
An order of service

Introduction

We have all seen the news of the devastating war in Ukraine. We've heard heart-breaking stories of people fleeing violence, not knowing when they'll see their loved ones again.

In Zimbabwe, another crisis – the climate crisis – is causing aching hunger for families like Jessica's.

Even though it's 7,000 miles away, the war in Ukraine will drive up food prices in Zimbabwe and around the globe. Ukraine and Russia produce large amounts of the world's fertiliser and food, like wheat and cooking oil. Without them, vulnerable families will be pushed even deeper into hunger.

But hope does not disappoint. Hope lives in you.

Every prayer, every gift, every action brings hope to people facing disaster, from conflict to climate chaos. Join us this Christian Aid Week as we celebrate and share hope with our sisters and brothers facing crisis around the world, from Ukraine to Zimbabwe.

In our service today we are going to consider what it means to live fruitful lives. This is a phrase used throughout the Bible. Bearing fruit that is good and that will last is something we are called to do as followers of Jesus.

What does this mean, to bear fruit, in today's world? In a world where 44 million people face the challenge of daily food shortages and chronic hunger, what does 'fruit that will last' mean to all our lives?

As fruit is a source of sweet sustenance and life, we cannot just consider the challenge of hunger. We must also consider the solutions and change that we can participate in bringing about.

We will root these ideas in the stories of Jessica and Janet from Zimbabwe. We will reflect on these big questions through the lived experience of hunger caused by drought.



Jessica Mwedzi, a loving mum in Zimbabwe, fears her family won't eat tonight. When food is scarce, she can only give her children one bowl of porridge a day. She shares her heartbreak: 'My children crave a decent meal, but I can't provide. It pains me to send them to bed hungry.' For Jessica, drought means every day is a struggle for survival. Like many women in Zimbabwe, she toils on her farm, but no food can grow on her ashen dry land. 'One year, we had no rain. The scorching sun burnt my crops just as they were about to bloom. It was so painful and disheartening.'

You can help this loving mum turn hunger into hope. Your gift this Christian Aid Week could help Jessica grow seeds that thrive in the drought. In the months to come, she'll grow these seeds into fresh food like tomatoes, beans and cucumbers to sell and to feed her family. She'll have the joy of seeing her children grow up happy and healthy. 'I pray they have a better future.' This Christian Aid Week, as you sit down to eat your favourite meal at the table, please pray for Jessica and her family. Your gifts and prayers could fill families like hers with hope.



Janet Zirugo, 70, loves seeing her grandchildren's faces light up as she hugs them tight. Janet has a big heart. Many of the children in her family are orphans, and she is their sole provider. 'In my family, children look up to me and I must give them food. In her village in Zimbabwe, Janet has seen how drought pushed her family into desperate hunger. 'One year, there was so little food. Rains had not fallen. We ate things which we wouldn't eat in normal times. My heart was so painful thinking that my family would die. By God's grace we did not die. We soldiered on.'

With faith, hope and love, Janet brought her family through this painful time. Thanks to kind people like you, she was given drought-resistant seeds that can grow in this harsh climate. You'll be happy to know her farm is now bursting with life. She proudly shows us the food she has grown – bowls full of groundnuts, wild fruit, golden corn; a rainbow of colour. Now, she is strong and resilient. With all her strength, she works on her farm so her family never again go hungry. As she reflects on how her life has changed, Janet sings with joy. We rejoice with her.

¶ The Gathering

Gospel Reading

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to you, O Lord.

John 13.31-35

When he had gone out, Jesus said, 'Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

The Sermon

Our reading from the book of Revelation is a vision not only of hope for the future, but also a vision of how God wants the world to be now.

John was writing at a time when the Roman Empire was advancing. The Empire seeking more and more political and economic power. And to get it, the Romans demanded that their own emperors and traditional gods are worshipped. But John is providing another way, the way of worshipping God.

The scenes he describes, provide encouragement to the early churches to directly challenge the powers that would suppress the Kingdom of God.

John's vision challenges us today to not settle into this contemporary global empire but to seek to understand a 'new heaven and new earth.'

God comes to dwell with mortals in a new earth, to live in the home that earth was intended to be. The earth, as God's home, gives us inspiration to participate in that work of re-creation now. A work that challenges the loss and damage caused by climate injustice.

In his vision of seeing the new heaven and new earth, John draws our attention to God wiping away every tear from the eyes of those who have suffered. The anticipation of such comfort and tender compassion serves as a catalyst to us today to ensure the tears of frustration and desperation of those hungry to provide can be wiped away.

We can stand with people like Jessica and Janet who are living at the sharp end of the climate crisis. Drought is making Jessica's community hungry and impoverished, denying them the fullness of life and dignity God intended.

We have an opportunity to participate in creating a glimpse of the earth as God's home when we work together to help women like Jessica to grow fresh food to feed their families and to work to recover the loss and damage caused by climate injustice.

However, mourning and crying and pain will be no more, says John, giving us comfort and hope that the life-denying effects of the climate crisis, and the death and heartache of the global pandemic, will be no more. This and every Christian Aid Week, we work towards the day when all such injustices, death and suffering have ended.

And in stories about drought and hunger from Zimbabwe, may the anticipation and invitation of verse 6: 'To the thirsty I will give water as a gift from the spring of the water of life,' come as refreshment to all our world-weary souls.

In John's Gospel, Jesus' giving of the commandment to 'love one another' was new to the disciples – 'I give you a new commandment, that you love one another'. They were used to being asked to devote themselves to God, but this commandment – love one another – was new in its scope and inspiration, spurred by the love that Jesus had for them.

'By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.' Jesus entreats us to demonstrate our love for him by loving one another. It is out of the fullness of the love poured into us by God that we in turn pour out love to our sisters and brothers.

Love acts, as demonstrated so powerfully by Jesus enduring the cross and overcoming death. Each action we take this Christian Aid Week demonstrates our love in action:

- give to help women grow crops that survive in the drought
- raise your voice for justice by joining our Loss and Damage campaign
- pray that families will stay strong and be provided for during times of drought.

We are thankful for all that we have and pledge to share our resources to enable those who are hungry to provide.

But we recognise that this is not enough.

We invite you to reflect for a moment, then write or draw a response on each – or one of – the cut out fruit, leaf and/or axe in response to the following:

Leaf – a prayer and a hope for healing for a situation in your heart and for all who hunger in Zimbabwe and around the world.

Fruit – a good act or service we promise to do in the world to make a lasting difference.

Axe – an injustice that needs to be cut down or cut back so all of creation can flourish.

When you are ready, please come and fix your leaf and fruit to the branches and lay the axe at the foot of the tree.

We lay the axe at the base of the tree – not to cut it down but to make clear that there is still time for repentance.

When everyone who wishes to do so has stuck their templates on the tree, we say this short prayer:

God of all the earth, we offer with our gifts these leaves of our compassion this fruit of our promises and the axe of our aspirations for the healing of the nations and the transformation of the world. Amen.
