

Dr. Ingram Wallace + Jackson = Sound Advice



On Monday, January 8, 2024, two dynamic educators, Dr. Brenda Ingram Wallace and Dr. James Jackson, were the guest panelists on the Berks Community Television (BCTV) program, "*Diversity: The Wider Vision.*" They blessed the viewers with invaluable advice about the current status and future expectations regarding the psychology and spirituality of African Americans. Dr. Ingram Wallace, a clinical psychologist, and First Lady of Lincoln

Park Community United Methodist Church (Reading, PA) is the Associate Vice President for Inclusion at Albright College. Dr. Jackson is Associate Professor of Psychology at Kutztown University and the Pastor of Second Baptist Church of Asbury Park in Asbury, NJ.

They made us aware that the recent pandemic had a big impact on, as well as an indication of, a greater need for mental health services on in-person church attendance. They asserted that the availability of virtual church services and increased collaborations between pastors and mental health professionals were addressing these issues. They said that church attendance continues to be predominated by older worshippers, and that exciting creative activities are needed to increase the participation of teenagers and young adults.

Dr. Jackson talked about the use of both zoom and audio-only telephone administration of worship is important for senior worshippers. The audio-only telephone arrangements are good for senior worshippers who are not capable of using computers.

One of the important points made by Dr. Ingram Wallace is the fact that we should not be overwhelmed by some of the intergenerational differences about challenging topics such as homosexuality and music preferences. She asserted that we need to have the courage to have challenging, honest conversations and respect each other in spite of our differences.

Another instructive part of the program was the fact that Dr. Ingram Wallace, (as a First Lady), and her husband, Rev. Dr. Quinton Wallace have successfully pastored three interracial congregations. They are indeed trend setters in the integration of worship in our churches.


Book Review _

Title:

Chained to the System: The History and Politics of Black Incarceration in America Arthur H. Garrison

This book is a history of Black incarceration in the United States of America. An explanation is set forth for the disproportionate arrests and incarceration of Blacks. It began with the forced migration of Africans to America where they were enslaved for the purpose of serving Whites. Garrison uses the term "white social conservatives" world view in which he describes as having a negative impact on Blacks. Moreover, he asserts that this world view formed the basis for

states' rights and the justification for slavery before the Civil War as well as the racist Jim Crow system which occurred after the Civil War. Garrison maintained that the USA has never lived up to the great principles of the Judeo-Christian faith, the Enlightenment ideals of individual freedom, and rule of law outlined in its Constitution. Garrison further asserts that this world view maintains that Blacks are criminogenic.


In this book, Garrison revealed that after the Civil War, the southern agricultural industry and the newly developed industrial capital (because of the building of railroads and coal mining) needed the source of labor that had been supplied by slavery. Vagrancy Laws enabled the arrest and imprisonment of Blacks and a supply of labor by those imprisoned.

The reader of this book can clearly see that crime is inaccurately portrayed in the USA as black. Garrison provided data that indicated that the use of crack by whites was equal to the use of crack by blacks and rapes by whites was equal to rapes by Blacks. One of his most startling revelations was that the superstar African American actor, Denzel Washington, in spite of starring in numerous positive roles, was awarded an Oscar for his role as a bad policeman. Poverty, rather than race, is the primary motivation for crime. The occurrences of crime are low in upper class Black neighborhoods, and high in poor Black and White neighborhoods.

We need more Black journalists and brilliant authors, like Dr. Authur Garrison, to report the news and history accurately.

FAMOUS BLACKS BORN IN FEBRUARY

Martin Kilson (1931 - 2019)

Martin Luther Kilson, Jr., who was born on February 14, 1931 in East Rutherford, NJ, was a political scientist. He was the first Black academic to be appointed a full professor at Harvard University; he was the Frank G. Thomson Professor of Government from 1988 until his Martin Luther Kilson, Jr. retirement in 1999. The "Harvard

Gazette" referred to him as "a scholar of class and power... who addressed the challenges facing African Americans." Prior to earning a Master's Degree and a Doctorate at Harvard University, he earned a Bachelors degree at Lincoln University in Pennsylvania.

