## 4. FATHER'S DAY: A

SHORT HISTORY: After the success obtained by Anna Jarvis with the promotion of Mother's Day in Grafton, West Virginia, the first observance of a "Father's Day" was held on July 5, 1908, in Fairmont, West Virginia, in the Williams Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church South. This event however did not have repercussions outside of Fairmont. In 1910, a Father's Day

celebration was held in Spokane, Washington and on June 19, 1910, the first Father's Day, "sermons honoring fathers were presented throughout the city." However, in the 1920s, this celebration was stopped. The people resisted the holiday for its first few decades, viewing it as nothing more than an attempt by merchants to replicate the commercial success of Mother's Day. Two earlier attempts to formally recognize the holiday had been defeated by Congress. A bill to accord national recognition of the holiday was introduced in Congress in 1913. In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson went to Spokane to speak in a Father's Day celebration and wanted to make it official, but Congress resisted Islicol. US President Calvin Coolidge recommended in 1924 that the day be observed by the nation, but stopped short of issuing a national proclamation. In 1957, Maine Senator Margaret Chase Smith wrote a proposal accusing Congress of ignoring fathers for 40 years while honoring mothers. President Lyndon B. Johnson issued the first presidential proclamation honoring fathers, designating the third Sunday in June as Father's Day. Six years later, the day was made a permanent national holiday when President Richard Nixon signed it into law in 1972.

## 5. COLORS OF THE SCOTTISH RITE: (Brother Stoney): As with all things Masonic, nothing is



left to chance or included in the work without a definite purpose. Such is true of the colors we use through the degrees of the Scottish Rite. The primary colors are red, white and green. These colors symbolize the Trinity of God and one or more are found in all the degree regalia. Let's take a look at the most common colors used in the degrees and in discerning their meaning, also discover how they enhance the understanding of the message being communicated. **White** is the most common color and actually carries forward from the Blue Lodge thereby maintaining continuity among the degrees. It

represents beginnings, a world of possibilities, innocence, justice, divine harmony, and the beneficence of God. We next see **red/crimson** which represent fire, heat, life, enthusiasm, danger, truth, supreme energy, force or power, fidelity & zeal, and glory to God. When wet, red expands in all directions symbolizing sublimation of matter. Without a doubt, red evokes a sense of enthusiasm and energy. **Green**, on the other hand, symbolizes death/rebirth and Infinite Wisdom. Death/rebirth can be illustrated via the life cycle of a butterfly or an acorn planted in a field. Death and rebirth are part of

the circle of life that we all must traverse. **Black** has its expected meaning of mourning, absence of light, ignorance and error. As Scottish Rite Masons we are ever admonished to fight with our every fiber to rid the world of ignorance and error. Few conditions lead to tyranny quicker than an ignorant populace. I find **blue** to be the most relaxing of the colors. It denotes water, sky, life, motherhood, eternity, the Heavens, and what is right. While red speaks to matter, blue speaks to the spirit. Red is action whereas blue is contemplation illustrating what is exalted and ethereal in nature. **Gold** and **yellow** symbolize the concept of wisdom whereas blue focuses more on the wisdom of God. Lastly,



purple, the color found only in Grand Lodge aprons, symbolizes power. Within the Scottish Rite it





also symbolizes power but not the power of man, rather the power of God. There are other colors which are found on our aprons, cordons, filets, and jewels but the ones I listed here are the principal colors that have the most significant meanings within our Craft. Unfortunately, time and space only allow for me to give short sound bites for each color. It would be well worth the effort for the serious Masonic student to pursue this colorful side of Masonry.

7. THE SCOTTISH RITE FOURTEENTH DEGREE RING: I thought that since we now have 9 new Scottish Rite Masons they may want to know the history behind the 14° Ring. (And for the membership who have forgotten). The Scottish Rite Fourteenth Degree Ring symbolizes the noble virtues, Purity of Honor, Integrity of the Sword and Spotlessness of the Shield. Eloquently simple, it is

or other material resembling gold and engraved or enameled plate in the form of an within the triangle the Hebrew letter Yud. the oldest traditional symbols of the Degrees and they symbolize the True Third Degree. Inside the ring is inscribed the Virtus Junxit, Mors Non Separabit (Virtue has

united and death shall not separate.) The ring's circle expresses the unbreakable fraternal bond between Masons of all generations. According to the ritual, it should be kept during the owner's lifetime unless superceded by a 33° ring should the owner ever attain that honor. Upon the death of the owner, the ring should go into the hands of his widow, eldest son, the friend who was loved above all others, or another Scottish Rite Freemason. Although the ring may be altered to fit the new Brother's finger, it need not be changed. There is no official instruction designating on what finger it should be worn. The direction of the triangle's apex is irrelevant so long as the ring is worn with honor appropriate to the deceased Brother, his fraternal heir, and the Rite.
