2022 Courses at Kildare Writing Centre.

1. Introduction to Creative writing, with a focus on the short Story.

Tuesday January 25th – Tuesday February 15th

7pm-9pm

4-week course

Cost €120

This four-week course (eight hours) is designed to facilitate you in writing a short story. Over the course of the weeks, we will look at story openings, characterisation, dialogue and setting as you are guided through handouts on craft, invited to partake in written activities, and encouraged to discuss the elements of craft encountered in assigned stories and in your own work.

There will be a reading assignment each week and your written goal will be to complete a short story.

While your manuscripts will not be workshopped during the classes, I will suggest that you share your work in progress with the group so that any references you make to your text during our discussions will be familiar and thus enable the sharing of ideas.

You will be encouraged to submit your story a fortnight after the classes finish to enable me to offer any advice, I think may be helpful.

Writers of the short form you can expect to encounter include William Trevor, Eílís Ní Dhuibhne, Claire Keegan, Danielle McLaughlin, Flannery O' Connor, Raymond Carver, Jhumpa Lahiri, Carys Davies, and Kevin Barry.

2. Writing Historical Fiction: The Art and the Craft.

Thursday January 27th – Thursday February 17th.

7pm-9pm

4-week course

Cost €120

Over the four weeks this course looks at what we mean by historical fiction, it explores why we write it, how it has changed in recent times, and what is involved when we decide that we have an idea we want to transform into a novel.

Each lesson will look at the art of historical fiction, the theories, the advice handed down from famous practitioners like Hilary Mantel, and the craft of historical fiction, how characterisation, dialogue, and setting are informed by a combination of fact/truth/imagination.

Reading and writing assignments will involve researching primary and secondary history sources, engaging with the work of other writers, writing first drafts of opening chapters, and formulating a methodology/work schedule that works for you.

3. Writing Creative non-fiction: memoir, autobiography, autofiction, the personal essay.

Saturday January 29th, 10am -4pm.

<u>Cost €75</u>

This facilitated one day, online workshop aims to explore the many ways in which we write about our life. Through free-writing activities, sharing of stories, and instructional handouts, you will be guided to a place of confidence and knowledge from where you can begin to tell your story.

Participants can expect to encounter and explore:

- Why Life-writing?
- Exercises that help you explore what it is you want to write.
- Truth and Memory in creative non-fiction
- Turning yourself into a character
- Thinking on every page
- The 'voice' in creative non-fiction
- The art of story and storytelling
- The shape of the story: form/structure in creative non-fiction.

4. Beginning the novel: the opening chapters and planning a schedule.

Saturday February 26th, 10am-4pm

Cost €75

This is an introduction to writing the novel. The course looks at the opening pages and what it is the writer needs to do to keep the reader reading. Whether you are coming with an idea for a novel or a completed first draft, this course is a must to teach you how to present your best work and avoid the slush pile!

Participants can expect to encounter and explore:

- Writing exercises aimed at discovering your passions and your voice.
- Story openings: what the reader expects in the first pages.
- Common errors and how to solve them
- Handling language and description.
- Revising and editing.
