# BARBER RECREA-TION GROUNDS

CHICO ELECTRIC RAILWAY PRO-VIDES PLACE FOR OUTDOOR AMUSEMENTS.

Baseball, Football, Tennis and Track Athletics Provided for at South-

ern Terminus of the Street

Car Line.

The Chico Electric Railway Company has arranged for a recreation ground at Barber which will serve the public well in affording a place for holding all kinds of open air amusements, especially baseball, football and track athletics.

The recreation grounds are located immediately north of the electric car barn and adjoining The Diamond Match Company's peach orchard, a portion of which will be within the enclosure. The square of land, 500 feet on each side, is no wbeing plowed preparatory to grading and rolling.

Superintendent Frank Clough says a baseball diamond, football rectangle and a cinder path are to be built, and the entire square will be enclosed with a six-foot board wall, so that when it is desired to charge an admission fee, those who enjoy the amusement can be compelled to pay.

Tennis courts are to be prepared, so that public tournaments may be held.

A grand stand sufficient to seat 700 people is to be built. This will be covered and in front will be a screen to protect the spectators from being struck by foul balls during games of baseball. "Bleachers" are also to be built sufficient to accommodate about 500.

The new grounds will be ready for use about three weeks hence, but the first important attraction to be held there will be the Northern California Interscholastic Athletic League's track meeting on April 15th. At this meeting there will be nine schools of Northern California represented, ten men from each school to participate. The schools to enter teams are Oroville, Sutter City, Colusa, Willows, Red Bluff, Redding, Corning, Marysville and Chico.

This city has long needed enclosed grounds and these will fill the demand admirably.



### **CITY COUNCIL - ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW AND** HISTORIC PRESERVATION BOARD

As part of the 5-year review of the General Plan, the Legislative Committee of the Chamber of Commerce has proposed amending Title 19 of the Chico Municipal Code to strip the Architectural Review and Historic Preservation Board of its project design oversight and approval responsibilities. Ours, as well as City staff's position at the most recent City Council meeting was to oppose this change. The Council agreed to staff's proposal to streamline the ARHPB via more thorough vetting and training of Board members and to revisit the changes in 6 months.
