U.N. Handbook on Gender Mainstreaming

On March 1, 2025, Wilson High School junior Journii Spencer set a personal best record in the girls triple jump event at the Roosevelt Invitational in Eastville, California, with a jump of 38' 6-1/2". Spencer's jump was more than three feet longer than the 2nd place female competitor Raelyn Pleasant and more than four feet longer than the 3rd place female competitor Aubrey Rumford.

During the same meet, Polytech High School junior Kylani Gaines jump of 17' 3" was within 1" of her personal best in the girls long jump event. Gaines jump was 16 ½" longer than 2nd place female competitor Aubrey Rumford, and 20" longer than the 3rd place female competitor Cidni Hordista.

On May 17, 2025, Crean Lutheran High School junior Reese Hogan set both a school and personal best record in the Division 3 triple jump event at the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) girls' track and field finals. Hogans jump of 37'2" was 8 ½" longer than 2nd place female competitor Sofia Jara and 15" longer than the 3rd place female competitor Kezia Gavlak.

During the same meet, La Canada High School senior Katie McGuinness had a jump of 18' 9 ½" in the girls long jump. McGuinness' jump was 6 ¼" longer than 2nd place female competitor Kaia Musalborn and 14 ¾" longer than the 3rd place female competitor Sofia Jara.

On May 24, 2025, Norco High School senior Kaylee Best set a personal best jump of 39' 6" at the CIF-SS Masters Meet to qualify for the State Championships. Bests jump was 1 ¼" longer than 2nd place female competitor Skyler Cazale and 10" longer than the 3rd place female competitor Journii Spencer.

During the same meet, Kaylee Best also had a jump of 19' $\frac{3}{4}$ " in the girls long jump. Best' jump was 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ " longer than 2^{nd} place female competitor Loren Webster and 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ " longer than the 3^{rd} place female competitor Zenani Guannu.

But Journii Spencer, Kylani Gaines, Reese Hogan, Katie McGuinness and Kaylee Best were never awarded 1st place medals for their efforts in those meets. Instead, AB Hernandez, a junior from Jurupa Valley High School, and a biological boy, took center spot on the podium in all six events.

Hernandez won four 1st place medals and center position on the winners podium by beating Journii Spencer by 2' 7 ½", Reese Hogan by 4' 2" and Kaylee Best by 10 ¾" in the triple jump events and beating Katie McGuinness by 5 ¼", Kylani Gains by 19" and Kaylee Best by 3 ¾" in the long jump events.

Journii Spencer, Reese Hogan, Katie McGuinness, Kylani Gains and Kaylee Best, all biological females, were bumped down to 2nd place medals. Raelyn Pleasant, Aubrey Rumford, Sofia Jara, Kaia Musalborn, Skyler Cazale and Loren Webster, all biological females, were bumped down to 3rd place medals. Aubrey Rumford, Cidni Hordista, Kezia Gavlak, Sofia Jara Journie Spencer and Zenani Guannu, all biological females, were bumped down to 4th place and from the top three winners podium altogether. As a result of their fourth place finishes in the qualifying meet, both Journii Spencer and Zenani Guannu failed to qualify for the state championship meet. A biological male trans athlete will be taking their place instead.

As a result of 'his' efforts competing against biological female athletes, Hernandez "earned" the No. 1 ranking in the Triple Jump category going into the California state championship meet that takes place May 31. [1][2][3]

In protest of the unfairness of Californias gender identity sports policy, which states "You have the right to play on a sports team that aligns with your gender identity" Hogan later returned to the winners podium and posed for photos in her rightful 1st place position as the girls triple jump winner. ^{[4] [5]}

Hogans fellow athletes were quick to rally to her cause, and girls, parents and others across California were wearing "Protect Girls Sports" tee shirts at ensuing track meets.



This did not go over well with officials from the California Interscholastic Federation. The athletes were forced to remove the tee shirts in order to compete at the CIF Southern Section Division 3 Prelims. ^[6]

"Per the CIF Southern Section Playoff Bulletin, all athletes must be dressed in proper, school issued, track uniforms. The student-athletes were asked to comply with this while in the on-field event area, as they were wearing said shirts over their school-issued uniform," said the CIF in an official statement.

Witnesses at the meet told reporters covering the story that officials didn't order other athletes to take off their shirts that were outside of school approval, only the ones wearing "Protect Girls Sports."

