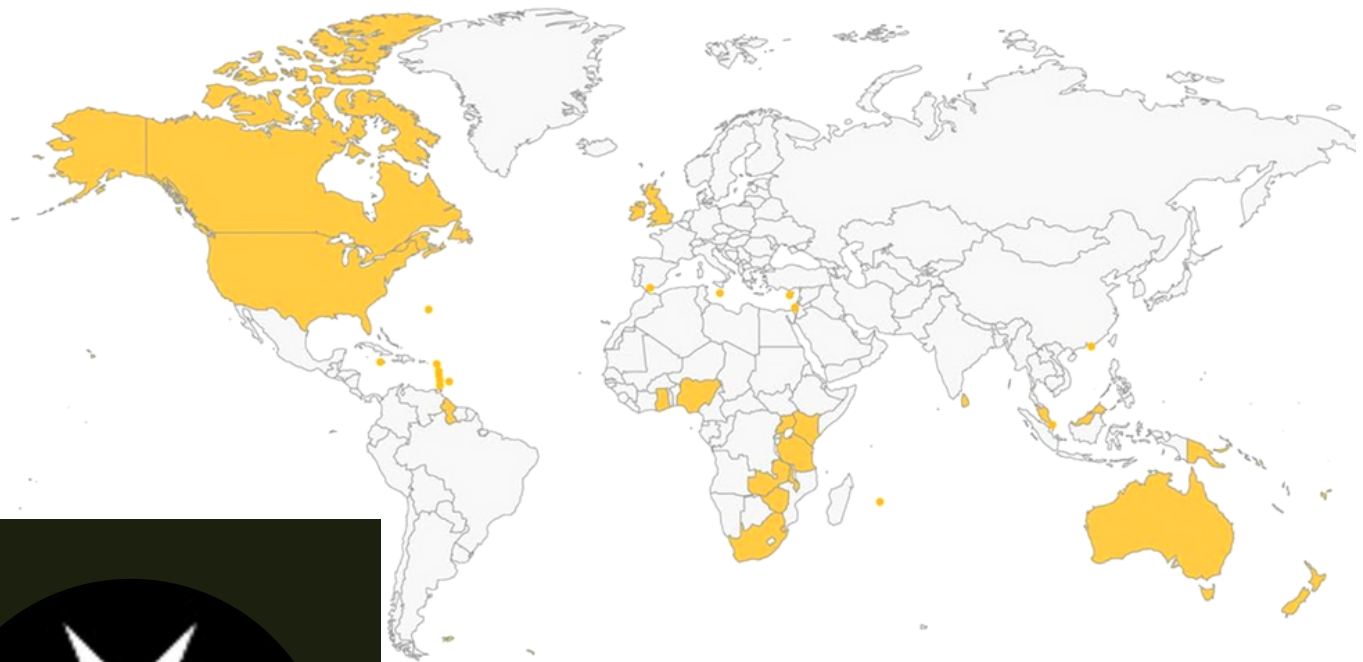

WHERE WE WORK

St. John delivers its charitable activities through local St. John organizations, which we call Establishments. They consist of Priories and Establishments.

Priories are larger St. John Establishments which assist in the running of The Order of St. John and in the delivery of its services and charitable projects. St. John currently has eleven of these Priories:

St. John delivers first aid, healthcare, and support services in more than 44 countries, mostly in the Commonwealth. From mobile clinics in Malawi, to eye clinics in the Palestinian Territories, ambulance services in Australia and New Zealand, kidney dialysis in Malaysia, hospice care in Antigua, and first aid worldwide, St. John provides thousands of people with essential medical care every day.



AFRICA

For decades, Africa has seen the life expectancy of its populations stunted by communicable and parasitical diseases that have mostly been stamped out in the developed world. Recently the region faces increasing rates of the non-communicable lifestyle diseases that have become the biggest killers in industrialised countries.

The healthcare challenges are heightened by the sheer diversity of the continent. Countries range from the resource-rich to the impoverished, from those with dynamic economies to those where conflict zones still simmer; they encompass large cities, remote villages, and nomadic lands. Nonetheless, there is still a large percentage of people who have limited access to sufficient and quality healthcare.

Operating in 11 countries, St. John is working tirelessly to bring healthcare closer to those that need it the most. From saving the lives of mothers and their babies in countries with some of the highest child and maternal mortality rates, to providing eye care to almost 25,000 people who might otherwise go blind, St. John helps them.



MEET SJA GHANA

St. John Ambulance Ghana (SJAG) was established in 1937 to begin emergency medical services in the country. Today, it is over 982 volunteers all over Ghana that assist in the operation of the agency. First Aid Training has been the most significant part of the work of St. John Ambulance Ghana.



MEET SJA KENYA

Started about 100 years ago in Kenya, SJA Kenya is distinguished as a first aid and ambulance services provider. Prehospital care, disaster management, maternal healthcare, road safety, and youth training are offered. SJA Kenya also aim to plant 200,000 trees by 2024.



MEET SJA MALAWI

In recent years, St. John in Malawi have taken on a leading role in saving the lives of mothers and babies in the St. John Mother and Baby Programme.



AMERICAS

The 21st century has brought new opportunities and challenges for the health of the populations in America, Canada, and in the Caribbean regions.

The Caribbean island states are classified as vulnerable due to the effects of climate change and natural disasters such as tropical storms. Therefore, St. John is established in **Antigua, Barbados, Bermuda, Canada, Dominica, Grenada, Guyana, Jamaica, St Lucia, Trinidad and Tobago and The United States of America.**

St. John's work in the Americas ranges from:

- delivering vital first aid training and disaster preparedness in the Caribbean,
- volunteer corps supporting military veterans in activities like the wheelchair regatta in the USA,
- highly innovative therapy dog programs in Canada.



