

Addressing America's Broken Relationship with the United Nations

Foundational Premise

- A growing number of United Nations policies conflict with American interests and values.
- The UN has proven resistant to reform and consistently undermines U.S. sovereignty.
- The United States should pursue a bold new path: strategically disengage from the UN and lead the development of a modern, values-based alternative aligned with American principles.
- Executive Orders issued by President Trump targeting the UN and WHO should be codified into permanent U.S. law.

Strategic Action Plan

1. Reassert Senate Authority Over International Health Regulations (IHR)

- The U.S. Senate must formally vote on the updated IHR treaty approved by the World Health Organization.
- The incoming U.S. Ambassador to the UN should formally request that President Trump re-submit the revised IHR treaty to the Senate for advice and consent.
 - With a Republican majority, Senate disapproval is likely.
 - This would provide a sound legal foundation for U.S. withdrawal from the WHO and cessation of taxpayer funding.
 - The move would send a clear message: the U.S. will no longer cede sovereignty to unelected, unaccountable international bodies.

2. Substantially Reduce U.S. Funding to the United Nations

- The U.S. currently contributes about \$47 billion annually to the UN system.
- This should be adjusted to reflect our share of the global population—approximately 4%—reducing our contribution to around \$4 billion.
 - This preserves U.S. veto power while significantly cutting financial support for anti-American agendas.
 - It would also limit the UN's capacity to implement policies that threaten national sovereignty and U.S. standards.

3. Lead the Creation of a New International Alliance

- The United States should establish a new multilateral organization founded on liberty, democracy, and national sovereignty.
 - Membership would be by invitation only, limited to countries that embrace and codify values aligned with American principles.
 - Foundational criteria could include:
 - Constitutional protections for free speech
 - The right to self-defense, including legal firearm ownership

4. Provide Tangible Incentives for Membership

Economic Incentives

- Preferential trade terms
- Access to U.S.-backed economic development loans
- Small Business Administration (SBA) support to promote local enterprise under mutually beneficial terms

Defense and Security Incentives

- Discounted military security packages
- Training and professional development for partner nation armed forces
- Strategic U.S. military bases and secured ports—positioned as a superior alternative to China's Belt and Road Initiative
