Blood Pattern Analysis

Keith Morris, Ph.D, Professor
West Virginia University
Department of Forensic and Investigative Science



Bio

Dr. Keith Morris' research interests are focused on the interpretation of physical evidence and how multiple types of evidence are interrelated. Bayesian networks are used to model evidence relationships since they allow for general modelling as a basis to understand evidence interpretation. Daubert requirements of admissibility of scientific and technical evidence into court proceedings play an important role in evidence interpretation. Specific emphasis is given to the error rate requirement of Daubert. Dr. Morris's interest in evidence types is focused upon firearms evidence, ballistics, and latent fingerprint identification, and utilizing systems such as AFIS, IBIS, and confocal microscopy that relate directly to his research focus. These areas are studied from interpretational and fundamental perspectives.

Background: Before coming to WVU, Dr. Morris was the director of the Forensic Science Laboratory (FSL) system of the South African Police Service. He spent 14 years in the FSL at the bench and managerial levels. He performed casework in the area of trace evidence, precious metal theft, and bombing investigations. He was involved in the examination of the bombing of the Planet Hollywood restaurant in Cape Town in 1998. He received his B.Sc. (Chemistry and Mathematics) (1985), B.Sc. (Honors)(Chemistry)(1986), and Ph.D. (Chemistry)(1990) from the University of Port Elizabeth. He also has a master's degree in business leadership (M.B.L.) (1997) from the University of South Africa.

Entomology

Instructor: Rachel M Mohr, Ph. D
West Virginia University
Department of Forensic & Investigation Science



Class Description:

Dr. Mohr will present the understanding of how and why adult insects, specifically blow flies, are attracted to carrion. This includes both how the physiology of the fly affects its reaction to carrion, and how different species use the same carrion cues to find and exploit specific pieces of carrion in widely varying environments. She is also interested in understanding how so many blow fly species with similar ecological niches can persist and coexist in the greater environment. From an applied perspective, understanding the mechanisms by which adult insects find carrion means that a forensic entomologist can more accurately estimate time since death. This can be particularly significant in cases where insects have limited access to bodies, such as those found buried, indoors, or inside closed vehicles.

Bio:

Dr. Mohr earned her B.S. in entomology at Texas A&M University and her M.S. in entomology at the University of California at Riverside, where she focused on medical and veterinary issues. She returned to Texas A&M for her Ph.D. under Dr. Jeffery Tomberlin. While there, she proposed a new framework and new terminology for use in describing the ecological interaction of insects and carrion, which was published in the *Annual Review of Entomology* in 2011.

The Art of Finding Missing Persons

PRESENTATION ABSTRACT:

The Art of Finding Missing Persons – Thousands of missing persons reports are filed each year. Though most are closed, there are several that still sit open, leaving law enforcement stumped. Molnar discusses her role as a criminal intelligence analyst and forensic artist for the state of Ohio. She goes into detail on some of the missing persons and unidentified remains cases she has worked on over the years and how forensic art and intelligence resources have been used to crack them.

Bio:

Samantha Molnar is a Criminal Intelligence Analyst and Forensic Artist at the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation, BCI. She has a bachelor's degree in forensic science and master's degree in criminal behavior, both from Tiffin University. Molnar has been with BCI for 9 years, assisting local law enforcement agencies, coroner's offices, and prosecutors' offices with their major crimes. She has assisted on homicides, cold cases, missing persons, and various other crime types. Molnar has also been with the Central Ohio Human Trafficking Task Force for 3 years. She is most well known for her work with unidentified remains, completing clay facial reconstructions on human skulls in hopes to identify them and bring them home to their families. To date, she has completed 12 reconstructions with half now identified.

