DISCERNING THE SIGNS OF THE TIMES

'The problem is communication — too *much* communication,' mused Homer Simpson, as he tried to make sense of how he had upset his wife. If you have ever watched 'The Simpsons', you will know that Homer usually got the wrong end of the stick but, in doing so, hit on some truth.

In these last 18 months, personal face to face communication has been limited during this pandemic. However, many of us, via TV, radio, telephone and social media will have received and heard more news than ever before. Some might even echo Homer's musing – 'too much communication!'

Trying to make sense of an overload of news, opinions and information, whilst being isolated and without an opportunity to talk it through with friends, can lead to feeling confused, anxious and frustrated.

This summer, headlines that denounced Britain as 'racist' were side by side with pictures of thousands of people desperate to come to this country. Families risking their lives to cross the English Channel in flimsy vessels; migrants who recognise Britain as one of the most tolerant and liberal societies in the world.

How do we understand and discern what is really going on?


The Psalmist said: The Word of God is 'a lantern to my feet and a light to my path'. (Psalm 119 verse 105). The bible acknowledges that the world has always been a confusing place where God's people have needed to find guidance and counsel to walk their way through it. The bible can help us interpret what is going on and find light for our path.



The Guild of St Lawrence have managed to arrange the Associated Boards Royal Schools of Music exams twice during periods of eased

restrictions during the pandemic and it was really good to hear the performances of brilliant students, some of whom are extremely young. We made the decision not to open to visitors this summer but hope to be open in 2022. However, if anyone is keen to be shown round the Chapel, exhibitions and archives then please phone 01364 652768 to make arrangements.

The events we hoped to arrange in conjunction with Ashburton Museum this year had to be cancelled, but we hope to arrange these next year, including an Ashburton Drama Exhibition at the Chapel and a joint Family Fun Day.

During 2021 we had to arrange safety work to the tower spire after a large piece of lead flashing was blown off during a gale. The lead was replaced by steeplejacks but inspection during the course of this work showed that the spire finishes need to be taken down and re-installed to ensure safety. As a short term safety measure the spire has been strapped to its full height.

To carry out the full re-installing work is not going to be cheap and will need scaffolding to be installed to one side of the tower. Something we are considering is to remove the concrete from one side of the tower while the scaffolding is in place. This would greatly help with the serious problem of moisture not being able to escape due to the concrete which was applied to the tower on the 1960's.

We also need to replace the roof finish to the extensive flat roofed areas of the building and this will cost in the region of £18,000.

We need help from the Town to achieve these works. Community monies raised will count as match funding when we apply for grants. This will greatly

help as it will show that the local community greatly support St Lawrence Chapel and its long term future.

We will be organising fund raising events very carefully from now on, all of which will be Covid19 safe. The first of these is a classical music recital by the Beacon Piano Trio on Sunday 12th September at 3pm (see separate advert for details on page 17).

The Guild of St Lawrence really looks forward to your support at this recital and at future events we will organise.

THANKING GOD FOR OUR BLESSINGS

Our winter barley ripened quickly this year, and soon the combine harvesters were rolling here on the Northumberland / Scottish Border.

As the first trailer load of grain came into the shed, I ran my hands through the golden grains, offering a short



prayer of thankfulness as I savoured the smell of fresh cut barley. It was a good harvest.

I've often reflected on the Old Testament festival of the Firstfruits, where the Israelites offered the very first sheaf of the spring harvest to God (Leviticus 23:9-14). I think this act required great faith, as they trusted God for a fruitful harvest to come, something that was far from certain, given their utter dependence on the weather.

I'm not sure about you, but I'm always up for giving thanks *after* the event. I'll sing 'Come ye thankful people come' and rejoice that "all is safely gathered in", but am I able to trust with anticipation for what is *yet to come*?

The festival of the Firstfruits reminded God's people that everything they had came from Him. I am reminded that I must learn (and relearn) to trust in God, who has proven His faithfulness to me, over and over again.

Perhaps right now as a church community or an individual you're waiting for a certain event, standing on the cusp of a new initiative, praying for a certain outcome or anticipating a long-held vision becoming reality. Let's all keep trusting that whatever the challenge, however things turn out, irrespective of what we anticipate, God is going before us and has secured the Firstfruits of an even greater harvest through Jesus, as He rose from the dead.

Just as the grain offering to God in the Old Testament anticipated a harvest to come, Paul reminds us that Jesus' victory anticipates an even greater bodily resurrection and eternal peace (1 Corinthians 15:20-22).

As we continue our journey with Jesus through the challenges of each day, let's do so with a deepening faith and trust. In the meantime, bring on the harvest – I'll see you on the other side!

