Reading

Hebrews 10:11-14, 19-25

And every priest stands day after day at his service, offering again and again the same sacrifices that can never take away sins. But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, 'he sat down at the right hand of God', and since then has been waiting 'until his enemies would be made a footstool for his feet.' For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are sanctified.

Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain (that is, through his flesh), and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

Gospel Reading

Mark 13:1-8

As Jesus came out of the temple, one of his disciples said to him, 'Look, Teacher, what large stones and what large buildings!' Then Jesus asked him, 'Do you see these great buildings? Not one stone will be left here upon another; all will be thrown down.'

When he was sitting on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter, James, John, and Andrew asked him privately, 'Tell us, when will this be, and what will be the sign that all these things are about to be accomplished?' Then Jesus began to say to them, 'Beware that no one leads you astray. Many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and they will lead many astray. When you hear of wars and rumours of wars, do not be alarmed; this must take place, but the end is still to come. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will be famines. This is but the beginning of the birth pangs.'

Sermon

Some of the most iconic images of battlefields are of outlines of ruined buildings – stark silhouettes of broken gables with rafters randomly pointing at the sky. And below these, heaps of rubble where there had been tables and chairs. Streets littered with debris, or country lanes with deep, water-filled, muddy ruts.

Destruction wrought by bombs and shells to prevent defenders hiding, and, when completely deserted, to be claimed as captured land as the battle moves slowly on.

Such destruction has always been a feature of conflicts and wars. The temple in Jerusalem that Jesus was referring to, was completely destroyed, along with most of the city, in AD 70 by the Romans, with a result not very different from the Somme battlefields.... 'Not one stone left upon another.'

Jesus foresaw such wars and destruction because he knew that the human spirit, unchecked, can hardly resist the desire to conquer and control.

And it's when conquering and controlling are driven by hatred and oppression that those standing up for good, for peace, for justice, are faced with very few options.

The first and best option is talks seeking peace, attempting to bring about a fair agreement and a resolution of the issues. But when such talks break down, and there are violent attacks or invasive action, it's almost inevitable that fighting will start, forces will be mobilised, and defence and counter-attacks will be needed.

Fifteen years ago I met an old lady in a nursing home in Somerset who told me that she was a secretary working in Whitehall before the war – she was a copy-typist, working as part of a pool, sitting at her typewriter all day, typing up messages, memos, documents and letters. After placing in her typewriter a top sheet, with several sheets of carbon paper and "flimsy" paper underneath, she start typing, making up to 3 or 4 copies at once.

One day in 1939 she was hard at work when a new document was brought in, and she found herself typing something like "We, Great Britain, declare war on, you, Germany...." She said she was terrified, and immediately phoned her mum to tell her; despite having signed up to the Official Secrets Act!

Her reaction would shortly spread across the whole country – with every citizen facing their own fears and anxiety, many remembering that it was only twenty five years since the previous declaration of war against Germany, in 1914.

Once again, many would lose their lives. This time tens of thousands of civilians in bombing raids, along with hundreds of thousands of soldiers, airmen and seamen in conflict.

Everyone was caught up in the tragedy and bitterness of more than five years of war, with a nationwide determination to defeat Hitler's Fascist ambitions, and to keep the country safe.

However this was no self-centred war, simply to preserve British prosperity. Britain was saved, but also the conflict led to the rooting out the European-wide evil of the gas-chambers and the Holocaust.

Terrible times, with many tragic and heroic stories that are being remembered today.

Thankfully, since then, there have been no conflicts to equal the scale of the Second World War; rather conflicts across the world have been gradually reducing. But Jesus was realistic enough to prophesy that with flawed human nature being slow to change, there will still be 'wars and rumours of wars - For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom.'

As with every generation, we need to work afresh to learn from the mistakes of the past, and to commit to built a better, safer and fairer world. Keeping hope alive for future generations.

This is a key part of today's service, our united 'Act of Commitment' later in this service. And it's also a key part of the Christian Faith, expressed so well by St Paul who says:

'Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds encouraging one another.'

The best way for us to pay our debt of gratitude to those who gave their lives for us, is for us all to work together to build a better future.
