



SONJA HENIE

The daughter of a fur wholesaler, Sonja Henie got her first pair of ice skates when she was six. Eight years later, she was Norway's Skating Champion. At 15, she would win the gold medal in Skating at the 1928 Olympics, thus becoming the youngest Olympic skating champion -- a record that stood for 70 years. She repeated as champion in 1932 and 1936. A ten-time World Champion Women's Figure Skater, she was the first skater to parlay athletic success into a lucrative career. In 1936 she turned professional, began touring with her own ice show and soon caught the attention of Hollywood. She signed with 20th Century Fox and played an ice skater in One in a Million (1936). The film was a great success, and Sonja was now a movie star.

Sonja's popularity suffered briefly when a photograph was published showing her shaking hands with Adolf Hitler at the 1936 Olympic Winter Games in Berlin. She continued to make a series of light romantic comedies throughout the late 30s and early 40s. More a testament to her skating skills and physical attributes, the films were profitable and her popularity soared. Films like One in a Million, Thin Ice, and Wintertime helped bring financial success for the Hollywood Ice Revues that she produced and starred in every year and which drew huge crowds across the United States. Sonja became a naturalized citizen of the United States in 1941. In the mid-40s her movie career tapered off, but she continued skating until her retirement in 1960. An astute businesswoman, Sonja was one of the ten wealthiest women in the world when she died of leukemia in 1969. Sonja was inducted into the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame in 1976 and the International Women's Sport Hall of Fame in 1982.


LIBRARY CORNER

A Book Review by Janis Johnson

(highlighting one of the books available in our great Library)







The main setting is Eel Point, which is made up of an imposing and historic manor house, itself built using timber from a shipwreck, thus associated with superstitions by the locals who think it cursed. This is not helped by the dark reputation it has acquired over the decades after several deaths there. The author credibly uses the flashback technique to show us the numerous tragedies that have befallen the inhabitants of Eel Point over the years since the 1800s. In the contemporary setting, the reader is introduced to Joakim and Katrine Westin, a young couple who have recently moved from Stockholm to Oland, having bought the manor house at Eel Point. Together with their two young children, Livia and Gabriel, the family is in the process of settling into their new home when tragedy strikes. Tilda Davidsson is the novice cop who assumes responsibility on the island and finds her hands full dealing with suspicious break-ins throughout the island, a complicated love affair, and also a great-uncle who is recounting old family stories to her.

The different story arcs are well-explored and credibly told, with a cast of interesting characters that are also explored at length, especially

the main characters, i.e. Joakim and Tilda. These are complex characters that draw readers into their confused and complicated worlds, and elicit one's empathy. There is a great sense of atmosphere throughout this novel, especially of the harsh winter climate, as portrayed through the unforgiving blizzard 3/4 into the novel. Elements of the supernatural are also explored, but without an element of the fantastic, instead it is seamlessly woven into the fabric of the story so as to render it altogether credible. The descriptions of the manor house, the two lighthouses, and the rest of Oland enhance the atmosphere in the novel. "The Darkest Room" will appeal to fans of atmospheric mysteries, and has all the elements essential to good storytelling - a compelling and unpredictable plot, interesting multifaceted characters as well as high atmosphere and vivid descriptions. Highly recommended!

Desert Fjord Lodge Business Meeting Starbucks, 229 E Dunlap, Phoenix, AZ December 8, 2019

Jan Loomis called the meeting to order at 4:00 pm. In attendance were Jonathan Walters, Ed and Phyllis Bergo, Jan and Sherrie Loomis, and Janis Johnson.

Jan Loomis moved to approve the minutes of the October meetings and Janis Johnson seconded the motion.

<u>Treasurers report</u>: Janis reported that we have \$1700 in savings toward our goal of \$2,000 needed for the convention coming up in June. Fees for each delegate are \$350 and \$285 for non-delegates. Janis suggested that we try to have more of our newer members be delegates to the convention. Dates for the convention need to be announced in January. We have about \$1047 in checking. This was approved. The Jul Bazaar brought a profit of \$100 and our November meeting brought another \$100.

Reservations for the Syttende Mai event need to be made for May 16 at the McCormick-Stillman Railroad Park. We want to have the same Ramada as last year. The event is from 9 am - noon with set up at 8 am. A new Master of Ceremonies needs to be found.

<u>Cultural report</u>: No one in attendance to give a report. January is installation of officers, and ______? February features Camp Norge activities, March is our Viking Festival. Jan Loomis reviewed the details, expenses, and the need for cookie donations.

<u>Social</u>: No one in attendance to give a report. Suggestion for food at the January H&C meeting: Lapskaus. February will be our Torsk Dinner which is usually a fund raiser.

<u>Membership</u>: There is a new fee structure for 2020. With the Jonathan Loomis family moving to Minnesota, we are losing 5 members. Recent new members will be posted in January.

New business:

A motion was made to change our monthly meeting to the second Saturday of the month with the following changes: the business meeting will be from 11–12; setup for the H& C meeting will be from 12-1:00; the luncheon will be about 1:15 and the program from 2-3. A vote showed all present in favor of the changes. Jonathan Walters will confirm the changes with the Masonic Lodge.

A brainstorming hour is to be held in January prior to our business meeting in order to plan our 2020 activities and set some goals for our lodge. Jan Loomis will send out a message about this.

Lynn Solie will be taking reservations for future meetings. No monies need to be sent to her, but payment at the door will be received. Jan Loomis will check on how to pay online in the future.

We need to target 4 delegates for the convention.

Someone needs to invite Benny Jo to the January installation and also check to see if Luella Grangaard might be in our area at that time.

The 2020 Thorrablot will be at the Pulaski Club of Arizona, which is located at 4331 East McDowell Road, Phoenix, AZ 85008. The festivities will be held on Saturday February 1, doors open at 6:00 pm and the food will be served at 7:00 pm.

As in the past, we will serve both Icelandic and American fare. Among other things we will have smoked lamb (hangikjöt), lamb, smoked salmon, sheep heads, fermented shark, and ham. Guests will also be offered water, and soda. The Pulaski Club has a full bar and 1 drink will be included for paying adults, additional drinks are available for purchase from the bar – the bar only accepts cash. We have done everything in our power to keep costs down and ticket prices this year will be \$60 for ages 13 and up. Children under 13 are free.

Following dinner will be some musical entertainment and a social hour providing an opportunity for mingling and getting to know other attendees. The ever popular raffle will then take place. This year's prizes include various quality items as usual. At the conclusion of the raffle dancing will commence to a musical mix until about midnight.

Unfortunately we cannot guarantee food for anyone that does not RSVP and send payment prior to the event. We will not sell tickets at the door. Every RSVP will receive one raffle ticket.