The California Interscholastic Federation ban on the tee shirts this spring mirrored actions against a similar protest last fall, when students at Martin Luther King High School in Riverside, California, were told by school officials they couldn't wear t-shirts that read "Save Women's Sports." Athletic department school officials allegedly forced the students to remove or conceal the shirts, claiming they created a "hostile" environment and comparing wearing these shirts to wearing a swastika in front of Jewish students. Sixteen year old Rylee Morrow, one of the student athletes who filed a lawsuit against school administrators, spoke at a Riverside Unified School District board meeting in November 2024 saying, "I'm constantly affected by the actions taken place this season, and I have been around the females, and just my team in general, who have felt almost silenced to speak out about it, because the whole LGBTQ is shoved down our throats! We live in a society where it's almost impossible to speak out on it without facing repercussions." Morrow concluded her testimony by expressing how "unsafe" the entire situation has made her feel as a girls' athlete being forced to share a locker room with a biological male. "It is not okay that I have to be in position, and I have to see a male in booty shorts, and having to see that around me, as a 16-year-old girl I don't see that as a safe environment," Morrow said. "Going into a locker room and seeing males in there, I don't find that safe, I don't find going to the bathroom safe when there's guys in there. *It's not okay*. *I'm a 16-year-old girl!"* [8] [9]

Remember Will Thomas/Lia Thomas, the U. Penn trans swimmer? Will swam for the University of Pennsylvania men's team for two years before chemically transitioning to a female. 'He' then competed on the U. Penn women's swim team for the next two seasons, without surgically transitioning to female. Will's biological female teammates were forced to strip naked in the locker-room with a biological male with his 'junk' hanging out, multiple times a day, six days a week. U. Penn athletic officials told the swimmers they would just have to deal with the situation. These female athletes were in their twenties, unlike Rylee Morrow, but still spoke of how uncomfortable the situation was for *them*.

One of the other student athletes, 16-year old Taylor Starling, recounted how she was bumped from the Martin Luthor King varsity track team by a transgender athlete. "My initial reaction was like, I was really surprised, because it was like, 'Why is this happening to me? There's a transgender student on the team. Why am I getting displaced when "I've worked so hard and gone to all of the practices, and this student has only attended a few of the practices." Starling sued state Attorney General Rob Bonta over failure to enforce Title IX standards *to protect female athletes*, after losing her spot on the varsity track team. "I felt angry when I was removed from my varsity team because I knew the requirements were changed for him because he is transgender. I felt like my sacrifice, hard work, and dedication didn't matter to my school administrators because I am a girl."

The transgender athlete at the center of this controversy, is identified only as M.L. The lawsuit filed by three of 'his' teammates notes that M.L. is an 11th grader who transferred to Martin Luthor King at the beginning of this year. According to the lawsuit, M.L. did not train for as many hours with the team, and did not show up to all required events. And yet, M.L., who posted faster times, was given a top spot, and Starling was knocked out of the "Team Sweepstakes" portion of the Mt. SAC meet. Taylor Starling, the lawsuit said, thus "missed opportunities to compete at a high-profile meet, losing valuable chances for college recruitment and recognition."

Note: When Will (sorry, Lia) Thomas competed for U. Penn at the NCAA 2022 Championships, 'his' spot in the meet prevented biological female U. Penn swimmer Ellen Holmquist the opportunity to compete in the 2022 Ivy League Championships." [10]

Ironically, Martin Luther King Jr. spoke out for women who were denied equality, and he organized for women who were victims of oppression. King knew that women's rights were civil rights. Apparently, administrators at today's Martin Luthor King High School don't feel the same way.

The California Interscholastic Federation finally bowed to the unrelenting pressure from student athletes, parents and the White House on May 27th, announcing a rule change to expand the field of competitors in events at the CIF State Track and Field Championships. "Under this pilot entry process, any biological female student-athlete who would have earned the next qualifying mark for one of their Section's automatic qualifying entries in the CIF State meet, and did not achieve the CIF State at-large mark in the finals at their Section meet, was extended an opportunity to participate in the 2025 CIF State Track and Field Championships." The rule change applies *only* for this year's Championship meet!

This Orwellian doublespeak statement by CIF, admitted the unfair advantage that AB Hernandez, M.L. and other transgender athletes have, offering the "solution" not to ban them from participation, but to allow those biological female athletes bumped from qualifying for the Championship meet to still participate. This, is small consolation to the biological female athletes who will be competing against AB Hernandez this weekend in the state championships. 'He' is now ranked as one of the top athletes in California, ranked by athletic.net No. 1 in the triple jump and No. 2 in the long jump.

