Back in November 2024, the hall hosted a community conversation about how we might strengthen our sense of togetherness here in Upper Clements — and how we might also draw visitors through the area to support local businesses and creatives. One idea from that discussion shone brighter than the rest: ***our own three-day community festival.***

Many small rural communities hold annual celebrations tied to a signature crop or long-standing tradition. While Upper Clements doesn't have a single defining harvest or mascot, we do have something just as meaningful: a community full of artists, makers, musicians, builders, hobbyists, storytellers, and creative spirits of every kind. Rural life is woven with creativity here, whether it's expressed in a workshop, a kitchen, a garden, or a studio.

That's why the early vision for this festival centres around the arts — not only fine arts, but the everyday creative work that reflects our identity as a community. From local artisans and food producers to performers, growers, craftspeople, and heritage keepers, there is so much talent and character within our boundaries.

We're still in the very early planning stages. We don't yet know what the festival will be called, what shape it will eventually take, or how many activities will fill its three days — and that's the exciting part. We want the community to be part of imagining it.

Early in the new year, we'll be hosting a public planning meeting, open to anyone who wants to help shape this new tradition. Whether you're interested in participating, volunteering, selling, performing, or simply sharing ideas, you're warmly invited to join the fun. This festival belongs to the whole community, and we can't wait to build it together.



to a furry or fluffy companion this year.




An Upper Clements Bromance




