Gathering

All gather in silence at the War Memorial

We meet in the presence of God.

We commit ourselves to work in penitence and faith for reconciliation between the nations, that all people may, together, live in freedom, justice and peace.

We pray for all who in bereavement, disability and pain continue to suffer the consequences of fighting and terror.

We remember with thanksgiving and sorrow those whose lives, in world wars and conflicts past and present, have been given and taken away.

Act of Remembrance

The names of the fallen are read

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old; age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them. **We will remember them.**

The Kohima Epitaph is said:

When you go home tell them of us and say, for your tomorrow we gave our today.

The wreath is laid.

Almighty and eternal God, from whose love in Christ we cannot be parted, either by death or life: Hear our prayers and thanksgivings for all whom we remember this day; fulfil in them the purpose of your love; and bring us all, with them, to your eternal joy through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

In the stillness of this place we remember all who have died in war.

Reading

2 Thessalonians 3.6-13

Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labour we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.

Gospel Reading

Luke 21.5-19

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, he said, 'As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down.'

They asked him, 'Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?' And he said, 'Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and, "The time is near!" Do not go after them.

'When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately.' Then he said to them, 'Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven.

'But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defence in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls.'

Sermon

I find it's hard to think back to last year, just a year ago, when we were recovering from the first waves of Covid, and things looked like settling comfortably back to normal. It was a time to feel optimism and relief – but it turned out to be a short lived time.

Is it really only nine months since the invasion of Ukraine started? Since petrol shot up in price, and inflation started its ominous rise?

A year ago, if anyone had prophesied, like Jesus did, "that Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues", they would have been politely ignored. Possibly laughed at.

But, take out the bit about earthquakes, and the rest of Jesus' prophecy can be seen to have come true yet again. Nation rose against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and in various places famines and plagues have become major issues.

While we had hoped that the two World Wars would be the end of war, that humanity had cast such things aside and moved on, we are brought back to earth by finding that Jesus' words are an accurate forecast of the Russian invasion of Ukraine. One nation has risen up against another, and the consequences have far reaching implications way beyond anything we might have predicted.

It's not that Jesus was specially talking about Ukraine – how could he? It's just that he knew that what he saw in his time would endlessly recur until people finally realised the futility and destruction of war – until God's Kingdom comes.

Shockingly, the Ukrainian conflict, day by day, is shown on our screens and in our newspapers, and we are seeing sights that were thought to be unthinkable, never to be seen again. Instead it's like being transported back each day to revisit the pain of other conflicts such as the World Wars.

Front lines, trenches, bombed out buildings, ambulance trains, casualties, aerial attacks, generals making pronouncements; all this happening in Europe, when surely the two World Wars promised to end such conflicts?

It's not just the fighting that has scary parallels, but the knock on effect across the world. Economic disruption, refugees fleeing to distant countries, manufacturing of guns and ammunition ramping up and up.

Add to that the realisation that Ukraine's grain has been feeding millions in drought-struck countries, and the global disruption caused by this conflict becomes clear – I never realised that African famines were being relieved by ship-loads of wheat from Ukraine.

The consequences of a war, even such a limited war in just one country, are terrible and far-reaching, and are having an impact on all of us here today – directly responsible for rising fuel and food cost, inflation and financial hardship.

More than that, the parallels between Hitler and Putin are alarming – both ambitious men with a deep-seated need to boost their egos, their power and their status, and to ensure that any dissent or disagreement is quashed immediately. How can such men rise to power? Surely there should be ways of stopping them?

Well, yes there are, but it's a long game.

Perhaps on this Remembrance Sunday, it's more important than ever for us all to be conscious that we have a part to play in requiring politicians and statesmen to act in the public interest rather in their own interest. To always be discussing ways to peace, ways to resolve conflict.

Remembrance Sunday is not just about reminiscing and sympathising with those who lost their lives. It's about taking an active role ourselves in committing to the "cause of peace and for the relief of want and suffering", as our "Commitment" at the end of this service calls us to do. The best way of honouring our own fallen is by taking up their cause and playing our part in reducing conflict – at all levels – local, national and international. Living out Jesus' message of love to all, and modelling it.

I was delighted by a news story this week that just one person in a community who shows kindness can influence all the people around them in a positive way – it's catching. If all were kind and loving, conflict would end.

But it's not easy – resolving any conflict or dispute can be incredibly hard, hence St Paul begs of his readers "Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right." Keep going, live out what you believe and be an example to others.

Of course this is an endless task, one that has to be begun afresh each generation. We need to pass on our passion for reducing conflict and suffering in the world around us.

The lessons that we have learnt, need to be passed on, ensuring that children and young adults in our lives gradually increase in awareness of the world around them, and form their views based on the positive attitudes they encounter in those around them – their teachers, parents, grandparents, friends.

How do you resolve a playground argument? What do you say when you encounter a child playing a game of blowing up tanks and killing the enemy on their X-boxes?

There are no simple answers, but today is about re-affirming our intention for a better world, at whatever cost to ourselves.

And we are inspired by examples of those we remember today. People who were just like us, who did their best, but were caught up in the destruction of war and gave their lives.

They are examples to follow if we are called upon to do so, but more realistically, to allow ourselves to be inspired by them. They didn't know, but we do, that their sacrifice was another paving stone in the road that led to peace.

As we remember them, let us indeed be inspired by them. Amen.

Almighty God have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

- for the service men and women who have died in the violence of war, each one remembered by and known to God;

May God give peace.

May God give peace.

- for all who bear the burden and privilege of leadership, political, military and religious; asking for gifts of wisdom and resolve in the search for reconciliation and peace.

May God give peace.

O God of truth and justice,

we hold before you those whose memory we cherish,

and those whose names we will never know.

Help us to lift our eyes above the torment of this broken world,

and grant us the grace to pray for those who wish us harm.

As we honour the past, may we put our faith in your future; for you are the source of life and hope, now and for ever.
