
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President's Message

Recipient of the West High School's Exceptional Teacher Award in 2018, West Anchorage High School Choral Director Gabrielle Pierle was named Alaska Chamber Singers Interim Conductor and Artistic Director for the 2021-22 season.

An accomplished vocalist, Gabrielle has sung with Alaska Chamber Singers for five seasons and is frequently heard as soprano soloist including recent ACS concerts featuring Mozart's *Requiem*, Fauré's *Requiem*, Bernstein's *Chichester Psalms*, Britten's *Rejoice in the Lamb*,

Muehleisen's *Eternity Passing Over* and Brahms' *Liebeslieder Walzer*. Under her skilled direction, Ms. Pierle's West High Choirs routinely perform alongside the Alaska Chamber Singers and Anchorage Symphony Orchestra for Chorus and Orchestra masterworks. Gabrielle was born and raised in St. Louis, Missouri and has lived in Anchorage since 2016. She received her earliest music training with the St. Louis Children's Choirs, performing in New York City, Scotland and Australia. Pierle holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Murray State University where she was awarded the College of Education's Outstanding Senior in Music and Outstanding Student Teacher Awards.

David Hagen Artistic Director/Conductor (on sabbatical)

David Hagen became artistic director and conductor of the Alaska Chamber Singers (ACS) in 1995, succeeding founder and longtime artistic director Elvera Voth. He has conducted ACS in numerous major works including a performance of Britten's monumental *War Requiem*, a joint production with the Anchorage Concert Chorus, Alaska Chamber Singers and Alaska Children's Choir. Having grown up in Anchorage, Hagen received his earliest musical training in the Anchorage School District, performing in such ensembles as the Service High Symphonic Band and the Anchorage Youth Symphony. Hagen holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from George Fox University and a Master of Music degree in choral conducting from the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music. David is currently enjoying a well-deserved sabbatical and we look forward to welcoming him back next season.

When Covid began, she joined the Alaska Black Caucus to further her commitment to anti-racism and concert programming that is inclusive of historically neglected voices and serves on the Justice Committee.

Kara Guggenmos is thrilled to be here for tonight's performance. She loves art song and choral music is most known for her rendering of the Richard Strauss Four Last songs, Beethoven's 9th Symphony, Handel's Messiah, Mozart's Requiem and Verdi's Requiem. Since moving to Alaska from Colorado in 2016, Kara has had several new musical adventures, including singing in Mendelssohn's ELIJAH in 2019 with Anchorage Concert Chorus

under the direction of Grant Cochran and being asked to be a part of a fabulous classical ensemble, TRIO PRONTO. This trio made up of the pianist and harpist from the Anchorage Symphony Orchestra and herself has traveled to schools giving educational concerts as well as giving local concerts primarily featuring works by women composers. They hope to be collaborating again soon.

Operatic roles and appearances include: Mimi in Puccini's La Boheme; Susanna in Le Nozze Di Figaro; Donna Anna in Don Giovanni; the Countess in Le Nozze Di Figaro; Hannah in the Merry Widow and Gretel in Hansel Und Gretel.

Awards and achievements include winning the NATSAA Competition in 2002, which led to her Carnegie Hall solo recital debut in Weill Hall in June of 2003. Ms. Guggenmos has been a Metropolitan Opera National Council regional finalist and district winner. Ms. Guggenmos has coached with such prestigious singers and coaches as Benita Valente, Martin Isepp and Ashley Putnam.

Kara received her Bachelor of Music degree in Sacred Voice Performance from Moody Bible Institute in 1996 under the teaching of Dr. Terry Strandt, and her Master of Music degree in Vocal Performance from the University of Colorado, Boulder, in 2001 where she studied with Julie Simson and Robert Harrison. Kara had the privilege of being adjunct voice faculty at the University of Alaska Anchorage for the 2018-2019 academic school year. She is the former Worship Director at Calvary Church, Longmont, Colorado where she joyfully served for 13 years and is passionate about Church and Church ministry. Kara has three sons and resides in Palmer, Alaska where she has a private voice and piano studio that she hopes to start up again after losing her husband suddenly in 2019.

Alaska Chamber Singers gratefully recognizes the contributions of two outgoing board members whose terms have expired: Caren Ailleo and Bardon "Bart" Simons.

Introduced to the organization by one of the singers in the ensemble, Caren served on the Board of Directors for many years. 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Alaska Chamber Singers History

Established in 1986 by Elvera Voth, Alaska Chamber Singers (ACS) is one of the state's finest music ensembles. Led by Conductor/Artistic Director David Hagen since 1995, ACS's mission is to enrich Alaska through choral excellence. Singers are selected annually by audition and are dedicated to the study, rehearsal, and performance of high-quality choral literature.

In 1992, ACS was the first American chorus to perform in Magadan, Russia, Anchorage's Sister City, as part of a cultural exchange. Later in 1992 ACS and other area singers combined forces with the Kamchatka Choir from Petropavlovsk-Kamchatsky, Russia, in a performance of Prokofiev's *Alexander Nevsky* suite with the National Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Mstislav Rostropovich. ACS regularly collaborates with Anchorage Concert Chorus, Anchorage Symphony Orchestra, and Alaska Children's Choir.

In 1996, ACS was featured on the radio program *A Prairie Home Companion* with Garrison Keillor in its broadcast from the Alaska Center for the Performing Arts. In July 1997, ACS traveled to Washington, D.C., and performed at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts under the sponsorship of U.S. Senator Frank Murkowski. ACS has twice been chosen by audition to perform at the American Choral Directors Association Northwestern Division Convention: 2008 in Vancouver, B.C. and 2016 in Seattle.

In 2012, ACS commissioned and premiered *Alaska Spring*, a major new work by celebrated composer Libby Larsen setting the poetry of former Alaska poet laureate Tom Sexton. ACS has also commissioned works by Grant Cochran, David Dickau, Moses Hogan, Steven Sametz, and Gregory Walker.

ACS has sung under notable guest conductors including Anton Armstrong, David Dickau, Moses Hogan, and Kenneth Jennings. ACS has participated in workshops led by Chanticleer and New York Polyphony.

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
