

Update: Chico Historic Building Survey

In July of 1984 sixty additional structures were added to the first Chico Historic Building Survey, bringing the total number of structures surveyed to nearly 260. This figure is within the number of buildings which the State Office of Historic Preservation estimated Chico should research after they conducted a "windshield" survey of the city.

Phase II of the survey, as it was called, was financed over a six month period by a Community Block Grant of \$9000 which was administered by the City. Liz Stewart, a librarian and former survey volunteer, was hired as part-time director, with Giovanna Jackson assisting as consultant. A title searcher was also hired to help with the project. Volunteers for the research were recruited by various means--slide presentations at social clubs and the public library, flyers posted on the CSUC campus and downtown area, announcements in various newspapers and regular media spots. Articles in the Chico Enterprise Record each Sunday with photographs of homes from the first survey also provided wonderful publicity.

In all, there were around 40 volunteers, some home owners researching their own residences, who dug through Butte County tax rolls, city directories and old newspaper articles or interviewed residents and local historians. Others took photographs, typed, addressed envelopes and drew maps.

It was hard work, but also fun. The finished product turned into the City offices was our biggest reward. We are very grateful to everyone who contributed time or encouraged us by simply being interested.

I would particularly like to thank Louis Poor for his invaluable and patient help keeping track of the budget. Robie Amer, Emily Newton and John Gallardo were indispensable, particularly at the very last, drawing maps, writing and proof-reading. John Nopel was always willing to share his enthusiasm and store of knowledge. And to the many others too numerous to mention — thank you!



1984 At A Glance — A Message From The President

Chico Heritage Association had a busy and productive year in 1984. The major project was the <u>Chico Historic</u> Building Survey, Phase II, coordinated by Liz Stewart and assisted by Giovanna Jackson. Some 60 structures were researched, adding to the overall survey of Chico's heritage. To these two people, plus the many who volunteered and generously assisted in this project - thank you! A job well done!

An excellent walking tour brochure has been produced by an Association committee headed by Giovanna Jackson. Dealing with Chico's oldest neighborhood (south of campus), this is the first of several brochures planned to cover Chico's historic areas.

The <u>Chico Expo</u> gave <u>Chico Heritage exposure to over</u> 20,000 persons who attended the event. A booth was maintained at the Expo for that purpose, and some new members and volunteers were enlisted in the process.

On May 6th the grounds of the Stansbury Home was the scene of the 2nd Annual Pig Out for Preservation "picnic". Also during National Preservation Week several guided walking tours were conducted in "old Chico", encompassing the area on the new walking tour brochure.

Chico Heritage Association has had input into the plans for the renovation of the old Southern Pacific Depot, West 5th and Orange Streets, and contributed toward the acquisition of items for the interior of the depot. We are continuing to press for faithful restoration on the project. We also have submitted ideas for a wrought iron type fence should a fence be required between the Depot property and the city-owned old Depot park across the tracks. We do not feel the proposed chain link fence would be appropriate for that area.

Any community that is serious about saving its heritage has enacted mechanisms that encourage and ensure preservation. CHA has long worked for Chico to have such provisions and the City now has a draft of a Preservation Ordinance. After much public discussion and work, this community will soon join the others across the country which have demonstrated a true concern for preserving their cultural heritage.

The California State University, Chico-owned 3rd Street Language Houses continue to be of great concern. CHA maintains that this row of structures is very important to its neighborhood and to this community. The State Office of Historic Preservation concurs, and has joined the effort to preserve them.

A very common assumption is that structures that do not appear to be of national or even State-wide significance, are therefore unimportant. Even though a structure may be of strictly local importance or interest, it is significant for that area. This does not mean that only the grand or famous mansions or buildings are important. The homes of craftsmen, laborers and farmers are just as much a part of our cultural heritage as are those of bankers, doctors and others of perhaps more affluence and fame. They also contribute as much to the fabric of a community just as each thread contributes to the fabric of a tapestry, adding color, texture and character to the whole unit.

The preservation effort must be of broader scope than simply the saving of a few great mansions. It must become an active part of the governmental process, and the conscience of the community. Only then will it truly be effective and successful in helping the community preserve its cultural heritage. A community in touch

with its past knows where it is, and is better able to find its way in the future. This is precisely why this community-wide group chose as its name, Chico Heritage Association.

3rd Street Language Houses

California State Public Resources Code #5024.5 contains regulations pertaining to the six "Language Houses" on West 3rd Street between Chestnut and Hazel, and Sierra Hall, 422 West 3rd Street. These structures (formerly homes) are owned by California State University, Chico. The State law requires that:

- The seven structures be inventoried for their historical and architectural significance. These buildings were omitted from the inventory CSUC submitted to the State Office of Historic Preservation. Chico Heritage Association researched these houses in its Historic Resources Survey, Phase I, 1983, and the State Office of Historic Preservation has accepted that survey for its State Master List.
- The State Office of Historic Preservation must be contacted by the University in the planning stages regarding any proposed changes which will affect these cultural resources. This has not been done in the past.
- 3) These structures should also be properly maintained according to the Secretary of Interior's Standards on Preservation Projects. This has not been done. The structures, with the exception of Sierra Hall, have suffered from deferred maintenance.


The University is filing an Environmental Impact Report in its effort to be able to remove or demolish the Language Houses. Chico Heritage Association continues to maintain that these structures are architecturally and historically significant to this community, and is supported in this contention by the State Office of Historic Preservation. We will continue to work toward the preservation of these buildings. They are not only an important link with our past, they also form a critical visual and physical link holding our oldest neighborhood together. This area contains the highest concentration of our historic cultural resources, and Chico must preserve these Language Houses.
