### Father Michael's Diary

### 17 January 2021

This week sees the start (18 January) of the



week of prayer for Christian Unity. Founded in 1908 the week spans the minor feast days of the two greatest Apostles: St Peter and St Paul, thus locating the search for unity within the apostolic nature of the Church. Not surprisingly the drive for church unity began in 1910 at a conference of missionary societies. At that time in the mission field the societies of the different denominations saw themselves as rivals, in competition with one another which detracted from the overall missionary endeavour.

Today however we live in a different world and organic unity between the different Christian bodies is seen as an unattainable and not even desirable goal. The different Christian bodies we have today may have come into being as a result of human frailty and we may even regret them, but we can also see that they have allowed a far greater range of spiritual experience, witness and action than would have been possible in a single body. What is more important today is mutual recognition and acceptance. We need to recognise than none of us has a monopoly of the truth and that all expressions of love and loyalty to our Lord are equally valid. We need to acknowledge that we are all "singing from the same hymn sheet" and not just metaphorically, and therefore should be able to pool our energies in serving the world and witnessing to God's love in creation.

Our goal may no longer be organic unity, now seen as unattainable, but full intercommunion, the mutual recognition one another's sacraments and orders as universally valid. This is in itself a major challenge in the face of both the intransigence of some Christian bodies in the mutual recognition of others and the schismatic tendencies within our own Anglican communion. An important corollary of the commitment to unity is the effort to prevent further disunity. This will be important for us this year as we work through the Living in Love and Faith exercise in human sexuality, sadly this looks as though it will test us to breaking point. Jesus promised that the Holy Spirit would guide us into all truth we must pray that we search for that greater truth we do not lose our desire for unity.

Earlier today I had my first coronavirus vaccination - yippee!!
