
pastor of Washington Presbyterian Church, who will be 100 years young next month (January 2024). Her presence was a delightful inspiration!



Last month, on November 5th, Zion Baptist Church celebrated two of their Pastor's anniversaries. The first anniversary was their pastors 52nd as a preacher, and the second anniversary was his 7th as the pastor of Zion Baptist Church.

Dr. Alick has earned a bachelor's degree from Bishop College in Dallas, TX, a master's degree from the Morehouse School of Religion in Atlanta, GA, and a doctorate

Dr. Jo-Elle Mogerman Makes History

Dr. Jo-Elle Mogerman is the new President and CEO of the Philadelphia Zoo. She is, indeed, a monumental history maker, for she is the first woman and the first black to become the president and CEO of the oldest zoo in the United States.

Mogerman has sterling credentials. Prior to her appointment to the Philadelphia Zoo last month (November), she was the director of the St. Louis (MO) Zoo Wildlife Park for four years. From 2017 to 2019, Mogerman was the

vice president for learning and community at the Shedd Aquarium in Chicago, IL. Dr. Mogerman has also held an adjunct faculty appointment (2013-2023) at DePaul University in Chicago, IL; she teaches regularly online.

Mogerman earned a Bachelor's Degree in biology from Macalester College in Saint Paul, MI, a Master of Science Degree in conservation biology from the University of Minnesota, and a PhD. Degree from the University of Chicago in biology.

Our neighboring city of brotherly love is blessed to have this dynamic sister directing their zoo.

children, and this world needs authentic inclusivity.

When I mentioned the word authentic, it's because I noticed many companies started looking to be more inclusive lately, and this is wonderful but I will tell you that as a Latina we can tell when we are only being included in something just for a company or brand to look inclusive, but we are not truly welcomed. Make sure your company or business inclusivity is authentic.

I asked a few Black friends of mine a few questions before drafting this article, and they agreed that including a Black Santa was overdue. Someone even thanked me for bringing up this topic of

should not be just behind closed doors but everywhere they go.

As a Latina, I taught my kids the meaning of "representation." I have nephews and nieces who are partially Black and I want them to feel that we respect their ancestors as well as our own. Representation should be everywhere and that is what a Black Santa means to many in the Black community and other communities as well. We Latinos have our 3 Kings Day celebrations and our three kings usually come in three colors, white, beige, and black and that is very normal for us as we come in all different shades as well.

I mentioned the topic of Black Santa specifically because of the holidays; however, this applies to many other areas such as the need for Black superheroes. Have you ever seen a Black Superman or Batman on the big Hollywood screens? The Black community needs to be represented more; it should be normal to see a Black Santa or Batman. This is why the movie Black Panther made over 1.344 billion USD. Representation needs to be everywhere, not just on the football field or the basketball court. Children of color need to see themselves not only as doctors, teachers, and mentors but also as superheroes, not just actors but the directors of their movies like Tyler Perry and even more Black presidents. This helps children not only feel included but also helps them understand that they too can achieve their goals and dreams.

Happy Holidays, be inclusive not just because you do not want to be pointed out or because it feels cool to do so but because you understand that we are all the same and we all deserve greatness. I leave you with this quote; "In diversity there is beauty and there is strength" - Maya Angelou.



Title: Damaged, But Not Destroyed: From Trauma to Triumph

Mike Todd is a brilliant writer as well as a dynamic preacher. Far too many writers do not speak well, and far too many eloquent speakers are not good writers. Like Rev./Dr. Michael Eric Dyson, Todd is magnificent in both areas. His eloquent sermons are available, visually and audibly, online.

The book, *Damaged*, *But Not Destroyed: From Trauma to Triumph* is a masterpiece. Similar to Sigmund Freud, Todd reveals that all of us receive psychological damage at early ages that can affect us negatively. The damage may be unconsciously negatively affecting us. He encourages us to identify, and use God to turn the damage into triumphs. It is a manual or workbook that encourages readers to write in the book via creative acronyms such as HOT = Be Humble, Open, Transparent and H.U.S.H. = Hear from God. Understand progressively. (Get to the HEART of the matter) to address our issues.

Todd gives biblical examples of damaged people, and he provides 18 biblical (scripture) references about "straight from God's mouth" of our validation.