Coronavirus (COVID-19) response update from Devon County Council

Vulnerable people in Devon are at risk of not receiving the care they need when they need it. Our health and care system in Devon is at full stretch, and the sustained pressure on the care workforce means that staff are struggling to cope.

There are too few care workers in Devon right now, so we're calling for over 1,000 more people to join the care workforce, and for families and communities to do all they can to help ease the pressure.

Thousands of <u>care job vacancies</u> are being advertised in Devon today, and with care staff off work – self-isolating because of coronavirus, or because they're otherwise unwell – care companies are struggling.

What do we need?

We desperately need people to fill care roles across Devon:

1000 new recruits into social care would make a very real difference to the people who need immediate support. We can help with training for those without it. We can match you up with where your skills are needed and the kind of work you want to do.

COVID Case rates over the last few weeks in Devon are the highest they have been since the start of the pandemic, with cases in Exeter among the highest in the country.

Why is Exeter's case rate so high?

"Cases are across people of all ages, but predominantly among younger working age people and late teens - so 16 to 44 year olds,"

"The data doesn't point to there being any particular outbreak of size in any particular locations. Neither is there any evidence to suggest the rise is attributable to holiday makers to Devon."

So what is it? It's a combination of factors that include:

the Delta strain, dominant across the country including Devon, is much easier to catch and spread than previous variants,

lifting of most restrictions, which has opened up social mixing

more people returning to work, including in hospitality and retail where lots of people are in close contact with each other ,

may be among the reasons for the increase.

We are not seeing the high case rates reflected in coronavirus-related hospitalisations, and that's because of the vaccination programme.

There are simple and effective steps that we can continue to take that help to reduce the risk of catching and spreading the virus and we are urged to follow them.

Although there is no legal requirement to do so, the public health advice is to continue to be cautious and to take steps to protect ourselves and others.

We can do that by:

- limiting our social contacts to stop the virus spreading
- meeting others outside, because that's safer than meeting inside
- continuing to wear face coverings when indoors in public places, including on public transport
- washing your hands properly and regularly
- having the vaccination when you're invited to do so, and to have both doses at the earliest opportunity
- self-isolating if told to do so by NHS Test and Trace
- self-isolating and arranging a PCR test if you show any symptoms of having the virus the high temperature, new and continuous cough, or change of your usual sense of taste or smell.



Warm Home Discount - money off your energy bill!

You might be able to get £140 off your energy bill this winter under the Warm Home Discount Scheme if you're either:



- in receipt of the guarantee credit part of Pension Credit, or
- on a low income

First check with your energy supplier to see if they offer the Warm Home Discount - not all suppliers are part of the scheme.

Each energy supplier only accepts a limited number of applications and if you switch supplier before you get the payment, you have to apply again with your new supplier.

Households on prepayment, smart or standard meters can all receive the Warm Home Discount.

Priority Services Registers - extra support from your energy supplier

Extra support is available from energy suppliers where a member of the household is deemed to be vulnerable. This could be due to age, disability, long-term health problems, having children under 5, being pregnant or having extra communication needs. You might also be able to register for other reasons e.g, if you need short-term support after a stay in hospital.



You can apply by contacting your energy supplier. Give them your contact details and as much information as you can about your needs. Your supplier can pass your details to your network operator (Western Power Distribution) to add you to their register too. It's a good idea to ask them to do this if you rely on your energy supply for medical reasons.

If you have different suppliers for your gas and electricity, you need to contact them both and you'll need to register again with any new supplier if you switch supplier.



ROUND AND ROUND THE GARDEN AUGUST 2021

It's been one of those years when I could re-run last year's article and you probably wouldn't notice the difference — except that this time last year the Magazine was online and I guess that fewer of you than usual may have

seen it. However, I wouldn't do that to you, would I?

One thing I did say last year was that the tomatoes were doing exceptionally well - no blight, no blossom-end rot and only a limited amount of splitting, a problem which I always have. Well, this year they have been even better. In fact they are the best I have ever been able to produce. Had there been a flower show, they would surely have won a prize. They shaped, glossy are evenly absolutely delicious. I'm sure the difference lies in the compost. I found some extra deep growbags into which I put pots with their bottoms cut out. topped these up recommended peat-free compost and the results have been outstanding. Cucumbers have responded equally well to the same treatment. They are a small "lunch-box" variety called Mini -munch and they grow to a pickable size almost as you look at them.

