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

U6 Age Group Report by Jason Lenord

This year must have been a record for registrations for the Under 6s for Petersham, with about 30 kids starting the year, and another 6 or 7 joining us through the season. The boys (and Ruby) were keen to play, every one of them knowing of course how to play, knowing the rules of rugby, and with attention spans as far as the eye could see...

There were several boys backing up from last year, eager to make a name for themselves on the honour boards for the PJRU U6s. Experience certainly counted in the mental disintegration of the coaching staff. There were a few newcomers keen to stamp their authority in this newly discovered area of rugby.

With our many able dads, we had a conference and decided the only way forward was to divide and conquer. So we split them into three teams – Petersham White Coached by Dan Waterworth, Mark Longhurst and Peter Lloyd Jones, Petersham Maroon coached by Ben di Qual and Dave, with John Kilkenny, Rob Nicoletti and myself trying to herd together the mighty Petersham Blues.

Training started at 5:30pm sharp every Tuesday at Camperdown Oval with the one lap warm-up, followed by some drills, and of course, a drinks break to cool down those weary bodies from the massive effort expended in the first 20 minutes or so. In fact, the enthusiasm for drinks breaks never seemed to have waned. This was followed by a few games of Crows and Cranes (their favourite), "Sharks and Octopuses" and a practice game at the end.

Surely they were well prepared for the game?

There is one thing I know about Under 6 rugby, and that is that behaviour is predictable and repeatable.
