
RECAP OF PRESERVATION MONTH

As May came to a close, we held our annual Awards Presentations honoring the work on four individual homes clustered along West 14th Street and we recognized the efforts of Mike and Nancy Campos for their dedication in restoring numerous homes at various locations in Chico. The meeting was held in the large upstairs room in the Old Municipal Building with approximately forty people attending. Our guest speaker was Butte County Clerk-Recorder Candace Grubbs. Ms. Grubbs provided us with an update on the Butte County Hall of Records, soon to be under construction. The building will be built on a site across Nelson Ave. from the County Complex in Oroville.

The meeting closed with all the honorees assembled for a group photo. In addition to Mike and Nancy Campos, awards were given to Dan Schindler and Annaliese Baker for their restoration of 314 W. 14th Street; to Walter Mahoney and Hilary Herman for 322 W. 14th Street; to Sean and Shannon McLean for 330 W. 14th Street and to John and Lynn Wilson for 346 W. 14th Street. In recognizing the work on the four individual homes, it was noted in our selection that this also represented an important example of neighborhood revitalization.

Congratulations to all the recipients, we honor their efforts and will continue to seek more examples of preservation excellence for next year.


In this issue of our newsletter, you will see that we have been busy furthering that awareness. On May 30 we held our Preservation Awards Presentation, honoring those who have gone the extra step in the improvement of their homes. It is always uplifting to hear their story's and to see the before and after images of their work. Earlier in the month John Gallardo guided two groups through the streets of Chico, describing, in detail, the significant buildings in the downtown area and in the South of Campus National Register Historic neighborhood. And at the annual meeting of the Friends of the Library, John presented a brief history of preservation in Chico, highlighting both important as well as lost buildings.

In this issue, you will see that we are moving a bit closer to further stabilizing the Wright-Patrick house, Butte County's oldest wood frame building (1852). Work is underway to install the new beam on the building front.


And finally, for those seeking information on Chico history, we have hours each Wednesday from 1:00 to 3:00 pm at our office in

The very long beam that was supporting the east wall.


THE WRIGHT-PATRICK HOUSE UPDATE

Thanks to the generosity of our membership, the Wright-Patrick House, located on the Midway just South of the Glen Oaks Memorial Park, is currently undergoing restoration of the East foundation of the building. In recent years the hand-hewn log supporting it had begun to twist, with the result that the east wall became separated from the rest of the building and no longer had any support.

Although restoration and replacement of the upstairs windows had been our focus of late, it became necessary to transfer our attention and resources to the new problem, which is now being skillfully addressed by Chris Gauer and his crew. Minor termite damage (none recent) is also being dealt with.

As always, our goal with the Wright-Patrick House is to see that pre-Civil architecture is preserved for future generations along with its story, which is the story of westward migration and how our area came to be settled. The lessons it has to teach us are priceless; they give us a genuine appreciation for the challenges encountered by our predecessors in developing this beautiful area we now call home. The former State Historic Preservation Officer, Wayne Donaldson, upon visiting the site several years ago, declared the site "a treasure." And we heartily agree.

While it is awkward to keep requesting funds to maintain this building, it's hard to imagine a structure in Butte County more deserving of preservation and documentation. The life as a ranch headquarters, court, tavern, boarding house, public meeting place, store, etc., as well as the lives of the colorful people who occupied it from 1852 to the 1950s, all make for fascinating and educational storytelling. Please continue to help us in our efforts to keep this story alive!
