## Darren Donoghue, Playwright and Poet.



Darren's profile page on the Curtis Brown Agency website, tells us he is "...an award-winning Irish playwright and poet. His plays have been produced in Dublin, London, Edinburgh, Barcelona, Milan, Prague, Baltimore, Washington DC and New York." Darren's work has been nominated for and has won numerous awards including the Bread and Roses Playwriting Award, 2019 and the Radius Playwriting Competition, 2020 in association with Finborough Theatre. He was awarded the Dennis O'Driscoll Literary Award, 2020. His poetry has been shortlisted for the Hennessy Literary Award for "emerging poetry" in 2010 and 2015. This accomplished playwright and poet hails from Newbridge, Kildare, and now lives in Kilkenny and so is the pride of two counties. It is always so delightful to see one of our own achieve such wonderful national and international acclaim for their work.

I first knew Darren as a student in the Patrician Boys Secondary School, Newbridge, and as the younger brother of Michael, also a student there before him. And apart from being blood brothers what also connected them for me was their artistic nature, already they were carving a different path from the majority, their interests were in the musicals, the literary events, the wonderful world of words. Over the years our paths have criss-crossed many times in this literary space, in Crooked House Theatre, where I was first introduced to Darren's plays, and with Michael, in UCD, where we were both on the same master's in creative writing programme. It is an honour and privilege to call these two literary gentlemen friends, and why I am so much looking forward to April 23<sup>rd</sup>.

On April 23rd, Darren will be launching his first poetry collection in the Riverbank, Newbridge, an event not to be missed.

# Writing that short story!

## Thursday April 21st – Thursday May 12th

6.30pm-8.30pm

#### 4-week Online course

#### Cost €120

If you are thinking of entering the hugely prestigious Francis MacManus RTE Short Story competition, then this course will facilitate you in getting your story ready for the deadline of May 13<sup>th</sup>. Over the course of the four weeks, we will look at story openings, characterisation, point of view, plot, and theme as you are guided through handouts on craft, invited to partake in written activities, and encouraged to discuss the elements of craft encountered in assigned stories and in your own work.

There will be a reading assignment each week and your written goal will be to complete a short story.

The format for each class is as follows:

- 1. Introductory chat followed by a prompted 10-minute written exercise.
- 2. An instructive session, based on a PowerPoint/handout on the art of writing where a different element of craft is explored each week.
- 3. A short discussion referencing the **weekly reading assignment**.
- 4. Workshopping weekly written assignments from at least two students.
- 5. Concluding chat about the writing plans for the week ahead.

Writers of the short form you can expect to encounter include William Trevor, Eílís Ní Dhuibhne, Claire Keegan, Danielle McLaughlin, Flannery O' Connor, Raymond Carver, Carys Davies, and Kevin Barry.

Places are limited and usually book out fast.




