We took a pole at the February meeting and about 70% of the members present have sent letters to our senators and representatives asking them not to start charging us for TriCare for life. If you have not sent in your letter, please send it in today.

We are also in jeopardy of having cuts to the TRICARE Pharmacy Network. Another letter has been prepared for the Senators and our representative at the MOAA website.

The third and just as important letter to urge congress to Support Concurrent Receipt.

It's the start of a new Congress, and any legislation not signed into law during the previous Congress will need to be reintroduced.

So, contact your representative and senators and urge them to support the Major Richard Star Act, which would authorize combat-injured veterans to receive their full DoD retirement pay

WA State Legislative Update

As I write this, we are in Day 28 of the 2023 105-day Regular Session. As you know, when the new biennium starts, all bills that did not pass the last session die and must be reintroduced to be considered.

As of Friday, February 3rd, there were 31 veterans-related bills introduced—everything from extending:

B&O tax credits for businesses hiring military, to spouse employment issues, to mental health issues, to recognizing schools that "show a commitment to students and families connected to our military," to

property tax exemptions for service-connected disabled veterans.

We have one MOAA member, Col Bob Mead, USAF, Ret., on the Governor's Veterans Affairs Advisory Committee (VAAC).



The VAAC is hosted by the Washington Department of Veterans Affairs (WDVA) and presents four Townhalls around the state each year. The first of which was held in Vancouver on Feb 1.

David Puente Jr., who was recently appointed as WDVA Director after Alfie retired Jan 31, attended as did David Holt, newly appointed Director of the Portland Health Care System which also serves the SW WA area.

The WDVA staff gave several very informative presentations and one of the "leave behinds" was the WDVA 2022 in Review Flyer to the left.

One of the newest programs is the "Digital Navigator Program" which will be of interest to those of you who work with homeless or low-income veterans.

Through the "Digital Navigator" program WDVA has a limited number of initial 5G phones (and service) from T-Mobile available to veterans due to a \$2.5M grant (see WDVA 2022 In Review flyer) and is free of charge to veterans with IRS Form 1040 incomes of \$73,000 or less (contact presenter jeff.powell@dva.wa.gov). Treasurer's Report

Greetings to all and your treasurer will try to keep this portion relatively short and sweet this time. I'll be talking about monies (no surprise there!) in the following four broad areas:



Website Utilization. Member's utilization of the website has been increasing monthly and now makes up well more than half of everything received. Looking at the most recent financial report, for example, total monies received came to about \$1,100; of that, \$400 came in via cash or checks and the \$700 balance was received via the web. For another example, of the 23 separate meal reservations made for the February meeting, 5 were by mail or phone call and the remaining 18 being orders via the website. I like it!

Scholarships. We got off to a bit of a rocky start in January, with only \$51 going into the scholarship savings account. It wasn't a record, we have done worse (but only in one year). Thankfully, the pace picked up quite a bit in February with \$398 flowing into the coffers. That doesn't quite make us totally healthy; we're still slightly behind the trend line towards our goal, but I don't see any great difficulty in catching up. Thanks for your generous contributions so far.

Dues receipts have slowed a bit lately and we are stuck at about 70% paid up on annual dues for 2023. Please look at the 'arrears list' at the bottom of this section: If your name appears there, then as far as I know your dues are not paid for the year. *Dues*. The recruitment efforts being made by Terry

<u>Dues</u>. The recruitment efforts being made by Terry and Pat continue to pay dividends, and our membership has just ticked up to 86 in total.

Okay, now we are budgeting the support at the \$500 level for this year, that amount made possible by the very successful fundraiser we held last year; in that same vein, then, the support level for next year will be determined in large part by this year's buyout, which will be taking place in early June. JR has found an excellent comedy performance for us to enjoy and there's some chance that a magic show could be included in the evening somewhere as well, so - as soon as you can - get that date saved and make an effort to come out for a fun show, a fun evening, and a really good cause.


Our main scholarship of \$3000.00 is funded mainly by the ticket drawing in which we participate during our monthly meetings.

Captain James Patton, USN

Captain Patton is a retired submarine and surface warfare qualified officer with 30 years of

active service. He commanded the submarine USS VOLADOR in the Pacific Fleet and the Navy's Research & Development Center in San Diego. He holds a Ph.D. in Law and Diplomacy from The Fletcher School and served on Henry Kissinger's Policy Planning Staff from 1974 to 1977. From 1977 to 1982 he served Admiral Thomas B. Hayward, first at CINCPACFLT in Pearl Harbor as Head, War Plans Branch, and later, in the Pentagon, as Executive Director of the Chief of Naval Operations Executive Panel.

After a 20-year second career in R & D with Lockheed Martin Corporation he and his wife, Wendy, built their home on Whidbey Island. Captain Patton served as Executive Director of the Port of Coupeville from 2004 to 2014 and has also served as the President of the Whidbey Island Chapter of the Military Officers Association and the President of the Whidbey Island Water Systems Association.