Outdoor veg have been doing OK. I usually grow a small number of

potatoes and this year I mixed the familiar Charlottes with a variety called Anya. These are a cross between Pink Fir Apple and Desiree. The taste is slightly unusual being nutty, almost like a chestnut. They have a

waxy flesh which makes them an excellent salad potato. If you want to try them they are available in only one of the supermarket chains If I tell you that they are named after the wife of Baron Sainsbury, you can probably guess which one. I'm not sure exactly what she thought about the honour because Anya has to be one of the ugliest potatoes ever grown. It's long, thin, has deep sunken eyes and is very knobbly!

Charlotte on the other hand is a classic white, smooth-skinned potato, the main problem being that unless you lift them very early, they can grow enormous. I dug up one last week that looked as though it could feed a family for a week!

Elsewhere around the garden there are mixed results. The cosmos don't seem to be doing as well as usual, with several of the smaller Sonata variety starting to give up already. For some reason, the larger Sensation plants are not as floriferous as usual. Verbena bonariensis on the other

hand is growing like a weed and I'm pulling up seedlings from all over the place.

The other annuals which are doing rather well are the rudbeckias. It's a variety called Autumn Gold, which I haven't grown before. It's a bit taller than I had expected but the flowers are big and bright and last for weeks.

Pelargoniums are not at their best this year. I think several of the plants are getting a bit too old and I may need to grow some new ones next year. Perhaps I should be taking some cuttings.

I was given some gardening tokens recently and was able to buy some new plants. I invested in a salvia "Amistad", which has gorgeous deep purple flowers and a couple of perovskia (Russian Sage), which has spikes of pale blue flowers which contrast beautifully with the salvia. Along with the hardy geranium Rozanne, some campanulas, alliums and monkshood (aconitum) I now have a developing blue-themed bed which should have colour for much of the growing season.

There has been no flower show in Bickington again this year for understandable reasons and sadly the alternative village tea event had to be called off because of bad weather. But thank you to the Flower Show organisers for your efforts. The scarecrows around the village were a delight.

Time to sign off and go and erect some new trellis panels where we had to have a conifer hedge removed. Take care until next month.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Prep: 30 Mins Cook: 20 Mins

Makes: 40-50

scrummy cake is really easy and versatile – use whatever fruit you like, and you'll make it again and again

SIMPLE ICED BISCUITS

Ingredients:

- 200g unsalted butter, softened
- 200g golden caster sugar
- 1 large egg
- ½ tsp vanilla extract or 1 lemon, zested
- 400g plain flour, plus extra for dusting




To Decorate

 $8-12 \times 19g$ coloured icing pens , or fondant icing sugar mixed with a little water and food colouring

Method:

- 1 Heat oven to 200C/180Cfan/Gas 6. Put the butter in a bowl and beat it using an electric whisk until soft and creamy. Beat in the sugar, then the egg and vanilla or lemon, and finally the flour to make a dough. If the dough feels a bit sticky add a little more flour and knead it in.
- **2** Cut the dough into six pieces and roll out one at a time to about 5mm thickness on a floured surface. The easiest way to do this is to roll the mixture out on a baking mat. Cut out letter and number shapes (we used 7 x 4cm cutters) and peel away the leftover dough at the edges. Re-roll any off-cuts and repeat.
- **3** Transfer the whole mat or the individual biscuits to 2 baking sheets transfer them to baking parchment if not using a mat) and bake for 7-10 mins or until the edges are just brown. Leave to cool completely and repeat with the rest of the dough. You should be able to fit about 12 on each sheet. If you are using two sheets, then the one underneath will take a minute longer.
- **4** Ice the biscuits using the pens to make stripes or dots, or colour in the whole biscuit if you like. They will keep for five days in an airtight container.



PARISH WILDLIFE WARDENS

Buckland-in-the-Moor has a team of four new Wildlife Wardens which is a recent Teignbridge District Council initiative to establish a warden in all 54 parishes (the brainchild of Audrey Compton). The aim is to help local wildlife survive the ecological and climate emergencies. The Wildlife Warden Scheme is part of Action for Climate Change and supports Teignbridge District Council to ensure its climate and ecological emergency declarations are reflected in all its policies, decisions and activities.

The four volunteer wildlife wardens are Jonet Waldock, Nobby Clarke, Mary Staniland and Rebecca Gethin. "We have just started with some training and are, at present, surveying the flora and fauna of the parish so that we know what we've got but as we get to understand the role better you will hear more from us. Reviving the wildlife talks is on our agenda, too," said Rebecca.

They would love to hear about unusual sightings and at present particularly want to know if anyone has the rare lichen Pulmonaria Lobellia or Tree Lungwort growing on trees on their property.


