From The Pastor's Pen





One of the world's leading experts on rest.

I didn't set my alarm this morning. And as I write, having slept as late as my body wanted to, I am wearing sweatpants and slippers, with my feet up in front of the (artificial but still appealing) fire, sipping tea and listening to classical music.

That's right: today is a vacation day!

More specifically, today is not only one of the vacation days that I am allotted each year under the terms of my call, but also a vacation day on which I do not have anything much scheduled to do; a day on which I am, in fact, resting. We're not always very good at resting, are we?

Even on holidays and days off, we often set ourselves busy schedules and lists of commitments that leave us exhausted at day's end. I'd say that I am more cognizant than many of the need to get regular rest, but still, on a scale of 0 to my dog (the most restful creature I know), my resting habits are still much closer to the "0" end than they ought to be. ...

... We need rest. God even built rest into the fabric of creation by himself resting on the 7th day and commanding his people to take a sabbath rest every week. Even secular authorities agree, with both governments and employers generally providing for certain days off in the year.

So constantly striving to grind something productive out of every minute of every day is contrary both to our own best interests and to God's plan. Yet, all too often, we are deceived into thinking it somehow shameful or lazy to do anything else.

The Lord is aware of both our need for rest and our frequent difficulty in taking it, and so his Word frequently reminds us of its importance. Psalm 127 might as well have been written directly to our over-busy age: "It is in vain that you rise up early and go late to rest, eating the bread of anxious toil; for he gives sleep to his beloved." God will provide and does not require us to drive ourselves to exhaustion and despair trying to do it all ourselves.

Jesus was even more direct on the subject, saying: "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest." I invite all of you, as your circumstances offer, to take Jesus up on his offer.

Trust in the Lord's provision and wisdom, and take time to really, deeply rest.

Food Pantry - A Local Mission Project

A team of 12 people, led by Joanne Jones, meet once a month to turn the CE Building into a market known as the Round Hill Food Pantry. We are one of three pantries serving the Elizabeth area and are an extension of Pittsburgh Community Food Bank. Our clients are all preregistered. Currently, we serve about 35 clients - a combination of short term (unemployed or short-term disability) or long term (individuals with low income). We can distribute emergency food orders if required, but our format is not one of open participation. Our clients can shop for needed items and select from each of our staged areas. Note that the term 'shop' is our format, and no money changes hands.

A few of our clients have limited mobility and as a result opt for a prepacked order. They still receive all our offerings; the team just pulls it together for them and delivers it to their car.

Our pantry is stocked by donations from the congregation and the local Giant Eagle as well as items purchased from Pittsburgh Community Food Bank. Monetary donations are used to source the latter. We participate in a PCFB program which provides, free of charge, fresh vegetables, and milk.

On the last Thursday of the month, our clients are met by Olive (Bonnie's dog), who serves as our official greeter. After registering, they travel down the main hall where they can select health and beauty products, powdered milk, juices, various canned goods and baking supplies. Before entering the meeting room, they are handed a pre-packed box of frozen meat and vegetables.

Within the large room, they can select canned vegetables and fruit, tomato sauce, peanut butter, soup, tuna, various pastas, and cereal. They finish their shopping with fresh vegetables like potatoes, apples, carrots and onions, milk, eggs and cheese, bread, and baked goods. (All based on availability.) When their visit is finished they have a trunk full of healthy food. They leave us with a final thanks, sometimes with tears, explaining that the food that we provide is very much needed and makes a big difference in their lives.

Left-over perishable items are donated to the local Meals On Wheels. Thank you for your continued support, prayers, and contributions.

Officers of the Church

There are three positions within the structure of the presbyterian church: elder, deacon, and trustee. Simply put, the elders are responsible for the spiritual welfare and governance of the congregation. The deacons' responsibility is one of compassion, and the trustees' is the business part.

