

Minutes of the Annual Parochial Church Meeting – 25th April 2021

1. Prayers

The meeting opened with prayer led by the Rev'd Stephen Wright.

2. Apologies for Absence – Julia Bailey, Sarah Parsons, Kathleen Holt, Margaret Rutland, Margaret Rapp, Suki Puttock, Marion Gordon, Maureen Jupp, Ian Geddes, Ann Woods, and Alice Hicks.

3. Approval of Minutes for APCM 2019

The minutes were agreed and accepted as an accurate record. This was proposed by Andrew Hicks and seconded by Robert Thornton and agreed unanimously.

Review of 2020

4. Presentation of the Statement of Financial Activities of the PCC for year ending 31st December 2020

The Report and Statement of Financial Activities for the year ending 31st December 2020 were available at the meeting.

Susan Tilley, PCC Treasurer addressed the meeting

The accounts for 2020 are still with the independent examiner. However, I am sure there will not be any alterations to the figures in the APCM booklet.

You will see that we only paid two thirds of our Parish Share in 2020. The Standing Committee met with the Archdeacon and finance representatives from Southwark to discuss the issue. The decision was taken, as our income had been reduced considerably because of Covid, not being able to rent out the hall and not having events such as quiz nights, barbecues and Christmas fair. Our income is down by £20,000 from 2019 and our expenditure is reduced. We have also paid off a further £8,000 from the interest free Diocesan loan. We have maintained our reserves at approximately £40,000 which includes £8,000 for the boiler fund.

Once again, my thanks go to Amanda Sinclair, Jim Gordon and Michael Lishmund for the work they do and also to all of you who contribute to the finances for the church.

Susan invited comments or questions –

Dudley Mead queried that, whilst the Diocesan interest free loan to cover Garden Room costs was being repaid as agreed, the balance sheet in the annual accounts does not reflect this. Susan had raised this with the Independent Examiner but had been told this was correct, though she agreed with Dudley that it was not a true picture. After some discussion, Andrew Brown proposed

that the meeting do not accept the accounts as they stand and that Susan seeks further advice on this matter.

It was also agreed not to agree reappointing the Independent Examiner in the light of the above.

5. Report on the Proceedings of the PCC

Helen Lishmund had submitted a report included in the APCM booklet outlining the proceedings of the PCC during 2019.

6. Report on the Electoral Roll

The electoral roll had been revised and Janice White had reported that there were 194 on the electoral roll, 3 members had passed away during the year, 10 people had moved away and 1 member had asked to be removed from the register.

7. Report by the Churchwardens (including comments on the fabric, goods and ornaments of the church)

In addition to the report included in the APCM booklet, Debbie Brown wanted to thank Martyn Brown for agreeing to stand as Churchwarden and she welcomed having his experience and support.

She thanked Ian Harley for his support as a fellow Churchwarden and, whilst he was standing down, he had indicated that he was happy to help and support in the background.

Debbie also wanted to thank Amanda Sinclair, our Parish Administrator who had gone over and above that role in supporting the parish and services throughout the pandemic restrictions. Peter Crocombe had been wholly responsible for Liturgy over the past year and had kept services running through lockdown. Michael Lishmund had continued to organise salaries and Gift Aid and had organised the gardening team and kept the grounds in good order. Ian Brentnall had kept music going despite there being no choir (and had shown his bell ringing skills). Jim Gordon, in addition to taking care of the cash and baking, had kept us warm by managing the heating system and delivers our donations to the New Addington food bank. Maureen Jupp as Sacristan has kept silverware and linen in good order. Gill Sharpe had taken responsibility for the books in the church library and those donated by the Walford family. The Brown brothers (Martyn and Andrew) had taken care of flags and crosses on the tower, dealing with building issues and builders and setting up microphones etc. to record services in addition to overseeing the church hall. She also thanked the Standing Committee including Susan Tilley and Helen Lishmund for their support.

Last but by no means least, she thanked Stephen Wright and Michael Skinner for their support in keeping services going through a difficult time in an interregnum with pandemic restrictions.

There are many others to thank – not least the Deputy Wardens and Sidespeople – for their support.

It was hoped that with the coming summer and the lessening of restrictions we could be back to church as normal with coffee after the service.

Review of 2020

Susan Tilley gave the following review -

It is a strange 12 months to review. This time last year we were just months into the first lockdown. Jenny was about to leave us which was then postponed to the beginning of June, when the Interregnum official started.

We have managed to continue with our services thanks to technology. We started services with people recording at home and Amanda cleverly putting it all together. We were able to open for Private Prayer and eventually services with social distancing. We also managed to stream services from church, again with Amanda's technological expertise.

Finally, we are back together again in church, albeit socially distanced, which is really great.

