This is in area called Steinstucken in West Berlin where the wall had actually come down but the East German guards would not let traffic go beyond this point, as it was known as "Dead Man's Zone" to keep people from the East from trying to escape. Mines, booby traps and guard towers. This area has an interesting history. When the wall went up in 1961 this was a finger of land with a school on it that the East Germans wanted to cut off. So in a standoff the US Commander of Berlin escorted the children to school every morning and the East Germans finally gave up and they put the wall around the finger so the school would remain in West Berlin.

With the help of a friend I climbed up on the wall in front of the Brandenburg Gate where all the crowds gathered in November 1989 when the Wall came down. To my rear is East Berlin. The East German guards to my rear were yelling at me and the West German guards to my front were yelling at me, all in German, presumably to get the f— off the wall. Really historical pic