Elders make up the Session. The entire life of the local church is under the oversight and supervision of the Session. This is a short list of the Session's responsibilities:

- To initiate the ministry of evangelism as the first business of the Church, and to seek to lead persons to an acceptance of Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.
- To oversee the worship of the congregation along with the pastor.
- To oversee the discipleship ministries of the church.
- To receive, dismiss, restore, grant affiliation, remove members.
- To determine the budget of the church.
- To oversee the educational program of the congregation.
- There are other areas of responsibility that fall to the elders, but these are the major ones.

Deacons make up the Board of Deacons. The office of Deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of compassion, concern for needs, and of serving others. Therefore, the first duty of the Deacon is sympathy and service. Deacons are to oversee the ministry of the congregation to the sick, friendless, bereaved, and those in any way distressed. The Session can assign them additional responsibilities.

Trustees make up the Board of Trustees. Trustees shall have the power, upon authorization from the local church, to buy, sell, and mortgage real property, accept, and execute deeds, to hold and defend titles to the same, maintain the physical plant, enter into contracts, and to assume other such related duties as may be assigned to them.

This is just a brief overlook of what these positions do. If you want to see a more detailed description you could go online to look up EPC Book of Order.

Round Hill Church History, Volume 2.

Round Hill Church History - Compiled by Walter Scott

"Three structures have housed the people here And kept the Spirit blowing Whether of logs or frame or brick Each supported the seedlings' growing"

The first church building was a crude log shelter with no windows or conveniences located approximately 300 feet down the hill from the present Sanctuary and built by church members. The first schoolhouse was located near the log structure and later moved to Miller's Hill and to the Harmony Site. The following is an ad that appeared in the Pittsburgh Mercury on December 29, 1813: On Friday, the 7th day of January next, commencing at 9 o'clock forenoon, will be exhibited at Round Hill School Room Forks of Youghanany, Allegheny County, by the pupils of the subscriber of their profeciences consisting of 10 different classes, with an addition of several other displays too numerous to insert. Said School is under the inspection of Messr. John Mitchel, tanner; Dr. James Power and John Fleming, inn-keeper; trustees. All those favoring us with their company, will obtain a fine reception, and particularly those interested, to be punctual in attending.

In 1781 the Minutes of the Synod of Philadelphia and New York recorded: "Rev. Messrs. Joseph Smith, John McMillan, James Power, and Thaddeus Dodd, having requested to be erected into a separate presbytery to be known by the name of the Presbytery of Redstone. Request granted first meeting to be held at Laurel Hill Church." The first meeting, however, was held at Pigeon Creek because of hostile Indians. This Presbytery included Ohio, West Virginia, and Western Pennsylvania, and lasted twelve years, 1781 to 1793. It was the sole undivided presbytery of the West and held 41 meetings, four of which were at Round Hill and five at Rehoboth. The four original members were Thaddeus Dodd, aged 31; John McMillan, aged 29; Joseph Smith, aged 45; and James Power, aged 35. In 1784, John Clark, aged 64, James Dunlap, aged 38, and James Finley, aged 60, joined.

"The ministers who came and led this place Nurtured the young church, knowing That there was something here at Round Hill That no dissension could keep from growing"

For two years after Rev. Finley died, the pulpits were empty at the churches, but in 1797, Rev. David Smith became the second pastor of the sister churches. He was also the editor of Western Missionary magazine. A revival known as the "Falling Down Work" was conducted with meetings in a grove of trees in Round Hill Cemetery. David Smith was a "man of deep piety and respectable literary ability and his sermons were rich and instructive, but his delivery was not engaging." Mr. Smith's brother-in-law, Rev. William Wylie, D.D., was called here in August of 1803 when Rev. Smith died. Rev. Wylie's wife, Esther, was a daughter of Joseph Smith and a sister of David Smith, She was also aunt of Joseph Smith, author of Old Redstone. A new Psalmody was introduced into the Church Communion Service, and many left the congregation because they thought the church was "going to the devil."
