Old Testament Reading

Gospel Reading

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John Glory to you, O Lord.

Luke 23.33-43

When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, 'He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!' The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, 'If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!' There was also an inscription over him, 'This is the King of the Jews.'

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, 'Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!' But the other rebuked him, saying, 'Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong.' Then he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.' He replied, 'Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

The Sermon

Jeremiah doesn't foretell Jesus coming as King, but in today's first reading he instead foretells the coming of a wise and good Shepherd. He's drawing on his knowledge of dedicated shepherds as the role was well known to him, and indeed to us.

Perhaps the biggest change in a shepherd's life since Jeremiah's time is the arrival of Quad Bikes. Mind you, I was talking to a Dartmoor shepherd this week who still rides out on horseback to keep an eye on his flock scattered over the common.

But Quad Bikes are the thing for the modern shepherd – get around quickly, speed in and speed out in the almost endless task of caring for the sheep, keeping an eye on them, checking they are OK.

So why is it that sheep (and indeed cattle and ponies) need looking after? Why are shepherds so important?

It's because sheep really aren't very good at looking after themselves – they get foot rot, they get caught in brambles, they get stuck behind fences.

One I met a couple of weeks ago had somehow got into a very narrow gap between a fence and a stone wall – it had churned the ground around it into mud, and couldn't turn and couldn't climb up – until we came along, when the sight of a dog and two people energised it so much that it scrambled up the wall, ran along the top for a couple of yards and then leapt over the fence to freedom.

On their own, sheep are pretty helpless – and so the role of shepherd came into existence. A good shepherd will care for and look after their sheep – but Jeremiah describes a dreadful sort of shepherd that "destroys and scatters the sheep of my pasture." Irresponsible behaviour causing damage, suffering and loss.

Jeremiah is comparing the need for sheep to have a shepherd to the need for people to have a shepherd who makes them feel safe and who supports them in their troubles. He was clearly unimpressed with his country's leaders at the time!

So he sees God as coming to take care of them - "Then I, God, will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the lands where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply."

Without a good leader (who sets out standards of good behaviour, and models good behaviour themselves), there are so many things that can hurt and damage people, even destroy and scatter them.

People know when they are being treated badly, when they suffer abuse, thus losing their dignity and self-respect. Jeremiah uses the word "evil" to describe actions and words that are destructive and damaging, rather than kind and good.

Evil is a strong word, but it's a useful short-hand for the things that hurt us when we suffer wrong in our lives.

I guess everyone here can think of a time when they felt upset or hurt by someone else's behaviour. It shouldn't happen, but it does – all too frequently, and the result is damaged relationships or even people damaged for their whole life.

Jeremiah was spelling out how society goes wrong. Then, a few hundred years later, Jesus spent his life in spelling out the importance of good behaviour. He spelt out the difference between right and wrong, between hypocrisy and honesty, between kind and caring behaviour or destructive, bad behaviour.

And Jesus' clear-sighted distinctions set the framework of all of our lives today. They have been incorporated into law, they are taught in schools, they make up the fabric of our society.

We know when they are broken – whether we are reading about MPs bullying Civil Servants, the illegal and destructive invasion of Ukraine, knife crime, sexual abuse, domestic abuse or whatever. People behaving badly is still, sadly, far too common.

I wonder, though, whether in their hearts such perpetrators know when they are behaving badly, but are sort of trapped by it. One of the criminals being executed alongside Jesus said: "We indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong."

So it's at the heart of the Christian gospel to help people acknowledge their behaviour, and to deal with the consequences of their bad behaviour:

- By apologising when we get something wrong
- By seeking forgiveness when we've upset someone
- By rebuilding relationships when they are damaged
- By caring for and loving our neighbours

These values, set out so clearly in the bible, are the foundation of Christianity and the Christian way of life, and have been around so long that they are embedded in our legal system, our culture, our daily lives.

So, for example, the phrase "going the extra mile" is part of Jesus' advice on how to build a relationship with someone who is making unreasonable demands.

It's in this context that we can rejoice that God's Son, Jesus, is our Shepherd. And that we can be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power – meaning that when we feel loved, we find it easier to be loving.

In particular Jesus showed his love for all lost sheep, all the embittered, struggling people, and he made them feel welcomed and valued. Just as good parents love their children, and make them feel welcomed and valued.

Yes, even when children drive their parents (or grandparents!) to despair or frustration, because even children have the capacity to be hurtful, selfish or unkind, just as we as adults have the capacity to get things wrong.

When we've sorted it, I'm sure you've felt that wave of relief after you've apologised to someone by saying "I'm sorry I got that wrong", and they say "That's ok – thank you for saying that."

We can see how St Paul's language echoes this theme "God has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins." Jesus as our Shepherd.

With his example to follow, just imagine if everyone apologised and made up relationships and sought to comfort people who are struggling... We wouldn't even need a Safeguarding Policy!

But of course society is not there yet, and terrible behaviour can still be found in every part of society. The chances are that many of us will have experienced abusive behaviour at some point in our lives, possibly even from fellow Christians. That's hard to understand.

Yet, by following Jesus as our Shepherd, and, on a bigger scale, seeing him as King of all, by trusting him and bringing our hurts to him, we can reach out and feel his love.

To know we are loved is to experience security and peace. Indeed, to have a foretaste of God's Kingdom. Amen.