The board of and the members of WICMOAA SADLY BUT FONDLY REMEMBER OUR **DEAR FRIEND AND** DEDICATED LEADER OF OUR Chapter, Larry Moses, Col, USA, Retired.



Larry passed away from a heart attack on February 1, 2023. During Larry's 30 plus years living on Whidbey Island, he "never stopped serving" in The Retired Officers Association (TROA), and then the Whidbey Chapter of the Military Officers Association of America (WICMOAA). He was also very active helping veterans with support volunteering for the DAV at the VFW.

DOD Program Changes

Congress provided for a Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) Open Season in the 2023 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). The SBP Open Season began on December 23, 2022 and ends on January 1, 2024.

As part of the SBP Open Season, eligible members and former members who are currently enrolled in either SBP or RCSBP may choose to permanently discontinue their SBP coverage.

Previously paid premiums will NOT be refunded. For Reserve Component Retirees: If you previously elected reserve component coverage and are already receiving retired pay, the Reserve Component Premium deductions (for the coverage already provided to you while you awaited the requisite age of entitlement to retired pay), sometimes referred to as "add-on" cost, will continue. Reserve Component Premium deductions generally continue until your retired pay has been reduced for a total of 360 months, or until the death of the RCSBP beneficiary.

The law generally requires that any currently covered spouse, former spouse or child aged 18-22 must concur under the 2023 NDAA Open Season. The covered party's signature must either be notarized or witnessed by an SBP counselor. Discontinuance requests will not be considered valid without these signatures.

What you need to do:

Before submitting a request to discontinue SBP coverage, we recommend you and your adult beneficiaries review the DFAS webpage on the advantages and disadvantages of the Plan at https://www.dfas.mil/sbpadvantages.

The SBP Open Season 2023 Discontinuance Form - Provisional is available for download from the DFAS SBP Open Season special focus webpage at https://www.dfas.mil/sbpopenseason23. Once downloaded, fill out the form, sign and date, and ensure all adult covered beneficiaries have their signature signed, dated and notarized or witnessed by an SBP counselor.

Completed and signed forms can be submitted either by uploading through our askDFAS online upload tool, via fax or through the mail. Specific instructions are on the 2023 SBP Open Season special focus webpage.



Brief for the Chapter Meeting

Captain Althoff, Captain Juliann Althoff Medical Corps, U.S. Navy

Commanding Officer, Navy Medicine Readiness and Training Command Oak Harbor Director, Naval Health Clinic Oak Harbor

"2023 Direction for the Clinic and Virtual Appointments"

Captain Althoff has served in a variety of leadership positions across the Navy, Marine Corps and the joint operating force. After flight surgeon training in Pensacola, FL in 1997, she served as flight surgeon for Carrier Air Wing NINE, deploying on an "around the world cruise" aboard the USS NIMITZ (CVN 68). Her next assignments were with the Helicopter Anti-Submarine Squadron 10 (HS-10) training squadron in San Diego, CA, and the Presidential Helicopter Squadron (Marine One) in Quantico, VA, where she oversaw a large flight-line clinic and traveled extensively in support of overseas Presidential missions.

As a public health and preventive medicine specialist, she served with III MEF in Okinawa, Japan as the Force Health Protection Officer and 3rd Marine Expeditionary Brigade Surgeon, where she planned, conducted and oversaw numerous HA/DR missions as both a member of the Humanitarian Assistance Survey Team (HAST) and as JTF/CJTF Surgeon.

After graduating from the U.S. Naval War College, Althoff was assigned to U.S. Pacific Command as the Preventive Medicine and Force Health Protection Officer, playing a key role in the coordinated medical response to Operation



Tomodachi, the unprecedented earthquake, tsunami and low-level radiological emergency in Japan.

In 2013, Althoff stood up the Navy Environmental and Preventive Medicine Unit SEVEN (NEPMU-7) in Rota, Spain as OIC, establishing critical public health and preventive medicine support to deployed and expeditionary forces throughout the European and African theaters.

Additionally, Althoff served in key headquarters positions including Executive Assistant for the Deputy Surgeon General of the Navy, and Executive Director for the Defense Health Board, the DoD's only Federal Advisory Committee on health, leading a team of civilian healthcare leaders and experts in providing the Military Health System with strategic, independent findings and recommendations.

In 2019, Althoff was selected as Chief Medical Officer and Director for Quality at Naval Medical Center San Diego, where she played an essential role in maintaining Joint Commission accreditation and leading the initial COVID pandemic response. Her last assignment was as Executive Officer, Naval Medical Research Unit Dayton, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio.

Althoff is board certified in Public Health and Preventive Medicine. Her awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal (5 awards), the Joint Commendation Medal (2 awards) and various additional service and unit awards.


Newsletter Editor's Comments
