Scripture Readings

Romans 10.8b-13

What does scripture say?

'The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart' (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, 'No one who believes in him will be put to shame.' For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

This is the word of the Lord.

Luke 4.1-13

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone." '

Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, 'To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him." '

Talk

In the desert we see Jesus, our Saviour, having his faith in God tested, and we've heard St Paul talking about being saved through faith in Jesus.

"Being saved" is a consequence of our faith in God, of our trust in God. So let's see if we can explore in more detail what it means.

Here's a story about someone who was confident of being saved by God, but it didn't quite turn out as he expected:

A man was stuck on his rooftop in a flood. He was praying to God for help.

Soon a man in a rowing boat came by and he shouted to the man on the roof, "Jump in, I can save you."

The stranded man shouted back, "No, it's OK, I'm praying to God and he is going to save me."

So the rowing boat went on.

Then a motorboat came by. The man in the motorboat shouted, "Jump in, I can save you."

To this the stranded man said, "No thanks, I'm praying to God and he is going to save me. I have faith."

So the motorboat went on.

Then a helicopter came by and the pilot shouted down, "Grab this rope and I will lift you to safety."

To this the stranded man again replied, "No thanks, I'm praying to God and he is going to save me. I have faith."

So the helicopter reluctantly flew away.

Soon the water rose above the rooftop and the man drowned. He went to Heaven. He finally got his chance to discuss this whole situation with God, at which point he exclaimed, "I had faith in you but you didn't save me, you let me drown. I don't understand why!"

To this God replied, "I sent you a rowing boat and a motorboat and a helicopter, what more did you expect?"

From this story, I reckon that "being saved" doesn't just happen to us, it's more like an action or series of actions that we have to take.

Say you were on that roof as the waters were rising, can you think of something else you might have liked to have, if there were no boats or helicopters around? (There is a clue on the front cover!)

A life-jacket....

But even a life-jacket won't save us unless we put it on! Only when I'm wearing one will I have a greatly improved chance of being saved.

It turns out, I think, that being saved requires us to do new things, different things from what we did before, and to stop doing things that lead us astray. Like Jesus in the desert, we have to try and resist the temptation to do selfish and self-indulgent things.

I very much doubt whether I would have stood as strong as Jesus did in the desert. Imagine this scenario:

Firstly, you're incredibly hungry, and you're offered the opportunity to do a miracle to create some food just for yourself. Just imagine, wouldn't everyone else be amazed at your power and cleverness?

Secondly, imagine if a wealthy criminal, with all the money in the world said: "If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours." In other words, you can become just as big a criminal as him! Think of all that money and power, wouldn't it be wonderful?

Thirdly, suppose you had the chance to be the one person in the world who couldn't be hurt or killed? You'd be invulnerable.

The thing that's wrong with all the devil's temptations is that he assumed that Jesus would greedily jump at the chance of being special and different and unlike anyone else.

Whereas it was quite the opposite. Jesus came to join us, to live with us, to be one of us, to be a friend to everyone, and to suffer like us.

Not for a moment did Jesus lose sight of his mission to bring God's love and joy to all. He resisted the temptations to be selfish and to win popularity.

This is what St Paul hoped for, for all those who were being saved.

Perhaps what "being saved" really means is to stop living for oneself, stop seeking one's own satisfaction. Instead learning how to put God as one's top priority, and then to love and care for everyone around, ignoring all those temptations to simply do (or get) only we want.

With the result, as Paul says, that "The Lord of all is generous to all who call on him." God's generosity always leads to our happiness; to life, and joy, and peace.

We just need to put on God's lifejacket, saying "Lord I am following you", and he will keep us safe!