Debbie Brown set up a telephone 'buddy' system which kept parishioners in touch with what was going on and was greatly appreciated.

The PCC met twice in person and the rest of the time on Zoom which has been a new experience for all of us. Helen became our risk assessment queen.

Thanks go to Stephen, Michael and all our visiting clergy who have kept our services going. Thanks also to Peter Crocombe for putting together covid safe services, to Martyn Brown for arranging priests and to Ian Brentnall for the music.

The Standing Committee, PCC and Interregnum Steering Group have worked hard to keep us on track.

The Diocese have commissioned the redecoration of the Rectory ready for our new priest, Younis, who hopefully will be joining us in July.

The Brown brothers have been able to engage the builders working on the Rectory to repair the lightning conductor, clear out the gutter on the tower and replacer the tower pointing which is badly damaged. This is much needed work which has been on the PCC agenda for at least a year and Andrew and Martyn will be glad to put the matter 'to bed.'

We look forward to 2021/22 when we welcome Rector Younis and family to St. John's and to worshipping together and having coffee and socialising again.

Finally on behalf of the Standing committee and PCC I thank you all for your support in what has been a very strange year.

Negotiating our way through lockdown in an interregnum was not without its challenges and we are very grateful to the whole congregation for their patience and understanding. We have tried hard to make the right decisions and we were extremely grateful for the wisdom of the Interregnum Steering Group

July was a joyous month as we welcomed Younis and Nancy to St John's. After a long period with little to celebrate Younis's Induction and Collation was an evening of great ceremony and happiness. Bishop Jonathan and Archdeacon Rosemarie attended, and everyone enjoyed the outdoor celebrations afterwards

Since then, we have been trying hard to get back to normal and to lift the tiresome restrictions necessitated by Covid. As we went into autumn the heating broke down but, enter the Brown Brothers and Younis who dug up the floor, found the leak and ensured that we kept warm throughout the rest of the winter

We are pleased to report that the fabric of the church remains in good order. On March 19th we had the Archdeacon's Visitation where our records etc were inspected. We are pleased to say that we passed with flying colours

There is much to do, the heating being our overriding priority. We are well on the way with both researching the best and most suitable system and with fundraising. We are most grateful to all who have given of both time and money for this most essential project

We need to thank our anonymous benefactors for the beautiful new carpets at the High Altar and in the vestry. It was a very generous donation which has made a dramatic improvement to the look of the church

St John's, like most churches would not function without the support of an army of volunteers who provide their time and talents to our ministry in Selsdon. Far too many to thank by name in this report but a massive thank you to you all. However, we will mention one name. Peter Crocombe is stepping down from Head Server after many, many years of recruiting, training and organising our very professional team of Servers. Thank you, Peter for your sterling work

DEANERY SYNOD REPORT

14 June 2021

This was a Zoom meeting After the usual apologies, minutes of previous meeting etc. the Area Dean, Debbie Forman, spoke about the need for people to stand for Diocesan Synod. I was a rep. but am not going to continue and so far, no-one from the Laity has stepped forward for election. The main topic of the meeting was a good presentation by Hazel O'Sullivan, Vicar of St Francis and St Mary West Wickham on Living in Love and Faith, the initiative from the Church of England on identity, relationships, sexuality, and marriage (The PCC is supposed to be looking at this!) The meeting closed with Compline.

3 November 2021

The meeting was held at St Francis of Assisi, West Wickham. The Treasurer reported that we were still owed some money (@£400) from Amanda's time as Deanery Secretary. The Area Dean, Debbie Forman, spoke about the very good response to the pledges for the Parish Support Fund, with most churches in the Deanery maintaining or improving their pledge. The main subject of the evening was a talk, illustrated by slides and video, by Nicola Thomas, the Director of the Department of Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation at the Diocese. This was a very pertinent subject in view of COP26. After an interesting and informative session, we split into small groups to talk about what we could do to improve our churches eco standing. Several churches in the Deanery have registered for the Eco Church scheme and some have achieved bronze standard. On the general subject of climate change and our response, our group from St John's concluded that there were no simple answers, and it was easy to fall into the trap of unintended consequences for the poor and for developing nations. The meeting closed with compline.

21 February 2022

The meeting was held at our church, St John the Divine.

Once again St John's had its full complement of representative's present - a wonderful example to other parishes who aren't so dedicated! As always, the meeting began with refreshments in the Garden Room at 7.30, followed by worship led by Father Michael.

In our Deanery we now have a representative on the General Synod, Paul, who gave a brief report of his experiences at his first meeting. The title of the meeting was 'Blue Sky Thinking" led by Revd Debbie Forman, the Area Dean, who opened the meeting by asking us to think about the direction of the Deanery over the next 3 years. She asked us to dream dreams and think outside the box.

