NOTES

Writing in the 1880s it was first Hans von Bulow to elevate Johannes Brahms to such a level of esteem as one of the 'three B's'. "My key signature is E-flat major," Bulow said (roughly translated), and those three b's (flats) are Bach, Beethoven, and Brahms."

We know the composer to be incredibly cerebral, yet accessible. Trite, yet reflective. Humorous and profound at the same time. As our own Eugene Concert Choir is in the midst of preparations of Brahm's sublime *Requiem*, to be presented at the Hult Center in May and again at Carnegie Hall in June, we offer a look at the textless Brahms: instrumental music that touches the heart and soul.

Brahms had already unofficially retired from composing by 1890, but a chance encounter with clarinetist Richard Mühlfeld and his captivating performance of works for the instrument by Weber and Mozart inspired two new sonatas for clarinet and piano, as well as two chamber pieces. The works for clarinet, which premiered publicly in 1895, are the last chamber pieces Brahms would write.

The op. 122 chorale preludes for organ mark both the composer's most lasting contribution to the organ repertoire and the final pieces Brahms would write. They number eleven in total, all relatively short, and all based on Lutheran chorale melodies appropriate for the various seasons of the liturgical year. Today you will hear four of the latter pieces in the collection, including a piece for the Easter season, Advent, Holy Week, and culminating in Brahms's interpretation of the chorale "O World, I Now Must Leave Thee," believed to be the very final piece Brahms wrote.

Composed between 1862 and 1865, Brahms modeled his first Cello Sonata as a homage to Johann Sebastian Bach, including reference to *The Art of Fugue* in his first movement. The composer makes clear that the piano "should be a partner – often a leading, often a watchful and considerate partner – but it should under no circumstances assume a purely accompanying role." Premiered by cellist Josef Gänsbacher with Brahms at the piano, the cellist often complained that he could not hear himself play over the piano. Brahms's response: "Lucky for you, too."

TODAY'S PERFORMERS

Clarinetist **Anthony Aguayo** has "the musical and personal ideas to really be one of the next great voices on the clarinet scene," according to Stephanie Zelnick. Anthony is currently a DMA Candidate in Clarinet Performance and is the Graduate Instructor of Clarinet at the University of Oregon, where he studies with Wonkak Kim. Mr. Aguayo holds an M.M. degree from Colorado State University where he studied with Wesley Ferreira.

Mr. Aguayo is an active educator, recitalist, and chamber musician. He has served as a guest artist and clinician at numerous universities throughout the western United States. He was invited to perform at the ClarinetFest®2019 and 2021 conferences, and will perform at the 2022 conference in Reno, NV. In 2019, he and Wonkak Kim gave the premiere performance of "Time and Space" for two clarinets by GyungEun Lee. As a strong advocate for new music, Mr. Aguayo has both commissioned and premiered over 20 works. His clarinet and saxophone duo, Chyornii & Dorado, recorded 5 newly commissioned works and released them on their debut album Black and Gold, in 2019; the album can now be heard on all major streaming platforms. Dr. Elizabeth Donovan is an active teacher and performer. She recently completed her Doctorate at the University of Oregon, studying with Steve Pologe. Elizabeth is currently a faculty member at Linn-Benton Community College and runs her own private cello studio.

Elizabeth completed her Bachelors at Penn State University and her Masters at Florida State University, where she studied with Kim Cook and Greg Sauer, respectively. She also spent two summers at Green Mountain Chamber Music Festival. She enjoys collaborating across a variety of genres with artists of all sorts. Most recently, Elizabeth collaborated with Broadway singer and YouTuber Evynne Hollens on a recording and music video from the artist's original musical, "Milagro". In her free time, Dr. Donovan runs long distances, rock climbs, tries to take care of way too many plants, and enjoys all of the outdoor spaces, food, and beer that Oregon has to offer.

Indonesian pianist **Michelle Sulaiman** is currently a DMA candidate at the University of Oregon, under the tutelage of Dr. Claire Wachter. She has previously studied under Dr. Dean Kramer and Dr. Pauline Bjorem. On top of her piano studies, Michelle is also working on her MA in Musicology. In 2019, she was named the winner of the Eugene Symphony Guild Young Artist Competition and Oregon MTNA Young Artist Competition.

Brad Schultz is on the music staff at First United Methodist Church in Eugene, where he also oversees direction of the Concerts at First Music & Arts Series. He is also the accompanist for the Eugene Concert Choir and serves as Dean of the Eugene Area Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. He is a doctoral student in Musicology at the University of Oregon, working on a dissertation that explores the music of Dutch composer Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck.
