### CORONAVIRUS - COVID 19 UPDATE

Please be aware, the Church of England has issued guidance - face coverings are mandatory when attending church services (some exemptions apply). If you feel unable to wear a face covering, please let one of our team know, but remember you are very welcome.

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As a child, on a sunny July afternoon, I enjoyed nothing better than having a pot of Bubble-Blow mixture with the rather drippy plastic loop that was part of the lid, and blowing bubbles across the garden. The sun glinting on them in all the colours of the rainbow. The way they sailed up and away, over the shrubs and trees. Their sudden disappearance in an almost audible "pop". If I ran, a great stream of bubbles would follow me like the tail of a comet. There was something magical about bubbles — until the pot was empty, or I knocked it over and it was all spilled — and then there were tears!

Well, during the pandemic, the word "bubble" has acquired a whole new meaning – groups of people who are allowed to mix together. Their purpose (to bring happiness) is still the same – a bubble is a delightful term to describe a small group bringing joy to each other's lives, who brighten up a day by being in the same room.

During the pandemic, clearly the hardest thing has been losing a loved one to Covid. But the next hardest thing has been to be without friends and family around. It's been a real trauma being separated from those we love, because our longing for companionship is a massive part of being human.

Before the pandemic we took so much for granted — like dropping in for a cup of tea, playing whist, going to a coffee morning, chatting on a bench. This all fell away, such that someone I was talking to recently became so lonely that getting a single letter through the post-box was the highpoint of the week — they had no other contact.

Thank goodness we're coming out of Lockdown. Each stage brings more moodenhancing — meeting outside, meeting inside in a bubble, going into shops, going to visit family, going into a pub, meeting anyone inside, going to outdoor events, and maybe soon going to every kind of indoor event and doing whatever we enjoy. Our bubbles are gradually expanding — from two to three, six, thirty, a hundred, any number and size we like!

But life has always been about bubbles, we just didn't notice. Instead we used other words – family, extended family, club, society, office, team, group, and so on. Places where we enjoy being with other people. The safety, reassurance and fellowship of being with other people is incredibly important. Though it isn't new! Jesus was part of several bubbles – his family, his village, his twelve

disciples. But also the next person he met — he would get alongside anyone, bubble with them, listen to them, encourage them and show them God's love and forgiveness. It's no surprise that his main message to everyone was to "love your neighbour" — to be a bubble with your neighbour?

Sadly there's many people in our community without bubbles and in great need of companionship. The advert for Moorland Community Care in this magazine invites people to become part of a lonely person's bubble – please consider it! It may feel a bit scary, but being in a new bubble is always likely to be of mutual benefit.

So, if Freedom Day comes this month, why not go and buy some Bubble-Blow and celebrate it by standing outside with someone and watching the bubbles sparkling with freedom in the sun? If you're a bit embarrassed to be seen

#### **LOUVRES**

Challenging Operation to Install New Louvre Windows in 12<sup>th</sup> Century Church Bell Tower at St. Andrew's Church, Ashburton.

A high-level operation has been carried out to fit new wooden louvre windows to the bell chamber of St Andrew's Church in Ashburton, Devon.



The 12<sup>th</sup> century tower is 92ft high.

Unusually the louvres are made of cedar, instead of the more usual slate or stone.

They were constructed and installed by Holne-based Dartmoor Timber, which used wood to match the early 20th Century louvres, which needed replacing.

The team included a tree-surgeon, and the men wore harnesses as they worked alongside the church's eight bells and supporting timber frame.

Matthew Powell, from Dartmoor Timber, said "This is our first church. It's quite exciting because we've never done anything at this sort of height before.

"It was quite a job to source the cedar, which was from a very specific pacific-coast area of Canada and takes a long time to grow.

"We've just tried to echo what the original carpenters did here, right down to a little clover pattern on the tops of the louvres."

The louvres are designed so the sound of the bells can ring out, but the wind and rain can't get in.

Matthew said "They are slatted in a very particular way so birds can't fly in.

"The most rotten ones were on the South and South West side of the tower, facing the prevailing weather.

"For us this kind of work ticks all the right boxes; it's challenging, and we are putting something back and keeping things going."