Live Ball Sports, a website that reports on High School sports across the country, "celebrated" AB Hernandez' "triumph" as a transgender athlete on its website.

AB Hernandez, a junior at Jurupa Valley High School, has made headlines by winning two CIF titles in girls track and field. Despite facing backlash over her identity as a transgender athlete, her outstanding performances in the long jump and triple jump have garnered significant support from the community. With a determination to break down stereotypes, AB embodies resilience and champions inclusivity in sports as she prepares for upcoming championships.

The article went on to boast how a biological boy (Hernandez) beat two biological girl athletes (Katie McGuinness and Reese Hogan), with multiple exclamation points!!! [11]

The 105th CIF State Track & Field Championships were held on May 30-31 at Buchanan High School in Clovis, California. On Friday, the preliminary qualifying rounds were held for all events. The top twelve finishers would move on to compete in Saturdays championship round, but in the three events A.B. Hernandez was part of, the girls high jump, triple jump and long jump, the top 13 finishers were allowed to compete. In the championship round, Hernandez tied for first place in the varsity high jump at 7' 0", with two biological girl athletes. Hernandez placed first in the girls varsity triple jump, with a jump of 42' 2 ¾", jumping 9 ¾" longer than the 2nd place female competitor. In the triple jump, Loren Webster jumped 21' ¼" to take first place with AB Hernandez finishing 2nd with a jump of 20' 8 ¾". [12]

Trans activists were quick to point out that the biological female athletes were not denied first place medals or bumped down in position. But the fact remains that biological female athletes were forced to share the podium and medals with a biological male who had an unfair advantage against many of 'his' female competitors.

At the same state championship meet, Madison Mosby, a senior at St. Mary's Academy, was the fastest female runner in the varsity 400 meter dash, with a time of 53.52 seconds. Clara Adams, a sophomore at North Salinas High School and a biological male, crossed the finish line first with a time of 52.24 seconds, just one-hundredth of a second slower than the *state-leading time* 'he' achieved the week prior.

Adams celebrated by running over to 'his' father after the race had ended. He produced a fire extinguisher that Clara grabbed and sprayed 'his' shoes - as if to say that they were on fire. For this inappropriate celebration, Adam's was disqualified in the 400 meter event and stripped of his championship. Adam's was also disqualified from the meet as a whole - denying 'him' the chance to race in a 200-meter event later. Clara's father told reporters that he felt the decision was "racially motivated." Adams is black so his response is predictable.

The same weekend that California was holding the state track and field championships, Minnesota was holding its state girls softball tournament championships. The Champlain Park Rebels, with an overall record of 17-2 and a 12 game win streak, was competing for the Class 4A Softball Championship. The Rebels star pitcher, Champlain Park junior Marissa Rothenberger, is arguably the top high school softball pitcher in the state, with a 0.86 ERA (earned runs per game) with 92 strikeouts in 73 innings pitched and a record of 10 wins and 1 loss. In the championship tournament, Rothenberger pitched fourteen shutout innings over two consecutive games to defeat the *defending state champs*. [13] [14] As a sophomore, Rothenberger helped Champlin Park win 14 games in a row heading into the state playoffs, earning First Team All-State honors.

17-year old Marissa Rothenberger was born Charlie Dean, a biological male. At the age of nine, his parents had Charlies name and sex changed on his birth certificate. This allowed Charlie to live as a girl and to participate in girls' sports in Minnesota. Only recently has Marissa's biological male status been found out. The average speed of a 17-year old female right hand pitcher is 55-56 miles per hour at a distance of about 43-feet. According to observers, Rothenberger grew five inches since the previous spring. Now standing six feet tall, Marissa's pitches are faster with more movement than what most girls see in softball. As noted by one softball parent, "when someone throws that hard, the chances of injury go up. It's just a different level of physicality."

