Why do Norwegians celebrate 'Syttende Mai'?

On this day, around 200 years ago, king Kristian VIII signed Norway's constitution, ultimately leading to their independence from Sweden. However, a minor war broke out as a result of tension between Sweden and Norway in August the same year, which led to the countries again being united. However, the signed constitution was still valid which meant that Norway entered the union as an independent state.



Up until the 17th of May, 1814, Norway had been a part of the kingdom of Sweden, which was considered quite the superpower throughout the 1300-1800s. Since the early 1300s, Norway had either belonged to Denmark, Sweden or been forced to join the Kalmar Union. After many centuries of bullying from the other Scandinavian countries, the independence of Norway was both anticipated and well-deserved. Therefore, it comes as little surprise that 'syttende mai' possibly is the most celebrated national holiday in all of Scandinavia. Fiercely celebrated by Norwegians, and happily championed on by Swedes and Danes alike.

Happy Independence Day, Norway!


LIBRARY CORNER

Winner of the Riverton Prize for best Norwegian crime novel and named by **Dagbladet** as one of the top twenty-five Norwegian crime novels of all time, **The Land of Dreams** is the chilling first installment in Vidar Sundstøl's critically acclaimed Minnesota Trilogy, set on the rugged north shore of Lake Superior and in the region's small towns and deep forests.

The grandson of Norwegian immigrants, Lance Hansen is a U.S. Forest Service officer and has a nearly all-consuming passion for local genealogy and history. But his quiet routines are shattered one morning when he comes upon a Norwegian tourist brutally murdered near a stone cross on the shore of Lake Superior. Another Norwegian man is nearby; covered in blood and staring out across the lake, he can only utter the word kjærlighet. Love.

FBI agent Bob Lecuyer is assigned to the case, as is Norwegian detective Eirik Nyland, who is immediately flown in from Oslo. As the investigation progresses, Lance begins to make shocking discoveries—including one that involves the murder of an Ojibwe man on the very same site more than one hundred years ago. As Lance digs into two murders separated by a century, he finds the clues may in fact lead toward someone much closer to home than he could have imagined.

The Land of Dreams is the opening chapter in a sweeping chronicle from one of Norway's leading crime writers—a portrait of an extraordinary landscape, an exploration of hidden traumas and paths of silence that trouble history, and a haunting study in guilt and the bonds of blood.

(Books 2 and 3 of the Minnesota Trilogy have also been ordered for our Sons of Norway Library.)




"I can't go out because of the virus" sounds weak, whiny and boring.

Creamy Vegetable Soup with Chicken

(from Kevin Moberg, Sons of Norway member in Dickinson, ND)


Ingredients

- 1 small rutabaga
- 2 medium turnips
- 3 medium carrots
- 3 medium parsnips
- 3 stalks of celery
- 1 small white or vellow onion
- 1 small head of green cabbage
- 4 Tbsp. butter
- 1 cup frozen peas
- 1 can (about 14 oz.) cream-style corn
- 2 cups chicken stock
- 2 cups whole milk
- 1/2 Tbsp. dried thyme
- 1/2 Tbsp. garlic powder
- 3/4 to 1 oz. fresh dill weed, finely chopped (stems included)
- 1 cup roasted chicken, chopped or shredded
- 2 cups shredded Jarlsberg cheese

Olive oil

Kosher salt

Freshly cracked black pepper



Directions

Peel and dice the rutabaga and turnips into very small cubes. In a Dutch oven on the stovetop, heat a few tablespoons of olive oil and drop in the rutabaga and turnips to sauté over medium to medium -high heat, seasoning the vegetables lightly with salt and pepper and stirring occasionally.

While the rutabaga and turnips sauté, peel and dice the carrots and parsnips, and chop the celery, onion, and cabbage. Once softened and slightly browned, remove the rutabaga and turnips to a bowl and set aside.

Melt the butter in the Dutch oven and drop in the remaining chopped vegetables to sauté over medium to medium-high heat. Season lightly with salt and pepper, and stir to distribute the seasonings and move the top layers downward toward the heat. Repeat once or twice more to insure even seasoning. Stir occasionally.

Once the cabbage has softened and reduced in volume, return the sautéed rutabaga and turnips to the Dutch oven and stir in the frozen peas. Add the cream-style corn, chicken stock, milk, thyme, garlic powder, dill and chicken, then stir to mix all ingredients thoroughly. Cover and allow the soup to simmer for 15 to 20 minutes. Then stir in the Jarlsberg cheese until melted and serve.

(There are many versions of both cabbage soup and root vegetable soup from the Nordic countries and their various regions. This recipe combines cabbage and root vegetables (carrots, parsnips, rutabaga, and turnips) with still more vegetables, some protein (chicken), and other Scandinavian ingredients (butter, fresh dill, Jarlsberg cheese) for a creamy soup that is filling and delicious. Vær så god!)