Brian Lewis, Chair of the Ashburton Parochial Church Council (PCC) Building and Grounds Committee, said "I am delighted with the new louvres.

"Over the course of the next year they will weather down to the grey colour of the original louvres, which had lasted over 100 years.

"It was great working with the staff of the Dartmoor Timber company, who were so enthusiastic and have done a great job."

### Churchyard through the magnifying glass

On a Thursday morning in early June some 12 or more of us met up on St Andrew's Green to consider wild flower recognition and the role of burial grounds in the global biodiversity movement. No small aim, I hear you cry! But to tutor us we had two expert ladies.

First, George from *Caring for God's Acre*, an organisation that works nationally to support groups and individuals to investigate, care for, and enjoy burial grounds and graveyards. In her broad, authoritative introduction George told us that there are in fact over 20,000 burial grounds in England and Wales, ranging from small rural medieval churchyards to large Victorian city cemeteries, spanning different cultures, religions and centuries. These burial grounds, of which St Andrew's is a huge and iconic example, appeal to many who are interested in local history and the natural world and encapsulate the history of communities whilst offering an important refuge for our native wildlife. Our band of churchyard maintenance volunteers is working towards just such an aim, namely to make St Andrew's churchyard a well-managed burial ground that also provides a habitat for wildlife and wild flowers. It is really great that our current St Andrew's Churchyard activities are part of this bigger national movement.



So what of Hannah, our second tutor and local expert on botanical Well. Hannah issues. initially took just a small triangle of grass and flowers and showed us just how species rich it We experienced was. this partly by picking flowers and grasses and looking at them through eye magnifiers. And what an eye opener this process was. It's one

thing to see wild flowers with the naked eye; under the magnifying glass one's sense of awe and wonder at the delicacy and complexity of structure not to mention diversity of species increases hugely.





The humblest and commonest of wild flower or grass is an example of sheer beauty. Not only that, the prevalence of different varieties can indicate the quality of the soil and the amount of human intervention there has been over the years. Fascinating floral forensics!

My guess is that everyone went away inspired by the beauty of nature and resolved to look a little more closely at wild flowers and not least to buy one of those amazing eye magnifiers.

And what better place to do this than on St Andrew's Green where we have a wild flower meadow strip and all around the churchyard where we have areas that we have designated for rewilding. ### RECIPE OF THE MONTH

scrummy cake is really easy and versatile – use whatever fruit you like, and you'll make it again and again

#### SUMMER FRUIT DRIZZLE CAKE

### **Ingredients:**

- 2 large eggs
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 175g fruit, stoned and diced weight
- 140g granulated sugar
- 1-2 tbsp citrus juice lemon, lime or orange
- 175g very soft butter, plus extra for greasing
- 175g golden caster sugar
- 250g self-raising flour

### Method:

- 1. Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Grease a 900g/2lb loaf tin and line the base and ends with a long strip of baking parchment. Put the butter, caster sugar, flour, eggs and vanilla extract into a large bowl and beat with an electric hand mixer for 5 mins until pale and creamy the mixture will be very thick.
- 2. Spread one-third of the cake mix into the tin, then scatter over 50g of the fruit. Carefully dot and spread another third of the cake mix on top, and scatter with another 50g fruit. Finally dot the rest of the cake mix over and gently spread with the back of a spoon. Bake for 1 hr, until an inserted skewer comes out clean.
- 3. Poke the cake all over with a skewer. Put remaining 75g fruit into a bowl with the granulated sugar. Stir in 1 tbsp of the citrus juice first with a fork, mashing a little of the fruit as you go. If it's a bit dry, add a splash more juice and spoon over the cake. Leave in the tin until the cake is cool and the topping is set and crisp.







### Coronavirus (COVID-19) response update from Devon County Council

### **COVID-19** restrictions easing delayed until 19 July

Current restrictions, with a few exceptions, remain in place and you should <u>follow the guidance on what you can and cannot do</u> until Monday 19 July.

This is the new date that England is expected to move to Step 4 of the government's roadmap out of lockdown, though the data will be reviewed after two weeks in case the risks have reduced.

