

THIRD STREET HOUSES -

Chico Heritage representatives, other community groups and a heartening array of students effectively challenged the credibility of a draft Environmental Impact Report on the value and condition of the Third Street houses. The University heard this response at a well-attended public hearing which was followed by written responses addressing the building's architecture, historical significance, structural condition and other types of community impact. Sorority and fraternity groups interested in the buildings have come forward. They have toured the buildings and are expressing interest in acquiring them on site. Because the draft EIR report was patently inadequate, a fuller more professional report will likely be commissioned.

RURAL PRESERVATION CONFERENCE

California's first State Rural Preservation Conference was held in Chico October 15-17. It was sponsored by Chico Heritage Association, the California State Office of Historic Preservation, and the Downtown Chico Businessman's Association. Approximately 100 persons attended the conference representing city and county agencies and boards from such diverse places as Los Angeles, Alturas, Bishop and Eureka. Topics presented at the conference included such subjects as tax incentives for historic preservation, methods and procedures of research, case histories of preservation projects, National Register listings, and tourism. The State Historic Preservation Office selected Chico as the site, and engaged Chico Heritage as the local "agents" to organize the conference because of Chico Heritage's "good track record and reliability" according to the State Office.

Working throughout the conference and acting as session chairpersons were key members of the State Historic Preservation Office, including Kathryn Gualtieri, Historic Preservation Officer for California, and Steade Craigo, State Preservation Architect. Also acting as a session chairperson was Clarence Cullimore, Chair of the State Historic Building Code Board.

Wednesday evening was an opening dinner reception held at the Redwood Forest Restaurant. Thursday's sessions were held at the Holiday Inn. Lunch guest speaker was State Senator Jim Neilsen who spoke on Rural Renaissance in California. Based on the bill he sponsored in the legislature which was signed by Governor Deukmejian, rural entities are able to apply for grants and loans to be used for job-producing economic development. Preservation and renovation of historic buildings' exteriors, with the buildings then returned to use in the community, and tourism, were two excellent examples of ways this could be done, Neilsen said.

Before dinner, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Fortino, Safor Corporation, generously hosted a reception at their Silberstein Park Building (1909, National Register), 400 block of Broadway. The beautifully restored building, formerly the La Grande Hotel, was returned to life by the Fortinos, and represents the only building to date in Chico which has taken advantage of financial incentives for restoration. Chico Heritage Association had researched the building, and listed it on the National Register of Historic Places. Thursday's dinner was at the Chico Community Center on Vallombrosa, and guest speaker was Kirk West, President of the California Chamber of Commerce. A quote West offered from another source was, "a city without old buildings is like an old man without memories."

Friday's sessions were at the Chico Women's Club, and at the end of the conference, attendees were able to take one of three walking tours of Chico which included Chico's oldest neighborhood (south of campus), downtown, and Chico's street trees. The conference has been judged a success, and the State Office hopes to make it an annual event.



This unique 2-story stucco home has been owned by only two families since 1918. The home is in excellent condition. It is 3,300 plus square feet, and has a 1000 square feet plus full basement. The main floor consists of an entry room, living room, and dining room with coved ceilings. It also includes a kitchen, back hallway and half-bath.