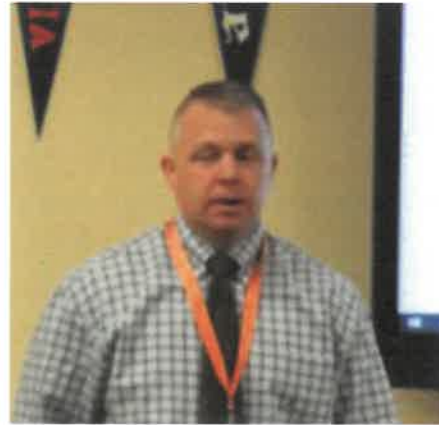
Class Description: During this class, participants will learn basic death investigation techniques and the role of the Coroner's Office. Participants will learn the difference between law enforcement and death investigators. They will learn what death investigators look at while conducting a basic death investigation and will have an opportunity to look at a couple case studies. Participants will also learn about the basic autopsy procedure as well as length to complete a full autopsy and receive results. Class will include unique deaths, suspension deaths and case studies.

Bio:

Justin Weber is a veteran United States Marine during which he served 3 tours in Iraq from 2003 through 2006. An infantry Marine by specialty, Justin Weber was cross trained as a Mortuary Affairs specialist in Ft. Lee, Virginia prior to being deployed for the initial invasion to Iraq. Upon leaving the Marine Corp in 2006, Justin was employed by the Butler County Coroner's Office as a death investigator, during that time he finished his Criminal Justice degree and began his career in death investigation. Justin left the Butler County Coroner's Office in 2008, when he became employed by the Hamilton County Coroner's office. Justin continued his career there and has investigated over 1500 deaths. He was promoted to the Chief Investigator position in January 2019.

Bio

Dr. Heather Garvin is a Professor of Anatomy and Board-Certified Forensic Anthropologist at Des Moines University. Besides teaching anatomy in the DO, DPT, and PA courses, Dr. Garvin conducts forensic anthropology casework for the State of Iowa, as well as other requesting agencies. Her casework can involve assisting medicolegal agencies by providing information from the scene and skeleton to unravel who an individual might be and what the circumstances were around their death. Her experience includes scene searches and recoveries, assessments of biological profiles, trauma and taphonomy evaluations, radiographic comparisons for positive identification, external case reviews, and expert witness testimony. Dr. Garvin is also active in her field, currently serving on the Board of Directors for the American Board of Forensic Anthropology and the Editorial Board for the Journal of Forensic Sciences. SEARCH & RESCUE

WHEN TO CALL IN A SEARCH & RESCUE TEAM?

The first question is why would LE use a search team?

SAR teams are free (except USAR), it would limit the manpower and overtime that LE officers will accumulate during a missing person event. Many teams require training and certifications in Basic SAR, along with specialties (i.e. K9, water rescue/recovery etc.).

Research the team you would consider calling out. A true SAR team will be able to provide certifications of their members. One of the most important classes is Crime Scene Preservation.

Once the missing person (MP) has been official, does the person meet the criteria for a search?

Criteria would be a critical missing (child, elderly etc.). Time is of the essence!!

The longer it takes to have a SAR team involved the broader the search area can become and the uncertainty of the MP to be alive or deceased.

K9's can pick up and follow scent trails that are days old. In order to have the best chance of establishing a direction of travel or locating the missing person a K9 team should be on scene within hours of the initial call. LE support is needed to obtain a scent article. Police are permitted to walk along with the K9.

Lost Person Behavior: Someone who has been trained in Lost Person Behavior can be consulted, the person should have been certified in the 5-day long course by Dr Kester and will be able to provide the best scenario for a search.

Potential Water Search

Some SAR teams will have the understanding in aquatic deaths/drowning. The biggest and most important question is "where is or would the body be?" Lifeguard Systems, a company from New York, provides training to LE and Search and Recovery teams. Not many SAR teams within the area have this skill or training. CSAR has 5 of their members that attended and were certified in the 2-day long course.

LE has the right to approval or deny a SAR Team

Sometimes families of the MP will call SAR teams, LE agencies and appreciate the help from family but LE is the ones in charge of the case no matter what. LE instructs the SAR team regarding the search. The SAR team should provide all information to police, along with a flash drive with a SARTOPO map of the search, an after-action report which should include who was in the search party and hopefully their qualifications.