Nationally there are currently around 8,000 COVID-19 cases a day, the highest since the end of February, and these are increasing by around 64 per cent each week. Hospitalisations are also starting to rise, with the average number of people admitted to hospital increasing in England by 50 per cent per week.

### What's the situation like in Devon?

The weekly case rate in Devon right now is 16 cases per 100,000. It was seven per 100,000 a week ago. Case rates are currently highest and increasing most rapidly in those aged 20 to 39 years old.

The more transmissible Delta strain is not the dominant variant in Devon just yet. But it is very likely to become so, just as it is already in many parts of the country.





#### A PLEA TO BE CAREFUL

The latest data in Devon shows the largest volume of positive COVID-19 cases are among young people and the younger working age population, 20 to 39 year olds.

It's probably less to do with the fact they're working - we're not seeing an especially high number of outbreaks in workplace settings - and more likely that these age groups are just beginning to be vaccinated, so until now they haven't been as well protected as older, already vaccinated, age groups.

It is also likely that this is an age group that tends to mix more socially. We know that increased socialising, particularly indoors, increases the risk of transmission, and with pubs, restaurants and many other places open again, the opportunity for social contact is much more available.

So, here's a plea to everyone, including this younger working age population. Please be mindful. We've still got to be careful. There are still rules, especially around social distancing and face coverings indoors, and we need to follow them. And please take up the vaccination when you're invited to do so.

If you're out with others, or staying in with others, <u>stick to the rules – hands, face, space and fresh air.</u>

### QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE – a celebration of faith & service

A four-day Bank Holiday from 2-5 June 2022 will mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee next year. This is an amazing opportunity to bring our communities together for the celebrations, which end on Pentecost Sunday.

HOPE Together, the Church of England, the Methodist Church, Biblica and other key partners are currently planning for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, with a specially commissioned souvenir book for us to give away; a new anthem for communities and churches to sing; a '70 Acts of Service' community challenge for us to adapt to use together with churches and other organisations in our area, and lots of resources for children and schools.

Rachel Jordan-Wolf, HOPE's executive director said, "Churches are in an ideal place to bring communities together for national celebrations. We have the tables, chairs, crockery and PA systems – and we love making cakes!

"It is so appropriate that the nation and Commonwealth should be celebrating the Queen's Platinum Jubilee on the same weekend as Pentecost, the day when the church celebrates the gift of God's Holy Spirit."

The anointing of God's Holy Spirit was central to the Coronation and, in preparation for the day, The Queen prayed: 'Come, Holy Spirit, and daily increase in all of us, and in me, thy humble servant, thy manifold gifts of grace; the spirit of wisdom and understanding; the spirit of counsel and strength; the spirit of knowledge and true godliness, and fill us, O Lord, with the Spirit of thy holy fear, now and forever. Amen.'

The beautifully illustrated souvenir book to be published for the celebrations uses rarely seen prayers, which the Queen prayed in preparation for the Coronation, and highlights how God has answered those prayers over the past seven decades.

We can plan to get our church involved, invite our community to the party, and round off the weekend with a special guest celebration service for Pentecost.



#### **ROUND AND ROUND THE GARDEN JULY 2021**

I know I keep referring back to things I have written in previous years but we forget so quickly—at least I do—what actually happened. For example I was surprised to be reminded that last year, when we had that

wonderful Spring while we were all locked down, June turned wet and cold. I am reminded that we drove up to Hound Tor one morning in early June and the temperature was just 7ºC. This year of course we had an extraordinary Spring, with April being one of the driest on record (until the final day), followed by one of the wettest Mays on record, with a phenomenal 9.6 inches of rain. Yes, 9.6 inches! And it was cold. But now here we are, approaching mid-June and despite all that rain, the ground is getting parched and I'm having to keep watering everything I've planted over the past couple of weeks or so.

Several plants are not doing very well - although I'm sure you'll be pleased to know that the weeds are doing fine! My sweet peas are a bit of a disaster this year. I sowed them at about the same time as usual but because it was so cold in May I delayed putting them out. By the time I did get round to putting them out they were seriously pot-bound and slugs had started to nibble at the



The tihonias (Mexican sunflower) which I have regularly grown from seed in recent years, are

also struggling. They too have suffered from getting pot-bound and are only now showing signs of getting going.