At the start of his career, Dr. Kilson became known for his research into African American Studies, and he was an advisor of African American students at Harvard.

Kilson was praised by his peers for his book, Political Change in a West African State: A Study of the Modernization Process in Sierra Leone.

Finally, Kilson was in demand as a speaker about government both before and after his retirement.



Alice Walker (1944-)

Alice Malsenior Tallulah-Kate Walker, who was born on February 9, 1944 in Eatonton, GA, is an American novelist, short story writer, poet, and social activist. In 1983, she became the first African American woman to be awarded the Pulitzer Prize for fiction for her novel, The Color Purple.

Walker has been a prolific writer publishing seventeen novels and short stories and twelve non-fiction works.


In 1985 Oprah Winfrey starred in the film, The Color Purple, which was directed by Stephen Spielberg, and in December 2023, Winfrey produced a second version of the same film.

Walker is also responsible for bringing attention to Zora Neal Hurston, the African American author and anthropologist.



Carter G. Woodson: The Father of Black History Month



Millions of Americans of virtually all races and ethnic groups are now participating in activities that commemorate Black History Month. This is a wonderful activity because we (Blacks, Whites, Browns, and Yellows) are interconnected. What effects one affects all of us.

The originator of Black History Month was the famous historian, Carter G. Woodson. He earned degrees from

Berea College (Bachelors Degree), the University of Chicago (a Bachelors Degree and a Masters Degree), and Harvard University (a Doctor of Philosophy Degree). In fact, he was the second African American (W.E.B. DuBois was the first) to earn a doctorate from Harvard.

In 1926, Woodson started the celebration of "Negro History Week." He chose the second week in February because Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln were born in that week. Beginning in 1970, the Black United Students and Black Educators at Kent State University celebrated Black History Month in February. Beginning in 1976, every American president has designated February as Black History Month. Woodson is also famous for founding the Association of the Study of African American Life and History.



Black Joy By Ashley R. Jones, MS

Black lives matter, but what matters in Black Life? Black Joy is something we don't always acknowledge. What about the little things that give us our spark in life? Do you know what your sparks are? To be Black comes with the skill of resourcefulness

and splashes of creativity. To be Black is to be empowered. Fueled by the experiences of our ancestors and their plight. However, the topic of our joys are rarely highlighted yet our struggles remain the focus point in various situations. Black Joy for me is pteace, moments in nature, and pieces of art I find myself creating. A solitude of simply being my authentic self.

We live in such a world of fast paced moments, we forget to simply enjoy the

experience in the moment. Think about the last time you truly lived instead of existed. Our lives become so routine that we become victims to the mundane. We don't appreciate the simple beauty in life- like the random works of architecture fixated on Penn Street. The sounds of genuine playfulnessmasked by the overexaggerated speakers. space and use your environment as inspiration. Soundscapes or even just the sounds around you, close your eyes and become comfortable. Use your senses, all five of them and internally explore what you're taking in, in the moment.

> Briefly escape from the chaos of life and find your peace. Think of the things that make you smile, make you laugh. Question yourself. When was the last time that you've laughed? Think of a time you've felt so free and light, as if you would float above the earth with your toes gracing the atmosphere. This is joy. What made you lose your sense of simplicity? Why have you robbed yourself of simple joys?

Music is a source of joy and an

expression of pain. When was the last time you've heard words and felt them instead of simply singing along to a tune or a rap lyric. Truly listen and open your eyes to more than just the background but the actual message. Food is also a source of joy. To taste a piece of melted chocolate on your tongue, to feel the textures of peanuts and their melody of crunch. Allow yourself to truly taste something rather than just consuming it. Food unlocks the soul and is a clear pathway to the heart. Soul feed and joy-filled.

Joy is around us and is easily captured if you allow yourself to unravel the tight-knit fibers of your guard. Allow yourself to pick at the strands dangling and watch the weaving unweave. Don't allow the world to steal your joy. Allow joy to be contagious. Smile at a stranger, give a warm hug. Eat something that makes your belly full. Read a book or write a poem. See yourself for who you want to be and welcome joy with open arms.
