




# Membership Matters by Lois Ripley, Membership Secretary



# Burned

Henning Juul is a veteran investigative crime reporter in Oslo, Norway. A horrific fire killed his six-year-old son, cut scars across his face, and ended his marriage, and on his first day back at the job after the terrible tragedy a body is discovered in one of the city's public parks. A beautiful female college student has been stoned to death and buried up to her neck, her body left bloody and exposed. The brutality of the crime shakes the whole country, but despite his own recent trauma – and the fact that his ex-wife's new boyfriend is also on the case - Henning is given the assignment. When the victim's boyfriend, a Pakistani native,



is arrested, Henning feels certain the man is innocent. This was not simply a Middle Eastern-style honor killing in the face of adultery – it was a far more complicated gesture, and one that will drag Henning into a darkness he's never dreamed of.

(Book chosen as March's selection for the Sons of Norway National Book Group.)

Thomas Enger is a Norwegian writer and journalist. He made his debut with the crime novel Burned (Skinndød) in 2010, which became an international sensation before publication. Burned is the first in a series of five books about the journalist Henning Juul, which delves into the depths of Oslo's underbelly, skewering the corridors of dirty politics and nailing the fast-moving world of 24-hour news.

# Desert Fjord Lodge Member Survey





## **Top Line Results**

The recent Desert Fjord Member Survey included some of the same questions asked in the 2019 study. It also included some new ones. This analysis compares the results of the new questions and those questions that were comparable over the three-year period.

When we look at the 10-point Net Promoter Score results of the two studies, Desert Fjord members remain enthusiastic about the lodge over the three-year period. The overall scores in both studies are identical. This is considered an important marketing measurement.

Lodge members say that they like the food served, the friendly environment and the programming. It has been challenging to maintain the lodge during the covid pandemic.

A handful of members indicate that they are willing to assist in revitalizing the lodge. We should ask these members to be more actively involved. It is time to create a new team of leaders. The current Board has agreed to mentor and assist in this transition.

## **Detailed Findings**

This most recent member survey was conducted in February 2022. There were 28 respondents. A previous member web survey was conducted in the spring of 2019 had 40 respondents.

- **1-Net Promoter Score** asked how likely members would be to recommend Desert Fjord to friends or family members. The 2022 survey has a NPS core of 46, which is statistically identical to the 2019 score of 45. A score of 20 is considered acceptable and 50 is truly outstanding. Both of our scores in 2019 and 2022 are very positive.
- **2-What is Desert Fjord doing especially well?** Members say that they like the programming followed by the food served and the Posten.
- **3-What should Desert Fjord improve upon?** Each of these responses is offered by a couple of people. Let's offer fewer movies and lectures, announce the programs with more lead time and appeal to younger members. There were additional suggestions in the detailed findings.
- **4-Things that members would like to see our meetings include:** (2022 information)
  - #1=Live speakers and Live Norwegian guests available
  - #2=Norwegian theme classes and Learning opportunities
  - #3=More lite meals could be served: wine and cheese sampling, appetizers,

coffee and treats, etc.

#### 5-Four point rating scores were used to evaluate three aspects of our lodge's meetings.

In 2019 and 2022, the scores for food served were the highest, next came friendly environment and third was programming. The last couple of years have been a real challenge with the covid restrictions. We appreciate those individuals who have lead and participated to keep our lodge going.

2019	Excellent=56%	Good=32%	Fair=0	Poor=6%

**6-A number of lodge members are willing to help revitalize Desert Fjord.** This was addressed in three questions. Of the 28 who responded to the survey, 4-6 specifically offered to pitch in and help. We will want to approach these members. Current leadership will need to provide mentorship to get the lodge moving forward.

#### 7-What Sons of Norway member benefits are used most often?-(Results shown in order)

Viking magazine print edition

Lodge meetings and social activities

Activities that apply to youth and cultural skills (Is this possibly a reference to Camp Norge?)

Recipes provided in the Viking, Posten or recipe Box

Cultural camps, family camps and Camp Norge classes

#### 8-Proportion of meetings attended and whether members live in the Phoenix metro area?

A total of 87% of members live in the Phoenix area full time according to this latest study. This compares to 89% in the 2019 study. Fifty-four percent of respondents typically attend three or more lodge meetings each year.
