KIMBERLY ANN APPLE Age 48 May 17, 2021 Torrington, Wyoming

The night of May 16, 2021 into the morning of the 17th, Marty Colwell stole the life of Kimberly Ann Apple. Kim was 48 years old when she was taken away ever so aggressively from her three kids.

On the day of the 17th, Kim's body was found stripped down in the house they briefly shared outside Torrington, WY. She passed away from internal and external bleeding caused by Colwell. One major injury she suffered from was a large gash on her head. Cowell attempted to glue shut the wound rather than call for help. The family is not only left with extreme despair but also many questions that will never be answered due to the fact "he can't remember".

Kim was born in July of 1972, she had many different accomplishments throughout her life from finishing college at EWC to becoming a loving grandma. She had a rough past for a very long time but Kim managed to find comfort in a variety of things. From fishing at the Glendo lake during any free time to bowling or shooting a game of pool. She will be deeply missed by everyone blessed with memories of her.

GABBY PETITO Age 22 August 27, 2021 Teton County

Gabby was born March 19, 1999. On August 27, 2021, Gabby was strangled to death by her fiancé Brian Laundrie while on a road trip visiting national parks across the country. At just 22 years old, her life abruptly ended at the hands of the man she trusted, loved and thought she would spend her life with, but she had so much life left to live. Her killer then proceeded to head home to his parents house in Florida where they had all lived under one roof. He drove Gabby's van the entire way, while texting Gabby's phone, and texting her mom to make it seem like Gabby was alive and well. Gabby was reported missing on September 11th . Brian was found dead on October 21, 2021, by "apparent suicide" in the Myakkahatchee Park just a few miles from their home.

Gabby's story made national headlines as the world looked for her, hoping and praying she was still alive. After Gabby's remains were found on September 19th, 2021 at Spread Creek near Bridger-Teton National Forest, her father Joseph made a powerful statement, "She touched the world," this was the moment we realized we needed to turn our tragedy into purpose. Gabby Petito Foundation, founded in response to a domestic violence tragedy, works with organizations that support victims of domestic violence and organizations that support locating missing persons. Gabby's life may have been cut tragically short, but she lives on through us, her parents, fighting for victims of domestic violence, and to create change to prevent this from happening time and time again. Her story has inspired people around the world, and we hope her legacy will continue to help others be free from the dangers of intimate partner violence.

MADISON SHANA COOK

Age 20 April 20, 2021 Torrington, Wyoming

Madison, the daughter of Nate and Stacey Cook, was an amazing young woman with the most beautiful blue eyes. From the moment she could walk and talk, she loved all things in nature. She had a vivid imagination and a passion for art, which led her to create many things. She was a family oriented young woman who aspired to be a tattoo artist. She also loved anything her dad loved – like fishing, hunting, horseback riding and mud racing.

She graduated from Lingle-Ft. Laramie Highschool in 2019 and attended classes at Eastern Wyoming College, but as quickly as her adult life began, it ended. Evil showed up in her life and told her he loved her. She and Sean Pettus had only been in a relationship for 3 months. Three days prior to the discovery of her body, she contacted family for help and moved out. On April 20th 2021, Madison's body was found under a heap of bedding in Sean's apartment. She has been stabbed a total of 6 times with a butcher knife, asphyxiated with plastic around her neck, and showed signs of blunt force trauma to the head

In memory of Madison the family frequently plants sunflowers, has dedicated a piece of land in her honor near Register Cliff, holds an annual river float on the North Platte River in Guernsey Wyoming, and will continue to promote domestic violence awareness in her honor.

Wyoming Silent Witness Initiative

The mission of the Wyoming Silent Witness Initiative is to promote peace, healing and responsibility in intimate relationships in order to eliminate domestic violence.

Since 1985, an estimated seventy-seven Wyoming women, seven men, four boys and one girl have been murdered as a result of domestic violence. In 1994 alone, eight women died at the hands of a husband, exhusband, or acquaintance. Three additional children and seven males, including brothers, were also killed during these same domestic violence incidents.

Because all of us have a responsibility to act to end these senseless deaths, Wyoming joined other states in a national initiative committed to raising the level of awareness about domestic violence.

On February 28, 1997, Wyoming unveiled an exhibit as the first phase of the Silent Witness Initiative at a special ceremony in the State Capitol. The exhibit consisted of 38 red life-size wood silhouettes representing the women and children murdered as a result of domestic violence. Brandy Jo Imhoff's small silhouette speaks for children murdered in domestic violence situations. Each adult silhouette bears a shield with the name of the murdered woman, age at time of death, and the circumstances of her death. To represent the associated victims, a male silhouette and an additional child silhouette were added to the exhibit in 2001.

Former Wyoming Attorney General William U. Hill and First Lady Sherri Geringer sponsored Wyoming's involvement in the Initiative. The Department of Corrections Director, Judy Uphoff, enthusiastically supported creation of the exhibit with help from inmates at the Women's Prison in Lusk and inmates from the Wyoming Honor Farm in Riverton. Many individuals and nonprofit groups have and continue to work on the initiative and the Wyoming Silent Witness Committee promotes domestic violence awareness year-round.

The exhibit was displayed in the Herschler Gallery of the Capitol until it began its journey around the State of Wyoming to "bear witness" to the serious problem of domestic violence in the state.

In October of 1997, the exhibit traveled to Washington, D.C. to appear with the Witness representatives of all states to demonstrate for increased awareness, stricter enforcement of laws, and assistance in fighting the problem of domestic violence nationwide.

On October 18, 1998, state and local representatives gathered at the Capitol in Cheyenne, for a "March to End the Silence." A caravan of vehicles approached the city from opposite sides of the state coming together to "call for the healing of domestic violence in our cities, state, and country." Former State Senator John Perry from Buffalo, who co-sponsored Wyoming's Victims Bill of Rights, was the keynote speaker. Four new silhouettes were added to the exhibit. The event was held in conjunction with marches across the United States.

GARF is honored to be hosting the State Ceremony this year and encourages individuals to spread awareness, educate themselves, and remember those who have lost their lives because of domestic violence.

The Silent Witness exhibit is a traveling memorial honoring adults and children who were murdered in Wyoming as a result of domestic violence. The exhibit is made up of life-size red silhouettes, each representing a person who once lived, had neighbors, friends and family- whose life ended violently at the hands of someone claiming to have loved them. The ceremony will consist of multiple speakers, a silent witness pledge, introductions and retirements of silhouettes, and a procession.