In Addenda #4 – March 2025, I noted the case of Donavan Brown, a junior at East Valley High School. In 2022 and 2023, Donavan participated on the boys varsity track team in Division 2A. In 2023, Donavan was ranked #2 in the 800 meters, and ranked #1 in the 1600 meters, 1 mile and 3200 meters events in the Division 2A. Greater Spokane League. But in 2023, Donavan failed to qualify for the state championships in any event. In 2024, Donavan participated on the East Valley High School girls track and field team under the name Veronica Garcia. This time, at the State Championships Veronica won the state title in the Woman's 400 meter dash, beating the 2nd place runner, Lauren Matthew, by a full second. Veronica's time of 55.75 seconds would not have even qualified 'him' in the Men's 400-meter run. Donavan continues to handily beat 'his' biological girl competitors in 2025. In the Washington state track and field championships, Veronica Garcia again won the Women's 400 meter dash, beating junior Lauren Matthew for a second consecutive year by more than a full second. Neither Loren Matthew or her teammate Quincy Adams, who placed fifth in the 400-meter event, took their place on the winner's podium.

Since Donavan graduates this year, maybe next year Lauren (right) will finally receive the first place trophy she deserves.



In 1995 the United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women, endorsed gender mainstreaming as a global strategy to achieve "gender equality and empowerment of women and girls." Since 1995, U.N. Women has worked tirelessly to introduce gender mainstreaming into all policies and programs of the United Nations and its member nations. In the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, Member States made a clear commitment to the goals of gender equality and women's rights and empowerment through gender mainstreaming in all areas of sustainable development: political, social, economic and environmental development. "We are the global champion for gender equality" [16]

Mainstreaming, is defined as "the process of making something start to be considered normal." The United Nations, at the urging of second and third wave feminists (See Addenda #4 – March 2025) began the process of forcing us to accept alternate genders as being "normal" and to accept their inclusion into society; in our schools, our bathrooms, and on the sports field, without question or complaint. To fight against these mandates was to be labeled transphobic, trans bashing and eventually to charges of discrimination. Speaking the truth about biological sex has become "hate speech." Speaking out about the advantages that trans female athletes have, subjects biological female athletes to sanctions by athletic officials and vilification by the liberal mainstream media and violence from trans activists.

Enough states and municipalities have followed the U.N. Mainstreaming platform, and enough Progressive school board officials and judges have been elected to enforce those platform mandates, that claiming a boy is a girl, claiming that men can menstruate and breast feed, claiming that a biological boy has no inherent advantage over a biological girl in sports, is now accepted by many as fact. *Gender normalization* has been achieved in our society and the original feminists have gone right along with this normalization, at the expense of the biological women they claimed to protect and advocate for.

In 2013, California became the first state in the nation to mandate transgender rights in K-12 public schools. California bill AB1266, titled *Pupil rights: sex-segregated school programs and activities*, prohibited public K-12 schools from "discriminating" on the basis of specified characteristics, including gender, gender identity, and gender expression. [17] As a result of this law, K-12 students were allowed to access which ever bathroom and locker rooms they wanted, based on their gender identity and not their biological sex. By 2018, seventeen more states plus the District of Columbia had passed similar "anti-discrimination" laws and more than 200 municipalities had adopted similar ordinances. [18] Governor Brown proudly proclaimed that AB1266 would also allow students the right "to participate in sex-segregated programs, activities and facilities" based on the gender they claimed to be instead of their biological sex.

Journii Spencer, Kylani Gaines, Reese Hogan, Katie McGuinness, Kaylee Best, Raelyn Pleasant, Aubrey Rumford, Sofia Jara, Kaia Musalborn, Skyler Cazale, Loren Webster, Cidni Hordista, Kezia Gavlak, Zenani Guannu, Rhylee Morrow, Taylor Starling and other girls like them have all been affected by gender normalization. They lost out on position medals, recognition and opportunities, because biological boys were accepted as females and allowed to participate in girls' sports. They and others like them were forced by school officials to accept biological boys into their bathrooms and locker rooms and forced to undress in the presence of a boy with intact male genitalia. What once would have prompted outrage by students, their parents and school administrators, is now being accepted as normal. Students and parents who speak out about these policies at school board meetings are told their time is done and microphones are cut off. In extreme instances, they are forcibly removed by board members who don't want to hear any opposition to what they've been able to put into place.

AB Hernandez' mother calls efforts to prevent her biological male daughter from competing against biological females *harassment* and *hate*. She urges opponents to "put aside your bible and politics." [Ch. 5: Targeted Casualty: Religion and Morality]

Charlie Dean's parents *knew with certainty* that their son was a girl at age nine, the age that the onset of puberty is just <u>beginning</u> in a boy.

Becky Pepper-Jackson's mother *has always known* she was a girl. Becky began publicly identifying as a girl in the third grade (at age nine), "came out" as female in fourth grade and began participating on the girl's track & field team in middle school.
