ANNUAL MEETING REPORT

"Chico's Vanished Schools" was the program topic at the CHA Annual Meeting on February 19. Dave Nopel shared some of his father's large collection of school photos. Others who attended also shared school memories, including a 1938 home movie of the old Bidwell School on Nord Ave. (now a Grange Hall).

We were able to report a very successful year in 2011, with thanks to all of you that we were able to adequately fund our organization and our goals for the year.

It was also a successful year in our efforts to encourage preservation of Chico's heritage through Preservation Month Awards for heritage preservation projects around Chico; a new website (thanks to Board member Jon Couch); participation in the "You Know you're From Chico when..."; featuring Chico's historic warehouses in an exhibit at Butte County Fair; and continuing work on the Wright-Patrick house; and helping with research inquiries.

We were also pleased to display our beautifully framed *Resolution of Recognition* from the State Historic Resources Commission for our efforts toward preserving Chico's history.

HELPING KEEP BIDWELL MANSION OPEN

CHA was among several community organizations to give over \$1,000. More than half that amount was met by special contributions from our Board members.

Our President, Lucy Sperlin, served as a member of the steering committee that guided the successful fundraising effort. Another Board member, Mike Magliari, was involved as a member of the Bidwell Mansion Association Board. It was a big job, but worthwhile and successful.