FAMOUS BLACKS BORN IN DECEMBER

Madam C. J. Walker (1867 - 1919)

Madam C. J. Walker, who was born on December 23, 1867 in Delta Fifth Military District, LA, was a very successful entrepreneur and philanthropist; she was also a political and social activist. Her birth name was Sarah Breedlove. However, after marrying Charles Joseph Walker, she took on the name Madam C. J. Walker.

First, Walker learned from her brothers, who were barbers, the basic elements of hair grooming. Later, she worked for Annie Malone. a successful wealthy African American hair-stylist entrepreneur. Moreover, her husband Charles Joseph Walker, was an advertising and public relations professional. After developing products for grooming straightening kinky hair, she combined all of the previously learned skills to develop a company which hired and trained thousands of women to promote her products while working for her company and independently in their own businesses. Those women working for her company were rewarded for sales and for recruiting other women to work for her Madam C. J. Walker Manufacturing Company.

From 1906-1908, Madam C. J. Walker assigned her daughter, A'Lelia to the mail order responsibilities of her business, while she and her husband traveled all over the USA promoting her enterprise.

At the time of her death in 1919, Walker was the richest African American woman in the USA, and her daughter continued expanding the business abroad in Cuba, Jamaica, Haiti, Panama, and Costa Rica.

At the height of her financial success, between 1911 and 1919, Walker made monumental contributions for the betterment of humankind. Specifically, she played a major role in the establishment of a YMCA in the Black community in Indianapolis, IN. Moreover, she contributed scholarship funds to Tuskegee Institute (now Tuskegee University). Walker also made financial contributions to Bethel AME Church, the Mary McLeod Bethune Industrial School for Negro Girls (now Bethune Cookman University in FL), the Palmer Memorial Institute in NC, and the Haines Normal Institute in GA. Madam C. J. Walker employed Vertner Tandy, the first licensed black architect in New York City, and a founding member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, for the designing of her mansion at Irvington-on-Hudson, NY.

Finally, Walker delivered numerous motivational speeches to major black national organizations about her rise from poverty to wealth.

Jay Z (1969 -)

Shawn Corey Carter, whose stage name is Jay Z, was born in Brooklyn, NY on December 4,1969; he is a phenomenally successful rapper, record producer, and entrepreneur. This year, 2023, Billboard and Vibe, the most prominent music industry publications, named Jay Z the greatest rapper of all time.

Jay Z's prowess, as a performer, is just a part of his overall monumental success as a record producer and entrepreneur. Jay Z is the founder and chairman of Roc Nation, and he was the president and chief executive officer of Def Jam Recordings. His leadership of both organizations has enabled him to assist numerous other successful artists. He founded Roc Nation in 2008, a multidisciplinary entertainment agency.

Jay Z's other business ventures include Rocawear, a clothing retail enterprise, which he founded in 1999, the 40/40 Club, a luxury bar chain, which he founded in 2003, and Aspiro (which was expanded to Tidal), a media streaming business. Currently, 2023, Jay Z's net worth is 2.5 billion dollars.

- 1. Shawn Corey Carter, aka Jay Z, and Beyonce Knowles have a combined net income of almost 3 billion dollars.
- 2. Pamela A. Smith was confirmed on November 8, 2023 as the Chief of Police of Washington, DC.
- 3. Gabe Amo, a former White House aid for President Barack Obama, was elected to the United States Congress in Rhode Island on November 7, 2023.
- 4. Bass Reeves (1838 1910) was the former slave who became one of the first black deputy US Marshalls, and first African American to serve in that role west of the Mississippi River.
- 5. Dori Miller was awarded the Navy Cross for his heroic deeds during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in Hawaii on December 7, 1941. First, he helped to carry wounded sailors to safety. Then, he manned an anti-aircraft gun, and in spite of having no previous training in gunnery, shot down 4 enemy planes. The destroyer escort/Knox-class, USS Miller, which was in service from 1973 to 1991, was named after him.
- 6. Rev. Gardner C. Taylor was known as the "dean of American preaching."
- 7. Rev. Mordecai W. Johnson was the first Black president of Howard University.
- 8. Dr. Charles R. Drew was the surgeon and pioneer in the preservation of blood plasma.
- 9. The former Bessie Reese (Now Bessie Crenshaw) graduated from Kutztown University in 1950.
- 10. Matthew A. Henson (1866-1955) was the American explorer who accompanied Robert Peary on 7 trips to the Arctic area over a period of 23 years.


