering. While attending the University, he fell deeply in love with Jean Ryan, and they were married in 1949. They welcomed six children: Lynne (Dennis) Gort, Mary, Jon (Brenna) Gabrielson, Jim, Nancy, and Peggy (Mike) May. Reidar worked for ITT in Nutley, NJ, and Station KCJB in Minot, ND, before relocating to Scottsdale in 1951. He worked for Motorola for 20 years, and was the inventor and co-inventor of three patents. In 1971, Reidar became a founding partner of Engineered Systems, Inc., and retired in 1986. In 1984, he married Kathy Watson, and acquired three more children: Rochelle (Brian) Hoekstra, Renee (Tim) Tavani, and Scott Watson. Having a beautiful tenor voice, Reidar sang in the Choir at OLPH for over fifty years. He was a member of the Men's Club, the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Lifetime Member of the Sons of Norway, Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineering, and the Pioneers of Amateur Wireless Club. He was an avid golfer, ham radio operator, completed a solo flight in a glider, and took piano lessons at age 90. In addition to his first wife, his daughter, and his parents, he was predeceased by seven siblings: Olaf, Conrad, Henry, Floyd, Alice Fink, Nancy Maryland, and Margaret Zins; brother-in-laws James Ryan and Donald Haugen; sister-in-laws Margaret Rodewald and Helen Seyer. He is survived by his loving and devoted wife of 34 years, Kathy; eight children; and ten grandchildren: Heather (Mick) Mullins, Nancy (Doug) Czachor, Ryan (Rachel) Gabrielson, Lynne Gabrielson, Christopher and Sean May, Catherine and Christine Hoekstra, Jonathan and Jennifer Tavani, and five great-grandchildren; sister-in-law Phyllis Gabrielson of Appleton, WI; brothers-in-law Bill Haugen and Harry (Ellie) Haugen of Scottsdale, and many loving nieces and nephews. He was a good and kind man; a man with a generous spirit; a man of dignity and honor. He was my husband. "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race. I have kept the faith." 2 Timothy 4:6-8. Visitation will be from 5-8pm Friday, May 3rd at Messinger Mortuary, 7601 E. Indian School Road, Scottsdale with a Rosary at 7pm. A Funeral Mass will be 10am Saturday, May 4th at Our Lady of Perpetual Help, 7655 E. Main Street, Scottsdale. Interment with Military Honors will take place immediately following the Mass at St. Francis Cemetery and then all are invited to a reception at Messinger's Courtyard Reception Room.

Desert Fjord Business Meeting 4140 N Miller Road, Scottsdale, AZ April 6, 2019

Meeting: The business meeting was held at the Scottsdale Methodist Church and was opened by Jonathan Walters at 1:08 PM.

Attendees: Jonathan Walters, Janis Johnson, Arlys Medlicott, Sherrie Loomis, Ed Bergo and Ross Berg.

Secretary's Report: Janis moved and Ross seconded accepting the minutes of the February and March meetings. The motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: Janis gave her Treasurer's report. \$1200 is now set aside for the District Six convention in 2020. Our checking account balance is about \$1,500. Jan talked to Corrie Knudsen and learned that we will earn about \$1,300 from our two Foundation Funds. The General Fund account currently has \$19,763 in it.

Scholarship Committee: Ross and the committee want to have Headquarters receive the applications and do the evaluation process. Ross suggests creating guidelines as to how recipients acknowledge having received and used the scholarship money.

Heritage and Culture Meeting: Nina Poe will do a presentation about celebrating Easter in Norway. We will add 50:50 raffle to this meeting.

Membership: Sherrie will get together with Nina Poe to review Nina's suggestions on interacting with new members. These were mentioned at the March Business Meeting. We have 5 new members according to Sherrie – Cheleen Olbekson-Jones, Shereen Marino, Toni Marie Solberg and Peggy and Randy Wensman. She also reported that we have 2 pages of names and contact information of potential new members from the Viking Festival. Sherrie is working on a follow up process.

Library: Arlys has become the President of Overtro Fjell and will no longer be our Librarian. We are seeking a replacement for her. She has served in that position for three years and we really appreciate her doing that. Janis offered to write book reviews for the Posten.

Viking Festival: Jan is starting to plan for a 2020 event. The success of this year's event suggests that it would be useful to repeat. The Stoughton Dancers were a real attraction, so we will need to find something to promote next year's event. Scottsdale Methodist Church plus other locations are being considered for 2020. There will be a table charge plus several other changes. Several exhibitors have indicated an interest in participating again next year.

Scholarship Committee: Ross suggests withdrawing \$2,000 plus the value of 2 stipends for Camp Norge etc. He and Janis described that the income for 2019 as about \$1,300. Therefore, we would need to withdraw additional money from the General Fund. A motion was approved to withdraw \$800 from the General Fund in addition to utilizing the expected revenue of \$1,300 for this year's awards. Foundation Directors, Gordy Peterson and Paul Lindbloom will be asked to join the Scholarship Committee. We need to determine whether member contributions could be used to augment scholarship money. Ross will work with Corrie Knudson to get checks written for the 2019 awards.

A motion was made to adjourn the meeting by Ed and seconded by Sherrie at 2:10 PM.

The next business meeting will be on May 4th to finalize plans for the Syttende Mai picnic.



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
