2:30 - Mick Needham - a PowerPoint presentation on the overview of early trains and streetcars in Chico


3:15 - Allen Wood - a PowerPoint presentation on the

Joe's Bar

"Reconstruction" of the small building at 5th and Ivy known as Joe's Bar will begin soon. Built before 1900, it was a Chinese Laundry and a Chinese Herbalist business from about 1900 to 1939 when it became a restaurant and since 1985, Joe's Bar. It is terribly sad to lose the last building associated with our Chinese heritage that still has any vestige of its original character, but the condition of the handmade bricks is such that the building is unsafe. There is one other building on 6th and Flume but it has been covered entirely with modern surfaces. Ed Burns, owner, is committed to preserving as much of the old brick and other components as possible for reuse in non-structural ways, and to retaining the character of the building as much as possible while making it ADA accessible. He reports that he has been amazed at the extent to which Joe's Bar has become a Chico icon, with people coming from afar to go there one last time before changes occur. Additionally, during the construction process, archaeologists will monitor any subsurface work to retrieve artifacts and other historic evidence that can be found.

Ed looks forward to a reopening celebration in 3 to 4 months.

Tres Hombres

The fire at Tres Hombres (the old Bidwell Store) has been an unfortunate event, but the saving of the building is moving forward with hopes of not having to remove any exterior walls. The north wall is actually the only remaining intact wall of the original structure, built ca. 1861. On page 2 we have a picture of the building sometime before the 1930's when it was a two story structure. It is one of the first commercial buildings constructed after the town was laid out in 1861.

WRIGHT-PATRICK UPDATE

This past fall saw a lot of progress on the Wright-Patrick House. Rotted and missing siding on the second story was replaced, thanks to the expertise of Chris Gauer and his helper Bob Stidhem. Bob Deter squared and reglued the upstairs porch door, then everyone scraped and sanded down to bare wood and applied two coats of quality primer as protection from the elements until next spring (thanks to Stan Thompson for the loan of equipment).

Our next projects will be to have Chris Gauer rebuild the upstairs windows, to start rebuilding the porch and railings, and to get a coat of paint on the entire building. In addition, we are continuing to document the history of the house for future reference.

Side note: our heirloom garden project was overtaken by the local rabbit population, who have undoubtedly multiplied a hundredfold due to the wonderful diet we provided them.

Thanks to all who have contributed so generously to the stabilization of this historic building. Our funds for this project are once again depleted, so we hope you will continue to support the ongoing efforts of our dedicated volunteers to save this invaluable piece of northern California history.

CHA Supports AB 827

The Chico Heritage Board voted to support Assembly Bill 827, which could provide funding for Counties to preserve and provide access to property and other records, through a very small fee per filed property document (no more than \$3), to be implemented only by vote of the Board of Supervisors.