Certifies more than 400,000 Canadians each year.

Over 430,000 volunteer hours are provided to communities each year.

5,500 public events covered with over 5,800 patients assisted.

Over 3,000 Therapy Dog teams provide 71,000 volunteer hours.

St. John Dominica is a national, voluntary organisation which is dedicated to providing quality care services to vulnerable, sick, and injured people, and the training and provision of first aid to enhance health, prevent injury, and save lives to all who need its services.



St. John Jamaica currently have over 150 adult volunteers and 100 cadets based all around the island providing over 10,000 hours of service to the communities. They have trained 1,000 people in first aid and have provided other healthcare activities such as home nursing to assist vulnerable, marginalised and at risk groups and communities especially children and the elderly.

The U.S. Priory is deeply committed to its primary mission of supporting and developing the St. John Eye Hospital Group (SJEHG), offering eye care in East Jerusalem, the West Bank and Gaza. The U.S. Priory also have the SJVC which assist U.S. Military Veterans and their families, Food Banks, Medical Reserve Corps and more.





ASIA PACIFIC

Despite levels of prosperity reached by some countries in the Asia Pacific region, people are stuck in poverty and poor health, with no sign of their being able to breach the barrier to better medical care.

In a region prone to natural disasters, Asia Pacific volunteers include preparation and planning for disasters in their community support. The work provided by St. John also ranges from free dental care for disabled people in Hong Kong, to dialysis centres in Malaysia.



SJA NEW-ZEALAND

In New Zealand, the St. John Ambulance Service treats and transports approximately 460,000 people every year. We have more than 1,000 operational vehicles and 206 ambulance stations. On average, their vehicles travel more than 17 million kilometres annually to attend around 330,000 emergency incidents. St. John provides emergency ambulance services to nearly 90% of New Zealanders.

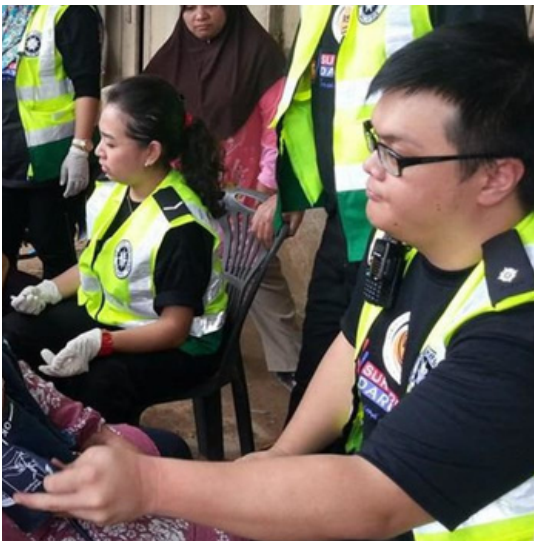
SJA HONG-KONG

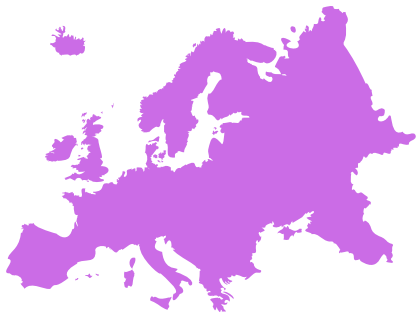
The St. John Ambulance Association in Hong Kong is responsible for training members of the public and for the Ambulance services on 24-hour basis. Over 6,221 volunteers have been trained to be efficient and competent at all times to perform public duties.



SJA MALAYSIA

SJAM members consist of more than 60,000 volunteers, volunteers have played a significant role during disaster and emergencies nationwide in Malaysia. They are always ready to serve, come rain or shine, anytime of the year. They also assist in disasters such as floods, fires and landslides not only in Malaysia but in other surrounding countries. SJAM actively plays a role in educating the public on the importance of learning First Aid and CPR skills to save lives. As a charitable organization, funded by donations, SJAM operates nationwide Emergency and Non-Emergency Ambulance Service as well as performing First Aid standby for all events.





EUROPE & MIDDLE-EAST

Europe is home to some of the oldest St. John Establishments, with beginnings dating back to 1070, St. John in Europe has not hesitated to move with the times.

Today, St. John provides some of the leading health services across Europe and the Middle East. This includes a world class ambulance service in the UK, a rescue corps in Malta and expert eye care in the West Bank, Gaza and East Jerusalem.



SJA MALTA

The St. John Rescue Corps was formed in 1986 to provide fully trained and organised volunteer rescuers who are able to support the national civil protection services in case of major calamities and situations requiring humanitarian aid.

Its members are trained in the field of urban search and rescue, firefighting and water rescue. It is regularly called upon for support at major fires, search and rescue operations and severe storms. The Rescue Corps also provides its services on a regular basis.



EYE HOSPITAL

In 2020 more than 142,800 patients were treated in the East Jerusalem Hospital and over 6,900 major operations performed. 176 staff members work daily in the hospital.

Our Muristan Clinic opened in 2016 and we saw over 400 patients in 2020 in our mobile Old City screening programme and Muristan Clinic.

We treated almost 30,000 patients in our Gaza Hospital and performed over 2,100 major operations. 40 staff members, including 32 medical, allied health and nursing professionals.



SJA ENGLAND

St. John Ambulance in England is the nation's leading first aid charity.

Every year, more than 400,000 people learn how to save a life through our training programmes, including hundreds of thousands of young people.

St. John volunteers provide first aid within their communities, keeping people safe at events, and working alongside the NHS in response to 999 calls. They are also always campaigning to raise awareness of first aid and directly educate the public.