The dahlias which I lifted last autumn and started off in the greenhouse are doing OK but the ones which I left in the ground are way behind schedule. The cold weather we had in May, with several late frosts, didn't do them any favours. They are coming on slowly now but they are at least two to three weeks behind where they should be by now. It will be a late flowering season this year.

In the veg patch things are looking a bit more promising. The shallots, garlic and potatoes are all looking fine. But the dwarf beans are struggling. Like everything else that was started in the greenhouse, they were late to go out. And when I did put them out the pigeons (or was it the squirrels?) nipped off a lot of the young leaves. They are recovering slowly and I have a second batch just

coming through in the greenhouse. Lettuces and radishes are coming on, though I sowed them rather late. Tomatoes in the greenhouse are doing fine.

I make quite a lot of compost. I mix it with commercial compost in pots and also use it as a mulch. However, this year in particular, I am finding that it is full of seeds — mainly of foxgloves and verbena bonariensis, as well as bitter-cress. I can produce lovely compost but I can't get the compost heap hot enough to kill all the unwanted seeds. So I have to keep weeding the areas where I have put down the compost. As least with the current spell of dry weather it should be possible to leave the weeds on the surface to die off.

Our robins, of which we seem to have at least two pairs on opposite sides of the garden, are both feeding their second brood. I was cutting the grass the other day, stopped for a moment and instantly had a robin perched on the wheel of the lawnmower. A bit later I was using a pair of edging shears and a robin almost perched on the handle while I was using them. What a delight.

On the other hand, if anyone knows how to discourage wood pigeons, apart from shooting or poisoning them, please let us know. Their numbers seems to have exploded this year and we are fed up with their cooing at 5am, while they march up and down the roof over our bedroom.

We're just about to go off to north Devon for a few days and perhaps we'll get to visit Rosemoor. If so, it will be interesting to see how far advanced the gardens are up there.



### HOW A VICAR'S TIKTOK MEANT FOR SEVEN TEENAGERS REACHED 1.7 MILLION

What began as an amusing way to keep up with the seven teenagers in her congregation is now serious outreach for the Revd Anne Beverley of Christ Church in Wesham, Lancashire.

When the coronavirus pandemic struck, the first lockdown brought with it a need to stay in touch with the teenagers in her congregation, so Revd Anne Beverley filmed on the social media platform, TikTok – but she did not expect what happened next.

In three days, her video on her TikTok account @ChristChurchWesham was seen not just by the seven local teenagers, but by 1.7 million people around the world.

"We just sat at home watching the numbers go up every time we refreshed our phones," said Revd Beverley, "it was ridiculous."

Today, five or six videos are posted each week, which range from dances and singing, to short sermons while walking the dog.

The church has more than 66,000 followers and receives around a thousand comments and questions about God each week.



#### **IDENTIFYING WILD FLOWERS AND GRASSES**

On 10th June ten of us from Buckland and further afield gathered to discover the wealth of wild flowers and grasses in the churchyard. An event organised by Beautiful Burial Grounds and led by brilliant ecologist Hannah Gibbons. Some areas of the churchyard have had minimal cutting for over a year now which has allowed the emergence of plants from long dormant seed.


We sat in a circle on the grass outside the West door of the church and over the next hour and a half found 30 different species - 10 of which were indicators of species rich grassland including Mouse-ear Hawkweed , Ox-eye Daisy and Pignut. A further 12 were indicative of semi-improved pasture such as Cuckoo Flower, Lesser Trefoil and Common Cat's ear - overall a fantastic result. Everyone was impressed by Hannah's enthusiasm and clever prompts for remembering elusive plants such as 'hairy knees' for Creeping Soft Grass.

The churchyard is certainly richer for this added colour and increased insect life - I noticed a speckled wood butterfly, a hover fly and several garden chafers within minutes. Most of the churchyard will be cut later this month so visit soon to enjoy.



The full list of over 50 species recorded so far will be on the Beautiful Burial Grounds website later in the year.