The following points were made during a plenary session following group discussions.

- We need to get to know each other, social events would help with this
- Joint activities such as tree planting, rubbish clearing, youth work etc.
- Joining together to help with issues that affect our lives, ie the economic situation
- A Deanery magazine, website and/or Facebook page
- Joint services for festivals, also open-air services to attract more non churchgoers
- Sharing information about help available from the Diocese and other organisations

Debbie announced there will be a Deanery pilgrimage round the parishes, and I informed the meeting that our next speaker in June will be Nellie Misenga, the Diocesan Development Officer who will probably be speaking about poverty and the economic situation.

BUILDING AND MAINTENANCE REPORT

Presented at the APCM - May 2022

Church Heating

During the summer water was found to be running into the make-up tank in the tower, the cause of which was identified as a significant water leak in the heating system, somewhere under the floor of the church. The leakage rate was estimated to be around 1000 litres/day. The system was shut down. A specialist company was employed to find the leak and was found under the north aisle of the nave. The cause was a severely corroded steel elbow. In October a repair was carried out by our heating contractor, Thermoserve, and the system was recommissioned in time for winter.

The system breakdown confirmed what had previously been agreed, the need for a new heating system for the church. Not only is the boiler itself becoming unreliable; it is over thirty years old, but the pipework is over eighty years old and there may be other unknown areas of corrosion and further failures in the making. An additional factor is the inefficiency of the present radiator system. On a cold day even with the boiler on for four or five hours the temperature in the church fails to heat the church to a comfortable temperature. The repair therefore buys time as alternative systems are investigated, but that time is borrowed.

Project Warm Church

A small project team was formed to investigate alternative systems. The brief for the project is to have a cost-efficient system that will heat the church to a temperature, so the congregation are comfortable. Advice was sought from the DAC and the DAC Heating Engineer. Specialist commercial heating companies have been invited to provide proposals and costs. These covered a range of technologies: -

- Replacement gas boiler and new pipework and convector radiators.
- Electric Infrared heaters
- Gas convectors heaters
- Air source heat pumps
- Electric radiator
- Solar panels

Costs for these systems vary between £35,000 and £120,000 and if electric is chosen may necessitate an improved campus electricity supply. We are now at the stage to assess the proposals though this has been complicated by a number of factors: -

- -the rapid changes in both gas and electric fuel costs.
- -substantial increase in material costs in the last six months.
- -the desire of the diocese, where possible, to convert to green electric energy systems as these are more likely to attract grant funding.

A Warm Church fund has been set up and thanks to generous donations from the congregation and from fundraising events, now stands at £32,000.

Lightning Conductor

Scaffolding was erected at the East End to gain access to the roof to re-fix the detached conductor. This work was carried out by Format Construction. At the same time the opportunity was taken to carry out repointing of the brickwork on the tower and gulley. The gutter was cleared, and pigeon deterrent devices installed.

Once this work was complete EES Ltd were engaged to carry out an inspection. The inspection failed at both ground earthing points and remedial works carried out by inserting more ground rods. This was successful and the system passed the relevant requirements.

Planned Maintenance

All routine maintenance has been carried out in accordance with the schedule.

Andrew Taylor carried out the 5-year electrical inspection without issue The quinquennial inspection due in 2020 has been delayed due to Covid restrictions and unavailability of the inspecting architect. Contact has been established with the architect and by mutual discussion, this is expected to be completed in 2022

There is awareness of building fabric issues for which estimates of work have been obtained. It is the intention that these will be discussed with the inspecting architect to see if everything has been captured. This will give evidence to form a plan of attack for prioritizing tasks in most need of completion.

Now that COVID 19 restrictions have abated we expect to engage further maintenance tasks not previously tackled.

St John's Church Church Hall Report for 2021 Presented at the APCM May 2022

For the first part of the year the hall was closed to hirers and only from July onwards were we open for business. Regular hirers started to return and one off parties picked up in September.

Income was down though our fixed maintenance costs were unchanged. Income in 2021 at £16,432 was up 43% over 2020 though we are still down 30% compared with 2019, the last normal year. Hopefully we will return to normal levels this year. Hire rates were reviewed and increased in line with inflation.

We lost a number of regular hirers in 2021 but pleased to say that this has been offset but a good number of new hirers including Slimming World and a karate class.

Amanda organised a team to refurbish and redecorate the MCR.

Many thanks to Amanda for efficiently running the diary, organising the marketing of the hall and dealing with potential hirers. We must also thank those on the 'meet and greet' rota looking after hirers on the day and Neetha who keeps the hall clean and tidy.

Like many drama groups, the return to relative normality presents issues regarding personnel available to both preform and support possible activities.

In order to discuss the future direction of SJDS, Caryl Rapps and I met with the Rector, whom we are delighted to welcome as our new president, and a subsequent meeting with both committee members and interested parties indicated a willingness to produce a joint Christmas venture in partnership with the Church and other local groups, probably to be held in the hall over a weekend in late November.

We look forward to sharing out plans with the local community watch this space!

MUSIC REPORT

A. The Choirs

A.1 The SATB choir

Our robed choir continues to provide vocal leadership of our services, including a Communion Anthem, on the 1st, 2nd 3rd and 5th Sunday mornings of each month as well as a full Choral Evensong on the evening of (generally) the 2nd Sunday. As previously reported, week by week we continue to operate with limited numbers of sopranos and basses but the quality of the singers we do have remains exceptional for a parish church choir, as indeed is their loyalty.

Our monthly Choral Evensongs continue to offer an opportunity to welcome singers from within our church and further afield who are glad to share their talents with us but with a limited commitment. We have been very encouraged to note the number of singers who continue to show an interest in this service during the course of the last year, as this number continues to grow steadily. With the modest numbers available Sunday by Sunday the repertoire of pieces we are able to tackle is naturally somewhat limited. However, our full choral services allow for a broader range of music to be offered in worship and this is a vital component in our efforts to retain our SATB choir. We will continue to extend and develop our repertoire during the course of this year.

We continue to rehearse on a Thursday evening between 7.30 pm and 8.30 pm, 30 minutes before each morning service and an hour before Choral Evensong.

Last year the choir sang at the Diocesan Confirmation Service in November and are due to sing Evensong at Rochester on 30th April, COVID permitting.

I want to pay particular tribute to Professor Timothy Orchard for very generously stepping in to look after that music whilst I was indisposed due to illness. The choir and I are so very grateful for his expert direction of the choir, particularly during Holy Week and Easter. We could not have been more fortunate to have been able to call upon him for help.

A.2 The Come and Sing Choir

Our Come and Sing choir provided an enthusiastic, effective and joyful musical leadership of the main morning service on the 4th Sunday of each month, rehearsing before the service from 9.30 am. The Come and Sing choir membership is not formally counted or noted and varies according to who is available. There is a pool of singers currently standing at about 12 people and more would always be welcome to come and join this happy group.

B Instruments

B.1 The Organ

The Organ continues to provide reliable service to the church; tuning should take place twice each year but we haven't needed a tuning visit this winter as the organ has largely stayed in tune. We don't anticipate any serious maintenance issues.

I would once again raise the issue of the possibility of installing a Closed Circuit Television system to assist the organist. In days gone by, when services were conducted from the chancel and the high alter, visibility was not too much of a problem. However, now that most of our services are conducted at the nave altar it is extremely difficult to see anything helpful, with little visibility of anything happening to the west of the chancel arch except for what little can be seen using a free-standing mirror. Such systems are not expensive these days, have been installed in a large number of churches with similar visibility problems and it would assist very much with the smooth running of services and St. John's, especially those when a choir isn't present to tell the organist to stop playing! Unfortunately, this has not moved any further forward, but the need remains and it is hoped that we will be in a position to move forward with this as soon as possible.

As always, we continue to count ourselves profoundly fortunate that we continue to rely upon the exceptional skill, musicianship and friendship of Jonathan Musgrave our organist. We are truly blest to have him.

B.2 Pianos

We have three pianos on site, the Steinway grand in church and two upright instruments, one in the choir vestry and another in the Hall. All three instruments have been tuned and maintained during the past year.

C Music and Robes

C.1 Music

The music library at St John's is substantial, containing many of the standard works of the choral repertoire which one would expect to find in the library of an active church choir. However, much of the stock is in extremely poor condition due to extensive use in the past and deterioration brought on by the former damp conditions experienced in the Choir Vestry. I am delighted to report that the PCC kindly agreed to a small music budget which has allowed us to purchase some new music for the library. We are slowly working to building the contents of the library and to replace dilapidated copies of frequently used pieces.

C.2 Robes

As we welcome more people to be part of our Sunday-by-Sunday group and our Choral Evensong group, the need for additional robes continues to challenge us. Again, the PCC have very kindly agreed to provide funds for the purchase of robes to replace the ones stolen from the Vestry five years ago. Measurements have been taken and an order will be placed shortly.

D. The future

The challenge of maintaining the high standard of music in worship which St. John's enjoys continues to test us, particularly the shortage of voices available for Sunday morning services. It is unreasonable to expect every member to be available for every service, as the commitments of work and family also need to be taken into account. However, we are working hard to extend the warm hand of welcome to any who are interested in being part of the musical scene at St. John's. The support of the congregation for our music and our choirs in particular continues to encourage us to do all we can to perpetuate good quality music as a central part of our worship at St. John's for as long as possible.
